

## with Jim Bond

Jim Bond likes to stick to the advice given by his father many years ago.

"Don't get in their way," Harold Bond, a trainer at Finger Lakes, told his son. "Let them do it. They'll carry you there, you just have to let them."

Bond, also a Harold by name, made a career out of letting his horses take him places and along the way he's won two Whitneys, a Travers, Met Mile, Wood Memorial, Donn Handicap and six other Grade 1 stakes. He's won 1,136 races since taking over for his ailing father in the 1970s, including six at the current Saratoga meet.

Assisted by sons Ryan and Kevin, Trainer Jim Bond's horses head back home from a training session. Bond counts his wife Tina and the fam-

ily's Bond Racing Stable, longtime supporter Bill Clifton, new patron Avanti Stable and several others on the barn's list of clients. Nine sets of jockey silks hang from a fence outside Bond's private barn on Gridley Street.

"We're very fortunate," Bond said. "Great clients send you good horses and hopefully we just don't screw it up. That's the bottom line.

"All of our clients are really nice people, they love their horses. When owners love their horses they give you that extra boost of confidence to do the right thing. They're just like children. Some learn fast, some learn slow, and you have to be a good teacher."

After he finished up training a set on the Oklahoma Training Track - where runners sporting the trademark "007" saddlepads train spring through the fall - Tuesday morning, Bond went through some of his string with The Special's Tom Law.

Rinaldi: Purchased by Bond Racing Stable for \$5,000 as a weanling at the 2016 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga fall mixed sale, 3-year-old son of Posse ran record to 2-for-3 with victory in Cab Calloway division of New York Stallion Series Stakes July 24. "He's been our key horse so far. He's been a lot of fun. We're pointing him for the Saranac. He's got to step it up again but he's answered the call a couple times now. I had his sister, Hot And Spicy, she was a nice filly and she beat the Horse of the Year in Canada, Lexie Lou, (when second in the Fury Stakes in 2014). Hopefully he can carry it on a little more. I hate to do this the fourth start of his life, but he seems to have a lot of talent. You've got to find out how far they can go so we'll carry on."



Way Smart: Homebred 5-year-old Tizway mare for Mandaclair Stable and Bond Racing Stable won allowance here Aug. 4. She's 2-for-9 with two seconds and a third for \$128,132. "Nice filly, Tizzelle's full-sister, Just all heart, She's probably a better miler. Of course the circumference here is 5 1/2 or a mile. There were no miles in the book, I had her ready for six, seven weeks to run and that family has been so good to us. They all run. Lead them over. We'll go to Belmont, find something one turn around a mile and keep our fingers crossed."

Giacosa: Two-year-old full sister to Way Smart. She worked a half in :52.73 on the Oklahoma Aug. 5. "She's as exciting as can be. She's had a couple halves."

Our Way: Bill Clifton's 6-year-old Tizway gelding won the 2016 Better Talk Now, 2017 Sunshine Millions Turf and a waiver claiming race here Aug. 3. He's won five of 17 and \$317,934. "Special horse. He has issues but he has a heart as big as this state. I told Jose (Ortiz) the day before, 'This one, he's going to win.' He tells you when he's ready to be led over. I made a mistake, ran him over at Tampa and a little too far, I thought being a Florida-bred that maybe we could still beat them but we ran into a buzzsaw (March To The Arch) and it was too far, bad trainer job period. We have to pick our spots with him."

Zealous: Clifton's 5-year-old Tiznow gelding improved to 2-for-11 with starter allowance win here July 18. "Really handy Tiznow. Big, big horse. He's one of those I have to be a little gentle with sometimes, back off. He had a winter for us, ran really hard all winter and just needed a break. We freshened him up for the meet here. There's no spot for him back. He worked (Monday) and we'll look for a race in New York for him."

Andretta: Bond Racing's 5-year-old Freud mare broke her maiden going 5 1/2 furlongs on the grass against state-breds

July 19 then finished fifth in allowance Aug. 15. "Her nickname in the barn is Mighty Mouse. She's not the biggest horse in the barn but she has a special want. She's just like her mother. She made \$200,000 the hard way and she was guts all the time. More of a dirt horse. She's a Freud of course. Her whole body is heart. She ran back at the meet and had a course that was very hard and she did not like it. Good thing is she's OK, bad thing is we're not going 5 1/2 back at Belmont. She loves that 5 1/2."

Mister Bobby: Avanti Stable's 3-year-old New York-bred Shanghai Bobby gelding broke his maiden via DQ of Champagne Chills dropping from maiden special to \$40,000 maiden claiming July 26. "Relatively new account for us. Nice people, local people from Saratoga. They sold two very nice horses at the sale, an

Into Mischief and a Tiznow and did very well. They have a beautiful little farm in Greenfield. Short story is we foal their mares at our farm. They were kind enough to give us some horses to train, the first one was Mister Bobby. He was a little hard-headed the first start of his life so he got the ultimate equipment change, which always helps. He still wasn't as good as I'd like him to be in the paddock but he got put up through a DQ. He was going by. He thinks he won, he did win, check is cashed. He might come back at the end of the meet in an off-the-turfer possibly. Don't want to be too ambitious because we're coming out of a 40."

**Competitive Cloud:** Mister Bobby's younger 2-year-old half brother by Competitive Edge. He breezed a half from the gate in company in :52.67 on the Oklahoma Monday. "He's showing us a lot. He's a nice horse. He may come out with a 'G' by his name though, he's starting to act a little bit boyish. Like brother like brother."

Lucky Girl: Avanti's homebred 2-vear-old by Lookin At Lucky breezed in company with Competitive Cloud. "Lookin At Lucky, not a bad sire to have in the barn and she's out of a nice Holy Bull mare. She shows me a lot of poise and a lot of class.'

Letterman: Clifton's 5-year-old Hard Spun gelding finished second for \$30,000 tag going 1 mile on the inner turf July 27. He's 1-for-5 with earnings of \$33,438. "Our unlucky horse at the meet. He's one of those horses that just finds trouble. He's just a tough character and gets too rank. We've tried everything, rider-wise on him. Junior (Alvarado) does a great job on him but he's a tough horse to ride. He gets in the game and it's like 'look out, I'm going through you, over the top of you.' He causes his own trouble. He ran second here and probably

should have won by 5. That's Letterman." **Cerretalto:** Bond homebred 5-year-old Tizway gelding is 4-for-12 with \$177,225 in earnings. He finished third in 6-furlong optional on the main track, running for \$40,000 tag, Aug. 8. "House horse. He ran a good third here the other day. The outside post really bothered him. I have to give him a lot of breaks, but when I do he seems to come back and we get a lot out of him. Then we have to send him back home, take a break. That's OK, as long as they're safe and sound we're happy."

Wild William: Phoenix Stable and Maureen Edwards campaign 4-year-old New York-bred Freud colt in partnership. A \$39,000 RNA at 2016 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga New York-bred sale, he's finished second three times in nine starts and earned \$49,320. "Second early in the meet (July 14) then eighth (Aug. 7), should run back. Broke in the air and spotted the field last time. We had beaten the winner the start before. He'll run back if we stay on the turf toward the end of the meet. Probably should be tough."

**Queenofeverything:** Owned by partnership of Sportsmen Stable, Bond Racing and Monarch Farm, 4-year-old Pomeroy filly finished second in state-bred maiden at 6 furlongs on the main track in her fourth start July 28. "We're hoping to get her back in. They had a race the other day, it came up a little short and they might bring it back."

**Grand Banks:** Thomas Thienel's two-time winner and \$140,846-earner finished fifth in allowance here July 14 and seventh for \$35,000 tag on the grass Aug. 16. "She blew a shoe the first jump out of the gate the other day. Lost all chance. She's got a nice sister that we like."

**Canyon Ready:** Bred by Thienel and offered by the Bond family's Song Hill Thoroughbreds but not sold on a \$220,000 bid at last year's Fasig-Tipton Saratoga New York-bred yearling sale, 2-year-old More Than Ready filly shows two 3-furlong breezes on the Oklahoma dirt on her tab. "She's a half to Grand Banks. We're very excited about her."

Argonne: Clifton's 4-year-old son of Tizway won three in a row before 10th in Grade 2 Bowling Green here July 27. "He's a nice horse. Got thrown to the wolves in what basically was a Grade 1. Very, very tough race, everyone was ducking Bricks And Mortar so everybody went in the Bowling Green. If Junior (Alvarado) had to do it over again we would have been really close to Luis Saez, who just stole the race on the front end (with Channel Cat). We made a middle move that cost us probably everything. I don't think you've seen the end of this horse. He's a really gorgeous mover, just wants to

please you, a true racehorse. His name comes from Mr. Clifton's grandfather, who was in the battle of Argonne and he won the Purple Heart for saving so many men in the battle, went back less than five years ago to see it one more time and died of a heart attack there. So Mr. Clifton named him Argonne. That's heavy stuff. The last time he did that was Behrens. That was his family's company for like 100 years. Mr. Clifton names horses well. He takes a lot of pride and time in it. I'm looking at the Knickerbocker on Oct. 12. It's a mile-and-aneighth. A mile-and-a-quarter is where his true number is."

**Prioritize:** Clifton's 4-year-old by Tizway won on the turf here last summer and looks to get back after being off the board in three starts in 2019. He finished eighth here July 27. "He's just been unlucky. No pace. He needs a pace to come into. This poor horse just can't get the pace. The other day he ran here and they had just taken the rails down and Dylan Davis, who rode him very well last year, I put him back on the horse. The poor kid did nothing wrong but when he swung him out he wound up in the patch that they had just basically been dug up for however long and he had nowhere to go. That's what he had to do and you could just see the horse running through a plowed field. Everybody else was running on the good golf course. You say, 'boy, the poor horse' and that's all you say. We're kind of regrouping. That's the game of horse racing."

**Brunate:** Bond homebred 2-year-old colt by Normandy Invasion is out of the Raffie's Majesty mare Gattinara, who won four races and \$197,760 from 2006-10. "He's from the first crop of Normandy Invasion, a very good horse and a good looking horse. He was a New York stallion and they took him back to Spendthrift. He's a half to Cathy Naz and half to Andretta. He's got some poise and class. His works have been really, really outstanding. Well in hand. He gives you a feeling that he might be OK. He's an early foal, which I kind of like to have for running as 2-year-olds. We'll see."

Pleasant Breeze: Yes, Pleasant Breeze. Now 24, son of Pleasant Tap holds down duties as the pony and big horse honors in the barn. "The most important horse in the barn. As most people would remember he won the Saratoga Cup, Meadowlands Cup, finished second to Golden Missile in the Pimlico Special, second in the Gulfstream Park Handicap and second by a nose in the Clark. Should have won that one. He's still doing very well. He goes back and forth to Florida with us as the stable pony. He still is by far the most important horse in the barn. He gets whatever he wants. We stop the truck on the way down to South Carolina and he gets to stay overnight. I don't want to ship him 24 hours straight to Florida. We have him on a certain load, that truck rests for the night. If we all had his life. He's as beautiful as he was the day we led him over for all those races. Makes you proud to have horses like him."

## Smithwick winner Winston C aims for second Grade 1 of meet

Light, leggy, bouncy, on the muscle, the horse in the paddock could pass for somebody's 3-year-old or maybe a turf miler. He walks like a seven-figure yearling. The unraced filly beside him stands a hand taller.

"Watch out, he'll kick," warn his people.

Winston C is the highweight and favorite for today's Grade 1 New York Turf Writers Cup steeplechase stakes, though he tells a different story on looks.

He's small, quick, coiled, ready. He's not – as the old-timers say – a "big, strapping horse who stands over a lot of ground." He's friendly in a say hello kind of way, but he'd rather just

keep moving thank you very much.


Add it all up, and he really misses the mark when it comes to a typical steeplechase type – until he starts moving anyway.

"He's got some walk on him," said exercise rider and assistant trainer Keri Brion, aboard for light training and a paddock school Wednesday morning. "His walk is unreal. He covers so much ground. It's amazing, your whole body moves with him when he goes."

At faster speeds, it's more of the same.

"This horse could be one to go back to England for the Cheltenham Festival," said Tom Garner, after winning the A.P. Smithwick Memorial on Winston C at Saratoga July 25. "He could be a Champion Hurdle horse. He's that kind of horse."

The 5-year-old gelding made easy work of Smithwick, sprinting home with a wide rally to win by 3 1/2 lengths at nearly 7-2. You won't get anywhere near that price today as he's 4-5 on the morning line in a field of nine drawn for the first race. Post time is 12:50 p.m., weather per-

mitting. Wednesday's jump race was canceled due to the wet conditions, and today's could be in jeopardy as well.

Bred in Ireland by Patrick Kelly, Winston C began his racing life as anything but a hurdle horse. He sold twice at Tattersalls, fetching \$132,000 as a weanling and \$88,000 as a yearling. He confirmed those opinions by winning his debut for trainer Michael Bell and jockey Jamie Spencer as a 2-year-old in 2016. Frankie Dettori got legged up for the next run, third



nine drawn for the first race. Post Winston C leads everybody home in the Smithwick, and meets several rivals again today.

of three at Newmarket, a few weeks later. The son of Rip Van Winkle won once in 2017 before selling as a jumps prospect in February 2018 for \$44,000. Trained by Harry Fry, Winston C won three in a row this winter – a January maiden at Wincanton, a February novice at Sandown and a March handicap at Kelso. Fifth of seven in a Grade 1 novice hurdle at Aintree in April, he joined trainer Jonathan Sheppard's barn in America shortly thereafter. In two starts for Ed Swyer's Hudson River Farm, Winston

C has a third and the Smithwick win.

Garner was aboard for both, and offered a comparison.

"When I rode him at Nashville he kept leaving his back legs like he was hurdling English hurdles," the jockey said. "These are a lot bigger than he's used to and he's a very small horse. We schooled the hell out of him and I couldn't have sat on a better jumper at home, but he just wasn't having any of it. He was a bit like that again (in the Smithwick). I just wasn't confident early on and thought the only thing I could do was get him back and start over."

Winston C was eighth and behind a wall of horses over the second-last, and about the same over the last before fighting for a

position and charging around the final turn. Four wide, he gained ground with each stride.

Today's race poses new questions. Winston C picks up 10 pounds from the Smithwick to 154, between eight and 12 more than his foes, and the 2 3/8-mile race will be the longest of his career. He won carrying 159, 160 and 166 this winter and was beaten less than a length on the demanding Nash-

ville course in May. If he's worried, he didn't show it while jogging through puddles behind the Oklahoma Annex and touring the paddock with stablemate Juluca.

The field is full of capable veterans. Third in the Smithwick, Hinterland returns for Sonny Via and Jack Fisher. The 11-year-old seeks his first win since December 2013, but an effort similar to his placings in four Grade 1 stakes puts him in the fray. He finished 4 1/2 lengths behind the winner when third in the Smithwick and gets an eight-pound shift. Willie McCarthy rides at 6-1.

Riverdee Stable's Gibralfaro was fourth in the Smithwick after getting shuffled back leaving the last fence. He stayed on late and should appreciate the added distance. Michael Mitchell rides for Fisher at 9-2. After being level in the Smithwick, the 7-year-old gets 10 pounds from the favorite.


The only American-bred in the field, All The Way Jose, makes his

fourth start in the race. Third in 2017, Buttonwood Farm's 9-year-old seeks to end a 10-race losing streak. Gerard Galligan rides for trainer/breeder Sheppard at 12-1, off a fifth in the Smithwick.

The Fields Stable's Portrade upset the 2016 Turf Writers, but hasn't won since for trainer Elizabeth Voss. In his first start since May, the 10-year-old Irish-bred gets Ross Geraghty at 12-1.

Voss and owner Bob Kinsley team up for two runners. Irish-bred Modem finished second in his first five American starts – all Grade 1 stakes – including the 2017 Smithwick and Turf Writers. The 9-year-old was well-beaten when 11th in the Smithwick, but it was his first jump start in a year. Jack Doyle, who won two at Colonial Downs Saturday, gets back on at 15-1. English-bred No Wunder comes off a seventh in the Smithwick, but was making up loads of ground in the stretch. Kieran Norris returns at 15-1.

Irish-bred Peppay Le Pugh was ninth in the Smithwick and will appreciate the longer trip and the expected soft turf for Gill Johnson, trainer Jack Fisher and jockey Darren Nagle.

# World Cup Hotsy Totsy makes first start

since Royal Ascot in turf mile

When Dean Reeves purchased the once-started Hotsy Totsy this year in England, the Atlanta native's first thought wasn't to bring her directly to the United States.

Reeves instead wanted to pursue a start at Royal Ascot with 3-year-old filly. Reeves' wish was granted, and he made the trip to the Royal meeting with his wife Patti and Hotsy Totsy's co-owners Randy and Marina Hill.

Hotsy Totsy last raced June 21 on the fourth day of Royal Ascot in the Sandringham Stakes, a 1-mile handicap for 3-year-old fillies on the straight course. She makes her first start in the U.S. in today's \$100,000 Riskaverse Stakes, a 1-mile event over the inner turf restricted to 3-year-old

fillies who have never won a sweepstakes at that distance or further.

Hotsy Totsy finished third of 27 in the Sandringham, and that was just a cherry on the cake of the experience for Reeves.


"It was fabulous, best trip we've ever had," Reeves said. "The whole deal, we stayed outside of London in a place called The Vineyard. Great food, great service, great accommodations. We went to Highclere Stud. We saw where they film Downton Abbey, my wife loved that.

"We went to the track twice; I had a glass of champagne in my hand the

entire time. It's a spectacular venue. The way they do it, they've got some things they do differently there. Being really close to The Queen when she came in, it was pretty special."

Hotsy Totsy's effort helped contribute to the experience. Jamie Spencer dropped the filly out the back in the race down Ascot's 1-mile straight course and steadily guided her closer to the near side, eventually making a run closest to the stands. She finished 1 1/2 lengths back of Thanks Be.

"When she came out of the gate, she just reared up a little bit and got way back," Reeves said. "She couldn't get through the middle of the pack, there was 20-something horses. She ran really well to go around everybody and still get up for third."

Before her start at Ascot, Hotsy Totsy immediately showed talent in England for trainer Ed Walker. The daughter of Casamento finished third in the first start of her career, a 7-furlong maiden at Newbury April 12. She won against winners in her second start May 2 and won again 20 days later.

"We bought her in April before her second race," Reeves said. "She needed another race to get a handicap over there. She won that race, got the handicap and then we ran in the Sandringham.

"We were going to bring her here immediately but I said to Ed Walker and Christophe Clement, 'why can't we run at Ascot?' They said, 'that's a great idea.' We left her over there, ran at Ascot and then brought her over here."

Now the Irish-bred, British-raced filly is in the U.S. and will start for a trainer from France and owners from Georgia and New Jersey. Officially, Hotsy Totsy runs for Reeves Thoroughbred Racing and R. A. Hill Stable.

Originally purchased for \$5,971 as a weanling, Hotsy Totsy has breezed three times since coming to the U.S. Her most recent work Aug. 16 was her first in 19 days.

"She's training well. It took her a while to adapt to the dirt training but her works have been good," Clement said. "I thought she came back a touch sore from that second work on the grass. So, we passed on one and gave her a bit of time. She worked very well (Aug. 16) and looks well."

Hotsy Totsy made her debut on European soft ground, so Wednesday's rain shouldn't have an adverse effect on the filly. Joel Rosario will ride the 3-1 morning-line second choice from the outside post.

"I like her, she's a nice filly," Clement said. "On softer ground, you'd like to cover her up but she always showed good speed in England. I will leave it up to Rosario, see how she breaks."

Clement identified Hotsy Totsy as a potential purchase for Reeves after her first race through British bloodstock agent Stephen Hillen. Clement has picked up horses for Reeves recently, including City Man, 3-1 morning-line favorite in Friday's Funny Cide Stakes.

"I met them when I went over to the Arc de Triomphe a couple of years ago," Reeves said of the Clements. "I was actually shown around by Nicolas Clement, Christophe's brother. I had bought Spainburg, who Christophe had for a little while then I sent her back over there and Nicolas trained her. We got to know one another over the last couple of years."

Chad Brown sends out two for Klaravich Stables that figure to be Hotsy Totsy's toughest competition.

Catch A Bid is the 7-5 morning-line favorite after she was only defeated a neck by dead-heat Lake Placid victor Varenka in her last start. Irad Ortiz Jr. will be aboard the daughter of Real Solution who broke her maiden in her debut June 6 at Belmont Park.

Brown's other entrant New And Improved won when racing for the first time July 28. Javier Castellano rode both Brown entrants last time and ends up on the once-raced daughter of Cairo Prince today.

Peaceful, All Quality, Dalika and Xanthique complete the field. Ionic is expected to scratch and Varenka, ineligible after the Lake Placid, already scratched.

Queen of Beas is the lone entrant for the main track and is likely to be a heavy favorite if Wednesday's rain forces the Riskaverse off the grass.

## Tagg runner handles mud, dominates off-the-turf stakes

#### **BY BRANDON VALVO**

When rain forces races off the turf, Barclay Tagg isn't usually the type to keep his horses in the race, often electing to scratch and wait for another spot. The trainer considered such a move with Highland Sky Wednesday after morning downpours left the turf in a bog and forced the \$100,000 John's Call Stakes to the sloppy main track.

However, when three of the original seven entrants scratched, Tagg reconsidered.

"When it came off the turf, Mike (Lakow) called me up and said a lot of people are scratching and there's only going to be three or four horses. I thought, we'll stay in and have a good

shot," Tagg said of a conversation with NYRA's racing secretary. "But you have to talk to the owners and get everybody's OK on it, so there's a lot that goes into it. There's other races on the horizon that he could be saved for, but then you save for them and it comes up sloppy too sometimes. It's a guessing game to a great extent."

Tagg's best guess was to stay in the field and owners Bonner Young, Gerald McManis and Jerrie Stewart McManis agreed. Highland Sky would start in the featured race, moved from 1 5/8 miles to 1 1/4 miles, alongside Redicean, Red Knight and maintrack-only entrant Turco Bravo.

Highland Sky broke at the back of the foursome and got two smacks on his right shoulder from Manny Franco, aboard for his 11th consecutive start. Turco Bravo broke on top and led through the stretch the first time with 3-5 favorite Red Knight pressing the pace to his outside while Redicean dropped back to race alongside Highland Sky.

"I wasn't too happy he was stuck down on the inside because that looked a little slower I thought watch-

ing the other races," Tagg said.

Racing into the first turn, Highland Sky advanced to race just behind Turco Bravo and to the inside of Red Knight as Turco Bravo posted an opening quarter-mile of :23.81. Positions remained unchanged through a :48.46 half. Redicean put in a brief bid along the rail while his three rivals kept several paths to the outside, but dropped out of it entering the far turn.

Past 6 furlongs in 1:13.29, Turco Bravo began to tire. Red Knight edged closer under Jose Ortiz and put a head in front midway on the bend. Franco had a strong hold of Highland Sky on the favorite's heels and angled to the far outside. Franco pulled the stick into his left hand and gave Highland Sky two whacks, knocking the whip out of Ortiz's right hand in the process.

Straightening away in the 10 path, Highland Sky struck the lead. Franco checked over his right shoulder, then his left nearing the furlong marker, but found himself alone in the sea of slop. Highland Sky kicked away to win by 8 1/4 lengths in 2:04.32.

The win was Highland Sky's first since taking an optional claimer at Belmont Park June 24, 2018. Since then, he raced exclusively in turf graded stakes with a third in the Grade 2 Belmont Gold Cup Invitational his best finish. Despite the losing

streak, Tagg has been happy with Highland Sky and expected good results on the drop into a listed stakes.

"I thought everything was there that needed to be there if he could put it together," Tagg said. "Manny has the idea on him now. He's got to be controlled a little bit early. Sometimes he gets away and he fights the jock and it takes it all out of him. If he can be contained early without fighting with him, that's the whole key to him. Then he's got plenty left at the end.

"There wasn't anything else that long around," Tagg continued. "He's capable of going any dis-

tance, I think. I don't think 2 miles is too much for him or anything. It looked like a good spot, it wasn't a very big purse, but that keeps the real tough ones out of it, too. It looked like it would be a good chance to win a race."

The John's Call victory improved Highland Sky's record to 5-for-25 with \$724,494 earned. Tagg won the race for the third time (in 16 runnings), following Auguri's off-the-turf score in 2006 and Summer Patriot's win in 2008.

Highland Sky is part of a big group of stakes horses from Young's breeding program tracing to Highland Mills, the third dam of the John's Call winner. A foal of 1982, Highland Mills lost all five starts on the track, but produced stakes winners Miss Josh, Royal Mountain Inn, Highland Springs and Highland Crystal.

Bellera won the second scheduled race, the first actually run, by 5

lengths. The daughter of Bernardini improved again for Todd Pletcher in the 1 1/8-mile allowance after breaking her maiden July 6. Jose Ortiz rode the 3-year-old who led from the start.

After sporting his iconic yellow full-length poncho while on his pony throughout the rainy morning, D. Wayne Lukas sent out his second winner of the meet in the third. Second-time starter Shackleford's Joy lost a photo for the win but was elevated to first via disqualification due to a solid bump by initial winner Indian Cross just before the wire.

As horses entered the paddock for the sixth race, the skies around Sara-





the fifth and sixth races ended up being 68 minutes.

So Conflated won the seventh by 14 lengths for Jeremiah Englehart and Jose Ortiz, the jockey's third win of the day. China Rider came from last to win the eighth for Dave Cannizzo. Kendrick Carmouche orchestrated the filly's rally down the center of the track down the stretch.

John Velazquez won the ninth aboard Leaky Cup, who shipped in from South Florida for Antonio Sano. Running against New York-breds for the first time, the son of Central Banker set fast fractions and kept going strong down the stretch, winning by 5 1/2 lengths.

"They're doing a good job with all the rain, the track is very tight," Velazquez said. "It feels pretty good, just depends on if the horse likes it or not."

The Hall of Fame jockey noticed how the track had been playing due to the way tractors had pushed water off the surface.

"I've been watching the races all day and it seems like off the rail is a little bit better so that's why I made the decision," he said. "It's been hard to win on the rail so you have to make a decision playing the track."

er turn down the opportunity for a chance at win at the elite meet.

"Any win at Saratoga is a great win," said Hills. "San's The Shadow was my first winner at Saratoga. Kharafa, a New York-bred who won 13 races, won the West Point Stakes last year. He was a grass horse and he was 9 years old when he won the \$150,000 race with Dylan Davis."

The trainer found another Saratoga win – his first of the meet – when first-time starter Naked Avenger won the fifth.

Hills is based primarily out of Monmouth Park, with a small string at Saratoga. Naked Avenger, a 2-year-old New York-bred daughter of Congrats, races for the New York-based Headless Horseman Racing Stables and Tee N Jay Stable.


"I trained for (Headless Horseman Racing Stables) back in the day, maybe 10 years ago, but one of my longtime owners, Tee N Jay Stables – Tom Swales - has always been friendly with them," said Hills. "The only reason I came here was because she's a New York-bred. Since the breeder owns a piece of her and really wanted to have her eligible for breeders' awards. I have several New York-breds I've brought up here to run even though I'm based in Monmouth. She came up here a few days ago, schooled really

well. I'm not shocked. Her breezes were really good."

Naked Avenger raced fourth early in the 5 1/2-furlong maiden before crossing the wire 1 3/4 lengths ahead under Luis

"I was nervous because the speed had been holding, but she was ready," said Hills, who will add more distance for the filly's next start. "She's got a real long stride. Congrats horses can do anything but the way she was pulling in at the end, I don't think that will be a problem."

• During the 43-minute weather delay Naked Avenger skips home in the fifth. before the sixth, the jockeys came to the paddock, went back to the jocks room,

re-entered the paddock - one carrying an umbrella - mounted, dismounted and mounted again before the eight horses headed out to post. Spectators made use of the giveaway, waiting out the thunderstorms huddled under towels and in dry corners of the grandstand.

Ken McPeek was less worried about the wait in the paddock and more about the condition of the track, labeled sloppy and sealed, for Flute Maker.

"We had schooled him a several times, he had been over there repeatedly," said McPeek. "He's a real, calm, collected colt, good-mind on him. I was a little bit worried. The track sealed up good. I was pretty confident he would handle it well."

Flute Maker is out of the Pleasantly Perfect mare Perfect Flute, a daughter of 2001 Kentucky Oaks and Alabama winner Flute. McPeek bought the colt for \$35,000 at last year's Fasig-Tipton Kentucky July yearling sale.

"He's a big long-strided colt with good pedigree," said McPeek. "The second dam won the Kentucky Oaks, so the page is there. The next step is to take him to a stakes race somewhere and see how good he is. Probably the Iroquois at Churchill going two turns."



## Grade 1 winner Blue Prize wins Sunday stakes duel for Correas

It's not hard to tell the level at which a trainer is admired by his peers at the racetrack. Especially when those peers are the people the trainer just beat.

Ignacio Correas was that trainer after Blue Prize won Sunday's Summer Colony Stakes.

A hug from Sarah Arnold, a handshake from Tristan Barry among others and even sincere congratulations from Jack Sisterson and Mark O'Dwyer, the team responsible for Vexatious, who was run down by Blue Prize in the \$100,000 stakes.

Correas breathed a sigh of relief after Blue Prize got the better of Vexatious by a neck. The native of Argentina wasn't feeling as relaxed as Blue Prize traveled around the first turn in the 1 1/8-mile race.

"I guess he had a bump here on the first turn," Correas said of jockey Jose Ortiz on the way to the winner's circle. "He had to do it that way. She made up a lot of ground."

It wasn't a bump, but it might as well have been. Blue Prize's rival Breaking Bread carried the eventual winner out two paths going into the turn. The loss of forward momentum caused Ortiz to relegate the 3-5 favorite to last and made the generally difficult to agree with Argentinian-bred

mare to get even more rank.

Having ridden her before, Ortiz knew what buttons to push – or not push – and Blue Prize relaxed as she started her run down the backstretch. While the lost position around the turn wasn't in Ortiz's original plans, he stayed patient, instead of worrying aboard the heavy favorite who usually races much closer to the pace.

"Jose knows her, he won with her a couple of times," Correas said Friday before the race. "He knows what to do and will take care of that. It's up to him."

While Blue Prize raced at the rear of the field, Alberobello set strong fractions of :22.96 and :47.28. Vexatious traveled kindly in third, handling the dirt just fine in her first start over the surface in more than a year. Blue Prize moved up one spot from last, bounding along on the outside in sixth

As the three-eighths pole and bend for home loomed, Joel Rosario asked Vexatious to attack Alberobello. At the five-sixteenths pole, Vexatious took the lead while still traveling well, but Ortiz wasn't asleep at the wheel.

Blue Prize went from sixth to third in less than a half-furlong and Ortiz knew he just had one horse to beat.

Well out into the middle of the track, Blue Prize ranged up outside of Vexatious.

Ortiz went to his stick just as his mount switched over to the correct lead. Rosario started to ask Vexatious, who had a 1-length advantage at the top of the stretch. Blue Prize started to claw away at that margin and it was a good, old-fashioned duel from there on as the two fillies extended themselves to the finish.

Blue Prize stuck her blinkered head in front just a few strides before the wire. It was 14 1/2 lengths back to Alberobello in third.

"The trip wasn't like the way I expected, but she had the class," Correas said. "I'm happy she's back in the winner's circle. We'll keep working to see what we can do to go to the next level but she needed to come here for this win."

Although Blue Prize's early trouble was not self-inflicted, the 6-year-old mare has been a puzzle for Correas to figure out when it comes to what makes her tick.

"She's very tricky what you do with her. I thought I might take the blinkers off but she had run so good with them," Correas said. "We adjusted the blinkers a little for this race, it's tough to make big changes with her. We put blinkers on her with a hole in behind.

"Usually when she doesn't have nothing to chase, she loses focus. That's what we were looking to try to fix. These are the blinkers that we put on after the Spinster. Last time, I opened them a little bit more, now we went back to what they were. They made her run so well in the Breeders'

Cup. That's it, you can't overthink it. She has the talent."

Talent has never been a question with the mare brought to the U.S. by owner Merriebelle Stable after a win in Argentina's Group 1 Seleccion in October 2016. The daughter of Pure Prize went winless in her first five starts in America but won Churchill Downs' Grade 2 Falls City by 8 1/4 lengths to close out her first year in the U.S.

Blue Prize won four times in 2018, capped by a win in the Grade 1 Spinster at Keeneland before a fourth in the Breeders' Cup Distaff. After a second and two thids to start 2019, Correas targeted the Summer Colony to get Blue Prize back in the winner's circle rather than running her in this weekend's Grade 1 Personal Ensign.

"That was a very easy choice. I had no intention of going to Personal Ensign," Correas said. "If I wasn't coming here for this race, I wasn't going anywhere. The owners, managers, everybody trusts me and do what I think is good for her."

Just like on the racetrack, Correas and his team better understand how to handle Blue Prize at the barn after a few years getting to know each other.

"Now, she's getting better but she was pretty mean," Correas said. "Not mean, complicated, very complicated. But now with age, she has gotten better. We have worked a lot with her. "

Blue Prize shipped backed to Keeneland following the win and Correas plans on another run at the Spinster.

"That's home for her. I look forward to that."
