



with David Cannizzo

David Cannizzo grew up in a racing family and even though he excelled at lacrosse in high school and college, he always seemed destined for a career involving horses.

The 35-year-old trainer started walking horses for his father Ron at Finger Lakes at age 7, learning the game like most racetracker kids, before and after school, on weekends and holidays, vacations and any other time he was needed. Cannizzo eventually ventured away from Finger Lakes and worked for Dale Romans, Scott Lake and Bruce Levine before going out on his own in 2007.

Cannizzo, assisted by his wife Carolyn and bedded down in Mike Hushion's old barn inside Clare Court for the first time this summer, is 4-for-33 at the meet with three seconds and two thirds heading into today's Saratoga Showcase Day card.

Asked by The Special's Tom Law to identify the best member of his Saratoga string Wednesday morning, Cannizzo played diplomat. "It's pretty hard to say who is the actual best," he said. "We've got a few nice horses, let's just go through them."

Royal Inheritance: Joseph Bulger's 3-year-old New York-bred daughter of Regal Ransom cost \$32,000 at last year's Fasig-Tipton Midlantic 2-year-olds sale. She's won four of five, including 6-furlong allowance here Aug. 6. "We gave her the right amount of time after that sale, she had some shins and stuff, let her come around and she hasn't let us down. She's pointing to the Prioress."

Hookup: Owned by Cannizzo and Secure Investments, 3-year-old son of Union Rags is half-brother to graded stakes winners American Freedom and Gotcha Gold won first time out at Aqueduct in November then finished eighth in Grade 2 Remsen. Off until Aug. 19, he returned with third going 9 furlongs. "He came out of the Remsen and we gave him time to mature, the whole winter off. He made his first start the other day, had a brutal trip, a ton of trouble, probably was much the best. He's got a very bright future. One of the better



3-year-olds I would say in the crop. He's got to get some more maturity and he's going to be a serious animal. I wanted to give him an easy race off the eight-month layoff. He ran big. Go back and watch the replay, it was an awful trip. He's the real deal, probably the best horse in the barn."

Hardened: Cannizzo's and Secure Investment's 3-year-old Hard Spun colt broke his maiden at 5 1/2 furlongs on the turf Aug. 4 off more than nine-month layoff. "Turf horse, I got like one start into him in November, gave him the winter off. Big heavy horse, took me a long time to get him ready. He ran dynamite here. He'll either run in an a-other than at the end of the meet or a straight 3-year-old stake at Belmont (\$100,000 Allied Forces Sept. 10)."

Bellamy Way: A competitor in the state-bred stakes ranks at 2, 3, 4 and 5, Two Tone Farm's son of Bellamy Road finished seventh in Grade 3 Excelsior at Aqueduct, won an open allowance at Belmont and finished fourth in allowance won by Tom's d'Etat here July 27. "He's a fan favorite, been there, done that. He's won his share of races. We might be looking for a start toward Belmont. We ran him here in the open two other than, it was a tough spot, he didn't care for the surface, a heavy, wet, drying out track. He's a good horse with a big family."

Fox Rules: Ivery Sisters Racing's 8-yearold Roman Ruler gelding goes in today's \$150,000 West Point. A frontrunner in many of his starts, including a win three back at Belmont May 17, he's expected to rate today. "We claimed him for 40. I'd been waiting to try and buy him for two years for a rabbit for a horse like Bellamy Way. Couldn't get a deal done, Michelle Nevin took over the training for Mike Ferraro and put him in for 40. I was like, 'you're coming home with me.' He's done everything right since we've had him."

Black Tide: Also owned by Ivery Sisters. 5-year-old Hold Me Back gelding opened 11-length lead in July 30 allowance and hung on to win. He's expected to do the same in today's West Point. "There's no one that will be near him. He'll be 10, 15 in front. Very interesting horse. I'd watched him run for a few years, he'd hang going short, hang going short, get in trouble. I said, 'man, he's all turf horse, we're going to claim him.' Claimed him from Michelle Nevin, thought he's a funny horse and planned to just give him one race on the dirt going long. Run him, David Jacobson claimed him. I claimed him for the turf, I know Dave, I know the horse doesn't really care for the dirt and figured we'd get him back for cheaper. We did, so we made \$10,000 there on the re-purchase. Then I decided to sit on him. It was toward the middle to end of winter, so there wasn't any point to send him to the farm so we kept him in training. I decided I'd stretch this horse out and let him do what he wants to do, blinkers and to the lead. We never looked back."

Battle Midway: Claimed from Nick Zito for \$16,000 last summer at Saratoga, 5-year-old by Quality Road has won four of 15 for new connections including the More To Tell Stakes on Aqueduct's Claiming Championship Series in April. "He's turned out to be an amazing claim and has made about \$200,000 for us.

Done nothing wrong and he's up there as one of the best claims I've made. He's still knocking. He was second to Rachel Alexandra's brother (Fayeq), who's in the Travers. He just keeps coming. I'm going to main track only him later in the meet, and if not there's something at Parx at the end of September."

Momameamaria: Five-year-old mare owned by Two Tone Farm finished second in the 2016 Shine Again and fourth this year. "Very nice filly. Pleasure to be around, going to be a great broodmare. I'm trying to get that one stakes win somewhere for her pedigree. Gives us everything. Sort of a funny horse, she's got her quirks about her, real nervous. We train her a little different than the other horses and it's always worked out. We keep her here in Clare Court, long walks before she goes to the track, long walks home, just let her do her own thing, keep her happy and quiet. She's nervous so we're just trying to keep the stress level down."

Rachel's Temper: Newtown Anner Stud's 6-year-old daughter of Flatter won last year's Summer Colony and finished fourth in same race here Aug. 20. She's won six times and earned \$387,755. "She ran through her conditions, I lost her, we bought her back. Came back off a long layoff the other day, needed the race, hung in the Summer Colony. On the mend back and going the right direction."

Rectify: Claimed for Mike Repole for \$40,000 here July 30. Finished last in Thursday's eighth race, an \$85,000 New York-bred allowance that attracted a strong field. "Solid New York-bred that I claimed off Charlie Baker the other day. (Thursday's race was a) solid, solid field that's like a stakes race. It's like a Grade 3 how tough it came up. He's a good competitor. I've worked for Mike for years, from Scott Lake to Bruce Levine to on my own. Great guy, great operation, wants to do good and wants you to excel."

Chanel's Legacy: Multiple stakes winner in Midwest and Southwest was recently transferred to Cannizzo by Poindexter Thoroughbreds. Sixth in Grade 1 Test Aug. 5, 3-year-old lowa-bred daughter of Dominus has five wins in 13 starts. "She's a solid filly that beat up

on a lot of horses out west in Oklahoma and Arkansas."


Ego: Allen Poindexter spent \$20,000 last year for 2-year-old son of Quality Road. He's breezed three times at Saratoga, including 3 furlongs in :38.09 from the gate Aug. 14. "He's a very big 2-year-old. Probably more like a 3-year-old but should probably make his first start the second or third week of Belmont. We'll get a race into him, see where we are."

Classic Pursuit: Poindexter homebred 2-year-old by Street Sense shows four breezes at Saratoga, including a gate work Aug. 14 and a 5-furlong move in 1:02.67 on the main track Tuesday. "He's a half to Joe Sharp's good horse Cool Arrow that won the Springboard Mile and a couple other stakes. He could run here the last week of the meet."

Dannie's Deceiver: Z R J Stable's 5-year-old by Quality Road finished fourth in Grade 1 Forego and sixth in Grade 1 Vosburgh last year. Three-time winner and \$274,074 earner suffered suspensory injury and was vanned off in allowance race last November at Aqueduct. He's not with the string but never far from Cannizzo's thoughts. "He means everything to me. It ruined me the day he got hurt, it hurt me real bad. We've done everything with him, stem cell, PRP, he spent some time at Mike Schrader's farm. If he makes it back fine, if not, we'll figure something out. He'll be with me until the time comes. He's one of the five horses that you truly can't let go and be without."

Little Bear Cat: Multiple stakes-placed 4-year-old Bluegrass Cat filly is on the sidelines after going 1-3-2 in seven starts this spring, including a second in the Xtra Heat Stakes. Carolyn: "That's my baby." David: "We bought her as a yearling for \$8,000. She's the first yearling that we bought together. She won a two-otherthan for \$40,000 and she deserved a break. I squeezed her a lot, she doesn't have the most talent, but she gives you everything she's got. She went through all her New York-bred conditions. She's my daughter's horse."

Amigo: The barn's ice-tea drinking 12-year-old pony lounged in his round pen just outside the shedrow Wednesday but was back in action with Carolyn aboard Thursday morning near Clare Court. David: "We purchased him this winter, after our old pony retired, from a client of mine out of Ocala, Secure Investments. He's the mascot, gets everybody there and to. He's the lifeguard of the pool. He's like a big dog." Carolyn: "He's got some life. He's a little spoiled. ... He almost bucked me off on the turf course a week ago, caused a massive scene. Then he had a week off because I was so sore I couldn't get on him. Today's the first day I've been back on him."



Hometown Horse Pride

Stepwise Farm owners rooting for homebred Twisted Tom

Tucked down a winding private driveway along Fitch Road, just a few miles from Saratoga Race Course, is Dr. Bill Wilmot's and Dr. Joan Taylor's Stepwise Farm. The gorgeous property spans for over 100 acres with a cream colored barn sitting at the top of the hill at the end of the driveway.

A lone chestnut mare occupies a stall in the barn, giving a whinny as the barn door slides open.

"Used to have a busy equine practice, from '81 to '90 was the step-

wise process of having a couple kids, having a vet practice and developing the farm, 1990s was when the first horses arrived," Wilmot said this week. "Now we're on the other end of the spectrum. We're looking to slow down and we've been gradually downsizing. At the height of our operation we had about a dozen mares, now we're down to three."

Standing in the stall in the barn at



the top of the hill is Tiffany Twisted, mother of Twisted Tom and the favorite for today's \$250,000 Albany Stakes for New York-bred 3-year-olds.

"At the moment she's by herself because the other mares haven't come back from Kentucky," said Wilmot, a longtime advocate for the state's breeding program and former member of the New York Thoroughbred Breeders board of directors. "She's very happy, she's kind of a loner really. Her mother was the same way. She's living the life right now."

Stepwise bred and raced Tiffany Twisted after purchasing her dam, the Seattle Slew mare Miss Turlington, at the 1994 Keeneland November breeding stock sale for \$100,000. She has produced 16 foals since then, including the daughter of Thunder Gulch.

"Tiffany was named after that Eagles song Hotel California, 'her mind is Tiffany-twisted, she's got the Mercedes Benz,' "Wilmot said. "We ended up naming her well, not totally

knowing that. The way that we came up with the name is that Thunder Gulch made us think of a storm or a tornado, perhaps a twister.

"Her dam is Miss Turlington, she of course was named after the famous model. We thought a high-end lady like that would wear a bunch of goods from Tiffany's and it all just came together. Tiffany the mare has a very high opinion of herself. She's aloof and wants what she wants and Tiffany is the perfect name for her."

Wilmot and Taylor, a current member of the NYTB board, campaigned the mare through a short career before retiring her to the broodmare ranks at Stepwise.

"If you look at her produce record we've mostly bred to Storm Cat-line stallions," said Wilmot. "Tiffany won going a mile and three-eighths and a mile and a quarter, and we've always looked to put speed in the pedigree."


Tiffany Twisted is the dam of six starters – all winners – from six sires. Wilmot sent her to Creative Cause in her last mating, producing a big chestnut foal on April Fool's Day in 2014.


"We'd followed Creative Cause as a racehorse and then he retired to Airdrie so we went to see him," said Wilmot. "We really liked him; big, rangy handsome horse. His mother was real hickory, tough stakes winner.

"The irony is we perhaps overshot the mark. Twisted Tom is a big horse. People say, 'Oh he's too big, he'll take a long time to come around.' That's not true. Everyone wants instant gratification."

Twisted Tom was consigned twice as a yearling – in the Fasig-Tipton Saratoga New York-bred and Kentucky October yearling sales – bringing final bids of \$22,000 and failing to sell each time. Wilmot sent the colt to Niall Brennan with the intention



of racing him but opted for the OBS April 2-year-old in training sale after impressing in training.

"He breezed in 10 and 3. They want 10 and 1. He's big, he's not one of those little rabbits that just hops out of there," said Wilmot. "A few people liked him and he made a few short lists.

"People would come by in the morning to see him and he's a big, good feeling colt. He would come out in the morning that week after he breezed and he was really feeling good and would stand up on his hind legs. That removed him from the short lists. We didn't want three RNAs on him because people would think he had tuberculosis or something."

He was scratched from the sale, but sold privately to George Weaver's owner Tom Brockley.

Twisted Tom was gelded before his debut at Saratoga last summer, finishing fourth in an off-the-turf race for state-breds at 7 furlongs. He broke his maiden in his next start going 1 mile on the grass at Belmont Park in September.

"In New York, these horses break their maiden and all the agents come banging the door down," said Wilmot.

Agent Steve Young did just that, organizing a deal between Brockley, Cobra Farm and R R Partners that sent the gelding to Chad Brown's barn before his next start.

Twisted Tom debuted for his new connections in late November at Aqueduct and finished sixth in a state-bred allowance on the grass. He bounced back, winning three straight in an allowance on Aqueduct's inner dirt in January followed by the Private Terms and Frederico Tesio at Laurel Park in the spring.

Head of Plains Partners joined the ownership just before the gelding's sixth in the Grade 1 Belmont Stakes.

"Our fingers were crossed for the Fitch Road Triple Crown," said Wilmot, whose farm neighbors McMahon of Saratoga Thoroughbreds, birthplace of Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner Funny Cide.

Twisted Tom didn't secure another classic win for the Fitch Road folks, clipping heels early and finishing sixth, 27 3/4 lengths behind Tapwrit. He rebounded with a victory in the New York Derby at Finger Lakes July 22 and is 8/5 on the morning line for the 1 1/8 mile Albany.

"We're very happy. It's a feeling of one of your kids doing well," said Wilmot. "We're a small breeder so to have a horse like this makes you feel like maybe we know what we're doing after all.

"A big, outgoing horse with a good, positive attitude. Kind of always asked, 'what's up now? What are we going to do next?' You can see that in his racing and in his works. He's a good workhorse. But there's some other nice horses in there certainly. This is a big test for him."

Twisted Tom faces six others in the Albany – Dynamax Prime, D'yer Mak'er, Can You Diggit, Broken Engagement, Pat On The Back and Minsky Moment.

Sunset Ridge tops Fleet Indian

The first of six stakes on the Saratoga Showcase card is the \$200,000 Fleet Indian for 3-year-old fillies going 9 furlongs on the main track. A field of five entered and Chad Brown sends out the favorite in 1-5 choice Sunset Ridge.


Bred and owned by Alpha Delta Stables, the daughter of Algorithms comes off a 16 3/4-length victory going 7 furlongs Aug. 9.

Rudy Rodgriguez trainee Bonita Bianca may not be the morning line favorite at 4-1, but she definitely tops the standings at his barn.

"She's been special to us," said Rodriguez. "We won the New York Oaks at Finger Lakes the other day. She's been good to us. She's very easy, very sweet. Doesn't do anything wrong, and just a good filly to be around."

Completing the field are Five Each Way, Danielle's Pride and Somekindasexy.

Family Time

Flipcup bids for turf-stakes upset for Penney family, Wachtel, Mott

BY SHAYNA TILLER

MaryAnn Penney and her daughter Townsend darted down Bill Mott's shedrow toward a bay face bobbing up and down over the stall gate.

"Hey baby, you ready to play?" Penney said. "You have a little itch? You want me to scratch that, honey?"

A homebred for MaryAnn and Shirl Penney's Team Penney Racing, Flipcup is much more than just a racehorse running in today's \$150,000 Yaddo Stakes for New York-bred fillies and mares on the turf.

The Penneys live just outside the Saratoga Race Course grounds on Fifth Avenue, and visit their 6-year-old mare as much as possible.

YADDO STAKES PREVIEW

"Do you remember life before Flipcup?" Penney asked her daughter, who responded with a headshake. "She's always been sweet. After a stakes race our kids can go right in there and play with her and she's so gentle with them. She begs for food. She knows when she's coming because she starts bobbing her head and getting excited."

The bay mare nibbled on strands of Townsend's blonde hair as her mom obliged with a snack.

"We spend a lot of time with her," said Penney. "She grew up around my girls, we come over after school.

When we're in the paddock she looks at us and we talk to her like, 'It's game day, honey.' "

Team Penney purchased Flipcup's dam Dream Affair in foal to Milwaukee Brew from the 2007 OBS winter mixed sale. Happy with the result of her first colt, they bred her back to produce Flipcup in 2011.

"What we started off doing was Continued On Page 18

our breeding operation offset our losses on the track, but we got lucky with Flip because she didn't bring in what we wanted so we decided to keep her," said Penney. "We were preparing for the 2-year-old sale and our developer down in Ocala, Kenny Lejeune says, 'this filly can run.' We decided to keep her.

"The hard part is finding a good name. Beer Pong was taken. We liked Hops, but they said no to Hops. So it was our third choice. I'm from West Virginia, I'm a Mountaineer fan so I've played many flip cup games at a tailgating parties. It's been a very well received name."

The filly began her career with Brian Lynch, winning her first two races at Woodbine. She was sent to George Weaver late in her 2-year-old season, just before winning the East View Stakes at Aqueduct.

"She's an interesting mix because she's New York-bred but she's by a Canadian sire," said Penney. "We selected that sire because we knew that would open up opportunities for her. It's been great that we've been able to qualify for restricted races there and restricted races here."

Adam Wachtel's Wachtel Stable joined the ownership shortly into her 3-year-old year and handed training over to Mott. Her multiple graded stakes-winning career spans 30 starts, with seven

wins, six seconds and seven thirds over three surfaces and \$623,482 in earnings.

"She's won open races but the opportunities that we've gotten because of the Ontario sire and New York-bred races has been great," said Penney. "We've been trying to get this turf win because she's won graded stakes on synthetic, she's won stakes on dirt and we'd love to get a stakes win on the turf so her babies will be so versatile and sell well."

Flipcup comes into the 1 1/16-mile Yaddo off a close second in the Victoriana Stakes over Woodbine's turf course July 30.

"A plastic bag flew onto the turf, she had to jump over it, switch leads, switch leads back right on the turn and it cost her the race," said Penney. "So we're hoping a plastic bag falls in front of someone else tomorrow.

"For years she was always on the board and last year we pulled her off the surface that she loves which is the synthetic. They used to call her the Poly-monster. We've pulled her off in order to get this turf win but she likes the turf here. She's gotten a yielding turf every time, the plastic bag was thrown in front of her, and I think she'll give the people looking for longshots a lot of money in their pocket."

Regardless of the outcome, Team Penney plans to have Flipcup around for a very long time.

"We're not selling her, she's a member of our family," said Penney. "That's the big problem when you have a horse that's so sweet that you visit every day, you become really attached to them. It becomes not so much of a business adventure, it becomes your family. We can't sell her, we have to breed her and she'll be with us for a very long time."

Flipcup is 10-1 on the early line for the Yaddo with John Velazquez named to ride.

Chad Brown sends out the 7-5 favorite Fourstar Crook, winner of the Grade 3 Dr. James Penny Me-

morial at Parx Racing July 4. She won last year's Yaddo, is in the midst of an eight-race win streak and hasn't lost in New York-bred company since late July 2015 at Saratoga.

The field also includes Bar Of Gold, Feeling Bossy, First Charmer, Jet Majesty, Ack Naughty, Barrel Of Dreams, Freudie Anne and main track only entrant Literata.

Speed in West Point

A field of 10 is entered for the accompanying West Point Stakes going the same distance on the inner turf and the race is expected to feature a quick early pace.

Several of the race's contenders have shown early or tactical speed - 2014 and '16 West Point winner King Kreesa, multiple stakes winner Macagone, recent Belmont allowance winner Changewilldoyagood and Fox Rules. And then comes Black Tide.

Trained by David Cannizzo for owner Ivery Sisters Racing - the same connections of Fox Rules - Black Tide opened up an 11-length lead early in a July 30 open-company allowance and hung on to win by 1 1/4 lengths. Cannizzo makes no bones about how the West Point will shape up.

"You can't slow him down, you've got to let him do his thing," he said of the 5-year-old Hold Me Back gelding. "There's no one that will be near him. He'll be 10, 15 in front."

Cannizzo expects Black Tide on the lead and Fox Rules, who shows plenty of 1s on his past performance lines, to

Too quick of an early pace might set it up for 2-1 favorite Offering Plan, who exits a fifth against open company in the Forbidden Apple at Belmont July 15 for Chad Brown. He defeated King Kreesa by a length two starts back in the Kingston in his first start in more than eight months.

Get Jets, second in the Forbidden Apple and 2-for-4 on the grass for trainer Tony Dutrow and his Team D partnership, is the 3-1 second choice. Kharafa, third in the 2013 West Point and second last year, All Is Number and main track only entrant Royal Posse complete the field.

All Dressed Up

While Todd Pletcher and Chad Brown duel for the training title at Saratoga Race Course, Jeremiah Englehart and his father Chris are in a battle of their own at Finger Lakes in the meet that runs through the end of November.

Jeremiah Englehart spends much of his time at his Finger Lakes base, where he's won 66 races to his father's 61 through Thursday, but his focus is sure to be on Saratoga today with two promising juveniles entered in stakes on the Saratoga Showcase card for New York-breds. The first comes in the fifth when Gold Square's impressive maiden winner Aveenu Malcainu starts in the \$200,000 Funny Cide Stakes going 6 1/2 furlongs.

"I thought this might be a little bit of a softer spot (than the Hopeful), but in looking at the PPs there's a couple horses in there, including the horse that ran second to us first time," Englehart said of Smokin Platinum, who will try to turn the tables on Aveenu Malcainu. "It's not going to be an easy spot, we're definitely going to have to run back to our last race, and probably a little bit better."

FUNNY CIDE & SEEKING THE ANTE PREVIEWS

While some of his rivals may struggle with the added distance, Englehart feels the stretch-out will only help the grand looking son of Into Mischief who broke his maiden at 5 1/2 furlongs.

"The extra furlong is definitely going to help this horse; he'll want to go two turns, that classic distance," Englehart said. "He's a big horse and once he gets going he really moves. He was training well but he still acted like a horse that he didn't really know what he was doing yet. I thought if anything was going to hurt him it would be 5 1/2."

Englehart and Travis Durr selected six 2-year-olds from sales this year for Al Gold's Gold Square, including Aveenu Malcainu for \$150,000. He was the only horse the team bought out of the OBS April 2-year-olds in training sale.

"Al likes to buy the 2-year-olds," Englehart said. "I gave him a short list of Travis and I, horses that we really liked. He had horses that he liked. From there, we kind of narrowed it down, we missed out

on some we really liked but we got a good group of horses.

"Travis made the comment that (Aveenu Malcainu) looked just liked Goldencents and he broke Goldencents (at Webb Carroll Training Center in Saint Matthews, S.C.), so that weighed a lot going into the decision to buy the horse. Not everyone liked his gallop out, to me he just looked like a real green horse that wasn't ready yet. The lightbulb, it's still pretty dim, but he's getting ready to shine I think."

Todd Pletcher's What A Catch is the 8/5 favorite for the Funny Cide after a win in the July 15 Rockville Centre Stakes at Belmont Park, where he defeated foes he will face again today in Morning Breez and stablemate Analyze The Odds. Others in the Funny Cide field are Mr. Pete, who broke his maiden the same day as the Rockville Centre for Jim Ryerson, and Inalienable Rights, who broke his maiden the next day for Mark Hennig. Alien Invasion broke his maiden in an off-the-turf race July 24 and joins Aveenu Malcainu as the only members

of the field with a win locally.

Englehart, who also sends out first-time starter Sandlot Star in the fourth race for maiden New York-bred 2-year-olds, is represented in the day's other juvenile stakes with I Still Miss You in the \$200,000 Seeking The Ante for fillies. I Still Miss You is the 8/5 favorite for the 6 1/2-furlong stakes.

After an impressive score against open company in the Astoria Stakes during Belmont Stakes week, the daughter of Majestic Warrior was second to Pure Silver in New York-bred company last time in the Lynbrook Stakes. At the time the loss was a disappointment, but Pure Silver came back with a 9 1/2-length score in the Grade 2 Adirondack Aug. 12.

"Running against Pure Silver, maybe Javier (Castellano) and I both thought that we had the better horse," Englehart said. "But looking at what Pure Silver has done in that race and since then, you got to really tip your cap to her, I think we've run against a really nice filly. Although it was a little disappointing not winning last time, I learned a lot from that race."

I Still Miss You showed her precocity and speed winning a maiden in her first start May 11 at Belmont.

"She's not a real big filly, she's got a real strong motor, a real powerful hind-end," Englehart said of the filly owned by Gold Star Racing Stable, Matthew Hand and Brian McKenzie. "She's a real smart horse, she has matured faster than a lot of horses I've seen as 2-year-olds. That's her biggest attribute. She can handle anything that goes on during a race whether it's going to the lead or sitting off it."

Englehart claimed the dam of I Still Miss You for \$8,000 and subsequently won eight races for Gold Star Racing Stable with Lion's Terms. The Lion Heart mare's first foal is I Still Miss You.

"It's actually a pretty cool story, she was named after one of the owner's best friends who committed suicide the night I claimed Lion's Terms," Englehart said. "So, that's been kind of a neat little story, a lot of emotion there."

Others entered in the Seeking The Ante are Saratoga maiden winners Trouble For Skylar and Pauseforthecause and California shippers Cause We Are Loyal and Newport Breeze. One Last Cast, Beaux Arts, Miss Mystique and Tudox Lifting Off complete the field.



Successful Mission

Diplomat, Newmans win Gr. 1 jump stakes

Rich Newman watched Thursday's Grade 1 New York Turf Writers Cup steeplechase unfold, and saw Diplomat – the horse he co-owns with his brother Adam – drafting into position on the final turn.

"He's got a lot of business to do," Rich said to himself, his family, the world.

Diplomat, a \$40,000 claim by the Newmans at Saratoga Race Course in 2015, closed the deal from there – rallying outside favorite Modem in the final quarter-mile and winning by 3 lengths to give the Newman family the biggest win in more than 40 years in racing. Trained by Kate Dalton and ridden by her husband Bernie, the winner collected his sixth victory over jumps and pushed his career hurdle earnings to \$276,172. Modem stayed for second, ahead of All The Way Jose in third after 2 3/8 miles in 4:29.90.

Donald Newman started it all in 1976 when he and partner Buddy Mayo launched May-Don Stable with trainer Alan Marcus. Newman worked in the garment district in Manhattan, made enough money to need a tax shelter and got into racing. Despite building the stable to 30 horses and giving some of the bigger-name claiming outfits a run for the New York owners' title by races-won, May-Don was not a ringing success.

"They bought what may have been the slowest horse in all of America," said Adam Newman, who dug up the name Millicent Turle which (unsurpisingly) does not show up in Equibase. No matter, the Newmans called her Millicent Turtle and she was not successful. She was Donald Newman's first horse, however, and she led to stakes winners Tricky Zippy and Absatootly, some broodmares, three-time Saratoga winner Barrel Of Dreams and now Diplomat.

"My dad always enjoyed racing, but he was a city guy," said Adam Newman. "He was enough of a fan to go along with the partnership idea and they had some horses. From that, he never lost his passion. The partners got out, he stuck with it, made some adjustments through the years, started breeding a few and found horsemen to work with. He never bailed on it."

He also passed that interest on to his family, which is carrying on Newman Racing (with flat horses including two wins at this meet). The stee-

plechase idea, called Flying Elvis Stable and consisting of Adam and Rich, came to be in 2015 with the claim of Diplomat.

"My dad's been gone a couple years now, and we lost my older brother Matthew at Christmas time," said Adam. "Newman Racing is the whole family, but Rich and I do the jumpers. We've always had an interest in it, since seeing it up here a long time ago."

The brothers can pinpoint the moment – and even the horse – when jump racing became something they followed.

"Coconut Creek," said Rich Newman, of an Irish-bred hurdler who won at Saratoga in 1980 for trainer Barbara McWade. "He was getting saddled under one of the trees out back and he was just gorgeous. We went to the window and cashed a pretty big ticket on him."

And they've been fans ever since, watching the races in New York, attending a few steeplechase meets around the country and – two years ago – claiming Diplomat from steeplechase trainer Jimmy Day. The son of Kitten's Joy won that day and went back to Charlton Baker's barn at Saratoga.

"We were thinking useful horse, have some fun, see what might happen," said Adam. "He looked like he was worth the money. We presented it to the rest of the family and said, 'This is fun, but finan-

cially it makes no sense.' They really weren't interested, so the jumpers are just the two of us."

Thursday, the idea looked as sensible as car insurance. Diplomat won a Grade 1 at Saratoga (worth \$90,000 to the winner) and the brothers, their mother Sarah and others were sipping champagne in the Saratoga Room.

"Horse-racing wise, there's never been anything better," Adam said. "We may never, ever get another moment like this again, but it's worth it. I've never been in this room before."

Two starts after that 2015 claim, Diplomat won a stakes in Virginia but lost his next six starts through May 2017. He prepped for Saratoga with a flat start at Parx Racing July 8. Dalton put blinkers on the 8-year-old, just to help sharpen him a little. He finished second at 42-1 and was subsequently elevated to first due to a medication positive. Again in blinkers, Diplomat finished third in the 2 1/16-mile A.P. Smithwick here July 27. He threatened exiting the turn but flattened out

late and finished almost 17 lengths behind winner Swansea Mile. The Camden, S.C.-based Daltons went back to their new summer base at New Jersey's Westhampton Training Center and thought about the blinkers in advance of the Turf Writers.

"We were hemming and hawing blinkers on, blinkers off, blinkers on, blinkers off - and finally Bernie and I decided on Monday that we should definitely take them off," said Kate. "It sort of seemed like there was going to be a lot of pace in the race to run at and we were thinking we wanted to sit him in a little bit more this time and try to come with a run.

"Bernie said he was hard on the bridle the whole way (in the Smithwick). It seemed like we'd shaken him up and we could go back to how we used to ride him and see what happened."

Without blinkers Thursday, Diplomat dropped off the early pace of Alcazar de Maram, and found a cozy spot ninth of 10. He was eighth leaving the final fence, but scything through traffic while following Modem around the final turn. Diplomat, carrying 18 pounds less than the favorite, won the scrap at the top of the stretch and pulled away to win for the ninth time (flat and jump) in a career that began with Dermot Weld in Ireland in 2011.

and I said, 'Look we're going further, all these horses are going to back up, just angle out going to the last, don't get stopped,' " said Bernie Dalton, a longtime exercise rider for Kiaran

McLaughlin in New York and Dubai years ago. "Every time I would show him light, he would come on the bridle, I'd be in behind and I'm like, 'Do I have anything left?' He would come back on the bridle and I would say 'OK, you got them, just relax and save the gas for the end."

Back in the clubhouse, Kate Dalton watched it all unfold and thought about her hard-trying horse.

"It's so emotional, the work you put into it," she said. "I don't know what it feels like to win other Grade 1s but to win one here is just amazing. I'm not an emotional person so for me to say it's emotional, it's emotional. It's all for the horses, they know when they do well and he's been doing well lately. He always tries, no matter what and things just haven't worked out for him until now. He got a nice weight, the right setup, the right ground . . . he's a genuine little horse. He tries no matter where we take him. He's a real gem of a horse and deserved something like this."

Throat surgery pays off for Defiant Honor

When last seen on the racetrack, Defiant Honor ran sixth behind Proctor's Ledge in the Grade 3 Lake George Stakes on Opening Day. She raced close to the pace that day and threatened to pass horses along the rail in the stretch. With a furlong to run, she was just a half-length off the lead, but Defiant Honor was one paced in the final sixteenth and was beaten 5 1/4 lengths.

Trainer Jimmy Toner discovered after the race that Defiant Honor suffered from a displaced epiglottis, a muscle in the throat. He sent Defiant Honor to have a procedure to correct the issue. She handled the surgery well and stayed on track for Thursday's Riskaverse Stakes.

"They call it a myectomy. They cut the muscles in the throat because she entrapped," Toner said. "The epiglottis and the soft palate, they get stuck and it shuts off their wind.

"It's not really a serious surgery to say that they miss any time. It's just an incision in the throat,

that's all it is. It heals up in a week or 10 days and you don't miss any training. It's a very simple procedure."

Able to breathe freely, Defiant Honor raced to her full potential in Thursday's \$100,000 Riskaverse Stakes. After stalking the pace, she won the 1-mile race by a half-length over Fizzy Friday.

Breaking from post 11, Jose Lezcano guided Defiant Honor to the front of the pack and crossed over to the hedge, but rival Cherry Lodge sprinted past her heading to the first turn. Cherry Lodge raced past the quarter-mile in :23.67 while Defiant Honor stalked 5 lengths behind.

Lezcano rode Defiant Honor two starts back when she won a Belmont allowance by a length. He used his experience from that race to place Defiant Honor in a comfortable position in the Riskaverse.

"The thing with her is she likes to be right there," Lezcano said. "She doesn't like to be too far back or she gets a little tense. We were in a great spot."

John Velazquez reined in Cherry Lodge up the backstretch and slowed the half to :49.15. As the pace slowed, her rivals closed in. Lezcano and De-

fiant Honor were just 2 lengths behind at the half.

Racing around the final turn, Lezcano gave Defiant Honor a tap on her right shoulder and she drew on even terms with Cherry Lodge past 6 furlongs in 1:13.49. He gave her another smack on the shoulder turning for home, this one more aggressive, and shook up the reins. Defiant Honor sped away to lead by 1 1/2 with a furlong to run.

"I felt the whole way I had a lot of horse," Lezcano said. "At the half-mile I asked a little bit to see what I've got and she's gone really easy. At the quarter-pole, not even really asking, she was ready to go and doing it really easily."

Despite wandering out in the final sixteenth

under right-handed urging, Defiant Honor held off the charge of Fizzy Friday to win the Riskaverse in 1:35.67. Bernadiva beat Chubby Star in a photo for third.

The Riskaverse is Defiant Honor's first stakes victory. The 3-year-old daughter of Speightstown won for the first time in her second start at Belmont last October, finished second in the Grade 3 Jimmy Durante at Del Mar last November (which featured the added obstacle of debris on the racetrack), and won her seasonal debut at Belmont June 21 before her two Saratoga runs. Defiant Honor is 3-for-6 with earnings of \$172,015.

"I've had high hopes for the filly," Toner said. "Last year I sent her to Del Mar and it was a freaky thing that happened out there. There were foam pads all over the racetrack. It was crazy. She came out of that good

and she came back good this year. I ran her here in the Lake George and she displaced that day, so we did the surgery on her. I do think she's a quality filly and things went well for her today."

John Phillips bred Defiant Honor with Hank and Lynn Snowden and races her with his Phillips Racing Partnership and Pam Gartin. Although Phillips couldn't attend the Riskaverse because he was home in Kentucky getting his kids off to college, his sister Dianne and her husband Roger Albrecht were happy to represent the family in the winner's circle.

"We just can't get here enough," Roger Albrecht said. "It's 600 miles. We're on our way to Canada for a fishing trip and we said, 'it's on our way, we can do that.' It's always more fun when you win. I don't know if I can explain it any better than that. You have to be humble about that."



T Loves A Fight scores Saratoga win for Hoffman, Nevin

Naming horses after family members can be a risky proposition. Luckily for Stewart Hoffman, he chose the right horse in T Loves A Fight.

The 3-year-old Girolamo gelding conquered his elder rivals in Thursday's eighth race at Saratoga Race Course, a stakes-quality New York-bred allowance at 6 1/2 furlongs on the main track.

"That's the person he's named after," Hoffman said as he pointed to Teresa Symansky. "We named a horse Our Cousin Dick and then we wanted to name a horse after our cousin Dick's wife Teresa, it turns out to be a colt. We say, 'we want to name him after you but it's a male.'

"She said, 'well when I was younger, all my friends called me T, I'm Irish, I love to fight. T Loves A Fight."

T Loves A Fight's win was the second for the team of Nevin and Hoffman Thoroughbreds. Mike Hushion, who retired after the Belmont meet ended, trained T Loves A Fight and others for the owner.

"I loved Mike Hushion," Hoffman said. "We used to go with Rick Dutrow years ago and she learned a lot from Rick, I think she's excellent."

The Hoffman Thoroughbreds homebred made his first start for Nevin in last month's John Morrissey, where he finished fourth over a muddy track.

"He's a lovely horse," Nevin said. "When I picked him up he was in great shape and he's just been so easy to be around. He's so straightforward. He trained great up to the previous race, he trained great up to this race. Maybe it was the track last time that did cause him not to fire, but it worked out today."

With John Velazquez aboard for the first time, T Loves A Fight ranged up menacingly on the turn, took the lead just past the eighth pole and powered home impressively, crossing the wire 1 3/4 lengths in front of Weekend Hideaway and stopping the clock in 1:15.41.

"I didn't know that he'd able to make up that much ground, but he made up that much ground," Hoffman said. "He had the ideal pace to run into, it was like a perfect storm."

• Dot Matrix hadn't won since a Belmont allowance last October heading into the third race. After that win, the son of Freud finished up the track in an allowance at Aqueduct in November and trainer Abigail Adsit decided to give him a break. He came back June 11 at Belmont, but Adsit sensed Dot Matrix still wasn't himself. He finished seventh in his return and fifth next time out on Independence Day.

"He came back off the farm, he was working lovely, but he just didn't have the pep that he previously had as trained him for the two years prior," Adsit said. "We backed up after those two starts and reevaluated."

After shipping to Saratoga, Dot Matrix showed his trainer he was ready. A gentleman in the stall, Dot Matrix knows when it's time to work and gets fired up around the racetrack.

"I got him up here and saw the fire was back in him," Adsit said. "He was coming off the track on two legs, and I was like, 'ok, good, he's back.' "

After a fifth in an off-the-turf race July 27, Dot Matrix returned in a \$35,000 claiming race on the Mellon course Thursday. He led the field at every call in the 1 1/8-mile race and gave Adsit her first win of the meet.

"It's wonderful. I'm honored," Adsit said. "It's always such a blessing to be able to say you won at Saratoga. For me, it's my hometown. It's pretty special.

"Racing has been in my blood. I've been born and raised in it. I've been brought up here watching the races and knowing I wanted to train. It's just a

"He has a bunch of great people together in his group," Adsit said. "I've trained for him for about three years and I've had a chance to train his homebreds and New York breds. I've had him since he came from the farm as a baby.

"It's definitely such a special bond. He's such a cool horse. He's easy to like. I've built a lot of my stable on claiming, so to be able to have him as a baby and work his way up and be together as long as we have, it's definitely something special."

Neck bowed, he dragged them along the horse path as they leaned their bodies back into him in an effort to keep him from running off. Eventually, they walked him a lap around a pony horse and Jewel Can Disco stopped and stood facing the paddock stalls. Dave Valeri, who bred and owns Jewel Can Disco with his brother Robert, looked on.

"I didn't want him to get too excited. He'd wash out. That's no good," Valeri said. "When he worked out on the track after that, it went away, so he was back to himself. But he's been kicking the barns down waiting to run. That's been the problem because what happens is they hurt themselves. In this case, now I'm in good shape."

Jewel Can Disco broke on the lead in the 7-furlong allowance and came to the top of the stretch in front. Coming off the turn, Jewel Can Disco bore out and drifted five paths off the rail. Heavy Meddle slipped through on the inside and took the lead.

"He plays a little bit," Valeri said. "He didn't see that horse inside of him right away. He never put the stick on him. I wasn't worried. I knew what I had."

Straightened out by Joel Rosario, Jewel Can Disco re-rallied and won by three quarters of a length in 1:22.72. Thursday's win is the second for the son of Disco Rico, who broke his maiden last time out in a state-bred maiden special at Belmont July 1. He wired the field that day and won by 8 3/4 for trainer Gary Gullo.

"He had a little infection. We gave him the time off, brought him back," Valeri said. "That's why you need the time. Time is very important. He threw a 91 Beyer. If you run him back too quick, he's going to bounce. In this case, he did good. I was waiting for this race to come."

Jewel Can Disco is the fifth and second to last foal out of the mare Laura's Jewel, who Valeri bred before she lost a battle with colic. Valeri hopes to continue the line with a daughter of Laura's Jewel, Laura Can Disco.

"The mother, Laura's Jewel, was named after my daughter," he said. "Laura Can Disco is a full sister to Jewel Can Disco. Jewel, that's my granddaughter. It's all family. That's where it all came from."


NYTHA GENERAL MEETING AUG. 29



Drefong

King's Bishop 2016

Trust your instincts, that's what people in racing say – about betting, buying, training, pretty much anything. If you've got experience, you know what you like and if it doesn't work out you learn something along the way.

Peter O'Callaghan, of Kentucky's Woods Edge Farm, trusted his instincts and first impression of a Gio Ponti weanling at Keeneland November in 2013. The next September, Donato Lanni and Bob Baffert did the same. And everybody won.

The weanling, from the first crop of a turf champion, became Drefong – millionaire, winner of the 2016 King's Bishop at Saratoga and 2016 champion male sprinter for Baffert and owner Baoma Corp. Drefong cost O'Callaghan \$200,000 as a weanling and elevated to \$450,000 as a Keeneland September yearling. Now, the bay colt is nearly priceless as he returns to Saratoga to compete in Saturday's Grade 1 Forego Stakes.

O'Callaghan couldn't have predicted all that has occurred, but knew what he was buying.

"He was a gorgeous foal, outstanding model with great conformation and strength and movement," he said. "He was exactly what you're looking for as an individual when you're trying to buy young horses. And it was the very same when he was a yearling."

O'Callaghan didn't go to Keeneland November to buy a Gio Ponti, just like Lanni and Baffert didn't go to Keeneland September to buy one. All three were convinced by the individual horse, however. Bred by Fred Allor, Michael Barnett and Anthony Warrender, the colt was part of Barnett's Blackburn Farm consignment, as was his dam Eltimaas.

Unraced, the daughter of Ghostzapper was a half-sister to champion Action This Day. She'd



sold to Allor for \$90,000 in 2011 and her only registered foal had yet to race.

The weanling carried more than pedigree, however.

"It was like looking at a Ghostzapper foal really – a hard brown, deep, muscular, strong horse," said O'Callaghan. "I had nothing against Gio Ponti. He was a tremendous racehorse, but he was a turf horse. The horse was so reminiscent of looking at Ghostzapper himself and it gave you an added push to buy him."

O'Callaghan bid on Eltimaas, who sold one hip earlier for \$77,000, but was saving up for the weanling. He took the colt home, and watched him continue to blossom. By September, he was a striking yearling. Baffert came to the Woods Edge consignment with a list from Lanni. Hip 611 was

on there with 10 or so others. O'Callaghan said the Hall of Fame trainer came back two or three more times to see the Gio Ponti colt. The others were further down the list.

"He was the kind of horse Donato and Bob love," said O'Callaghan. "Give Donato the credit, he's got such a good instinct for horses that work for them. They're looking at horses, they're not worried about the pedigree or the mare or the sire."

Drefong finished fifth in his debut at Santa Anita in October, then won by 9 1/2 lengths the next time at Del Mar to start a five-race winning streak. As a 3-year-old, Drefong got started in late May and won two allowance races at Santa


Anita. Sent to Saratoga for the King's Bishop, he blasted 11 others while racing up front throughout.

The Breeders' Cup Sprint was much the same as he defeated Masochistic, Mind Your Biscuits and A. P. Indian to claim the Eclipse Award as champion male sprinter.

"I'm happy he worked out," said O'Callaghan. "It's good for us. When you sell one for a lot of money like that you can only hope that the horse works out for any prospective buyer. It's great for the breeder too, they got a great price for him as a foal. It worked out for everybody."

Drefong still hasn't really gotten his 2017 started yet as he ducked in and lost jockey Mike Smith while passing the gap in the Bing Crosby at Del Mar July 29. The bay colt returns to Saratoga Race Course, where he and jockey Mike Smith will take on Mind Your Biscuits and others in the Grade 1 Forego Saturday.

Lady Tak

Test 2003, Ballerina 2004

Bill Heiligbrodt will never forget seeing Lady Tak work at Keeneland's April 2-year-old sale in 2002. The chestnut filly, a daughter of Mutakddim and the Lucky North mare Star Of My Eye sped through a furlong breeze but galloped out 3 furlongs so fast that the owner had to check his watch.

"I was timing the horses and she went in :32 flat or something and I went and checked with Steve Asmussen about what he got and he said he got her faster than I did," Heiligbrodt said. "She wasn't a significantly popularly bred horse, but she was fast. She made you look at her."

It was :32 2/5, but nobody really cared then. Or now. The little chestnut filly was faster than her catalog page.

Heiligbrodt spent \$75,000, sent her to Asmussen and watched a blazing career get started.

Bred in Florida by John Franks, Lady Tak won her first start by 11 3/4 lengths at Churchill Downs and then made it five in a row with another win as a juvenile and three more at the Fair Grounds as a 3-year-old.

The last of those was a runaway score in the Grade 2 Fair Grounds Oaks going 1 1/16 miles. She finished second in the Grade 1 Ashland at Keenleand, and was sixth in the Kentucky Oaks.

Brought to Saratoga that summer, where she stamped herself a powerhouse sprinter, she nearly made history when she won the Grade 1 Test over Kentucky Oaks winner Bird Town in 1:20.83 for 7 furlongs. The time put a scare into Darby Creek Road's track record of 1:20.40 set in 1978.

As good as that was, her performance at Saratoga the next year in the Grade 1 Ballerina may have been better. Coming off a third in Calder's Princess Rooney, Lady Tak and Jerry Bailey made



all the running against six rivals and set fractions of :22.35, :44.49 and 1:07.90 (faster than the 6-furlong track record of 1:08) before winning a three-way photo with My Trusty Cat and Harmony Lodge in 1:21.09.

Bailey came back and tried to explain what it was like to ride a four-legged missile.

"She's extremely fast," the jockey told The Special in 2004. "You can't slow her down. I would have had to double her over and water-ski around the turn to get her to slow down. She does run the turn well, so I let her go a little bit. I would have hated to absolutely throw the anchor out."

Heiligbrodt still smiles over that race.

"I looked up at the time and it said 1:07 and something," he said. "I remember thinking how crazy it was. She has to be one of the fastest horses I've ever known."

Indeed, Lady Tak was that for a lot of people. Asmussen called her special from the beginning.

"She demands to know she's special," the trainer said about her in 2004. "She's always been brilliant. We were very nervous about running her (the first time) because of how fast she was. Her first couple of races went perfect for her and she responded from them."

Lady Tak added the Grade 2 Gallant Bloom at

Belmont Park in October and closed her 4-year-old season by finishing third in the Grade 2 Distaff at Churchill Downs.

Brought back for another season, she raced just once as a 5-year-old finishing third as the favorite in an allowance at Churchill. While prepping for a Ballerina title defense in 2005, she was retired to a career as a broodmare at Hill 'n' Dale Farm.

She won 10 of 19 starts, earned \$1,160,782 and might have been a legend had the Breeders' Cup started a filly/mare sprint division sooner. Her five foals of racing age have yet to live up to her, but that's going to be difficult no matter what happens.

"Out of the thousands of horses I've owned, she might be my favorite," said Heiligbrodt. "She was an overachiever, who tried as hard as she could every time we ran her. She doesn't know how she was bred or how small she was. She just had a lot of unreal talent."

I love the emails. The tips, the touts, the rants, the "I've got an idea for you..." notes that come across my screen. Once in a while they are mean-spirited, but most are good-natured, a suggestion, a thought, a story, a shared laugh, a shared anecdote. I received one from Kate and Jeff Harris about a decade ago, hell, maybe longer, about a woman who had been coming to Saratoga since the 60s. I jumped on it and met her. It filled a page.

I got another email last week, this one, from Jim Schaeffer, a retired Ph.D who works mutuel window 1526. It was about a woman who had been coming to Saratoga since the 60s, he included a scanned copy of her hand-written letter about her upcoming trip to Saratoga.

I met Bea Strauss for the second time last weekend.

"How did you know I was here?" Strauss asked, while sitting in her "Cadillac" walker given to her by Schaeffer and friends. "I met you years and years ago, I have the article you wrote about me. Kate Harris isn't here, Jeff died a few years ago...but I'm here."

Yes, Bea Strauss was at Saratoga for her 53rd season at Saratoga. Her trip was short, just four days, as she's taking a cruise with two cousins through the inside passage of Alaska September 3.

"I've been wanting to do it since Alaska became a state," Strauss said. "I'm going to be 92 years old in November, I figured I'd better do it."

Strauss has been doing Saratoga since her mother suggested she make the trip.

"My mother had just gotten married to my step-father and he said, 'Come on, we're going to Saratoga.' She said, 'What do I want with a racetrack?' She went for the weekend," Strauss said. "She came home and said, 'You've got to try this.' I said, 'What do I want with a racetrack?' She said, 'Oh, you've got to try it, it's fun.' That was it, I was hooked, it's been 53 consecutive years."

53 & Counting



Everybody has their reasons for their summer jaunts to Saratoga – work, play, family, tradition, gambling, horses...Strauss can't really explain hers. It started as a weekend thing, then a month-long vacation from her nursing job, grew into an escape from her stressful days at the foster and childcare agency at the New York Archdiocese. She worked as an usher for a few summers, but mostly just enjoyed the ambiance, the soul of Saratoga.

"This was my salvation," Strauss said. "I like the people I've spoken to, the beauty of the track, the fact that it's totally different from anything else I've done, mostly just the people, not just the ardent bettors but the decent people who you can talk to, who are happy to share their experience with you, you're watching the most beautiful animals, beautiful scen-

ery, nice people, it's a special place to be."

Saratoga has provided a salvation to all of us. Strauss isn't necessarily a racing fan, she's a Saratoga fan. She went to Belmont Park once, called it, "nice" but never went back. At Saratoga, she's a regular, making friends with Jim and Ron at the betting windows, who know her bet like they know their telephone number.

"My second year here, 1966, I bought a ticket for the second race, on the floor was a ticket for race two, \$10 bet on the seven to win and a \$10 exacta seven and eight. I stood there like this (she holds up her arm and waves it), waiting for someone to come say they dropped it, no one came," Strauss said. "I took it back to the seat. My stepfather was very conservative, he would have bet Angel Cordero to show, he said, 'Throw it away,' I said, 'Let's wait.' The seven came in first, the eight finished second, I collected \$523. In 1966, \$523 was a lot of money. So every second race if there's a seven and eight, I bet it. And a few other races if there is a seven and eight. I don't care if they have five legs or six heads, I still bet seven and eight."

If she forgets, Jim and Ron make the bets for her. On a quiet Sunday – the calm before the Travers storm, Strauss sat and watched the races, greeting old friends and welcoming new friends, unclipping a knitted bookmark worm and handing it to a friend for his son and trying to explain the Saratoga mystique, as if it needed to be explained.

"It's been a rich experience. The whole thing has been a rich experience," Strauss said. "The fact that you and Kate and Jeff had a conversation about me and you wrote about me, where else does that happen? I have the article at home, my family said, 'How do they know about you? There's 40,000 people and they write about you. Why do they write about you?' I said, 'just because, just because, it's Saratoga.'"

Yes, Bea, just because, just because, it's Saratoga.
