





Warm weather? Stress? Not a problem for Phil Serpe. He lets those things roll off when he's in Saratoga, more specifically when he's in the courtyard in front of his barn on the middle of the Saratoga backstretch.

The area is known as Blue Heaven and there's a sign hung high on the telephone pole to prove it.

Serpe and his longtime partner, assistant and exercise rider Lisa Bartkowski relish the time there and anyone else fortunate to do the same won't struggle with the name.

"Look, it's the toughest place in the the greatest place in the world to be and

to train a horse," Serpe said Monday morning, finished with his training on the main track and waiting for turf works at the Oklahoma. "I love this, the more pressure the better for me. I love our barn. This whole thing is just the best for me. For all of us."

The barn houses the likes of stakes competitors Weekend Hideaway, Lady Joan and Goodbye Brockley, along with a collection of 2-year-olds, allowance and claiming horses. Serpe, a resident of Barn 22 for 22 years by his best guess, is in the midst of another strong meet at Saratoga with four wins, six seconds and six thirds from 35 starts. He's hoping for a few more before heading back down-

Serpe went through most of the Saratoga string before turf training Monday with The Special's Tom Law.

Land Mine: Chester and Mary Broman's homebred 4-yearold Mineshaft filly finished second in the Saratoga Dew Aug. 17, coming up a half-length short after a second in allowance company July 26. She's entered for the main track only in Saturday's Glens Falls. "She started with us winning here the day before the meet ended last year, she won an off-the-turf race. She won two out of her three next starts after that and of course me being the genius that I am had to run her on the turf one time. It's the Barclay Tagg in me. She was narrowly beaten in the Saratoga Dew here, she ran great and it was unfortunate because we tried to get a race into her down at Belmont and it just didn't fill. That would have helped. She broke in a tangle and went to her knees, that didn't help either.'



world to win a race, it just is, but it's also Trainer Phil Serpe and assistant Lisa Bartkowski (right) have won four at the meet.

Life Time Citizen: WellSpring Stables' 3-year-old Proud Citizen filly breezed twice on the Oklahoma grass and is close to returning for her first start since winning an optional claimer at Gulfstream Park Dec. 20. "She's getting ready to start, she's a two-other-than turf sprinter. We're excited about her. Possibly here the last week or opening week at Belmont."

Out Of Orbit: The 3-year-old filly finished second in Wednesday's seventh race, after a third and a second in her two other starts at the meet. "She is one of Mr. Broman's homebreds by Malibu Moon. At first we thought she was going to be a real nice filly then we were a little disappointed in some of her starts but she's progressively come back around. We're hoping the best for her."

Fixed Point: WellSpring Stable's 3-year-old Midshipman colt crashed the party in the finale Aug. 23, winning at nearly 13-1. He'd been off since being claimed for \$40,000 at Gulfstream Park March 1. "The big horse. We claimed him, had to do a little overhaul work on him and he came through last week. It's funny, in the last year or two, seemed like we lit up the board with one. He was the one this year. We're very excited because he ran well and he ran like a horse that is going to improve and go places."

Weekend Hideaway: Purchased for \$40,000 at the Flying Zee dispersal at Fasig-Tipton in 2011, the multiple stakes winner pressed the pace and finished third in tough allowance Monday for Red and Black Stable, Earner of more than \$1.1 million won the John Morrissey July 26 for his ninth stakes victory (13th overall) in 49 starts. "The big man. You know he loves Saratoga. Whatever he does is all right with me as long as he comes back good. Winning the Morrissey means a lot to us. There's a lot of nice horses around here, lots. watched future champions run Saturday, whatever, but you get these horses now and then like Weekend Hideaway, I've had a few periodically through the years. They just do things for people and he's that kind of horse."

Goodbye Brockley: Hilly Fields Stable's homebred 3-year-old Cosmonaut filly won the Statue of Liberty division of the New York Stallion Series Aug. 9. She returned to the worktab Aug. 20 and breezed 5 furlongs on the grass Monday in 1:05.69. "She eked it out on a turf course I think she was struggling with after all the rain. She's going to run here Sunday, probably just an allowance race."

Lady Joan: Goodbye Brockley's older half-sister made three starts at the meet, including a second in the Yaddo Stakes Aug. 24. "What can you say about her? She just tries and tries and tries. I was worried

about her coming from her 3 and 4-year-old year, whether she would improve or not. It was questionable. Her Beyer numbers weren't quite where they needed to be and now they just keep getting better and better. She has three starts at this meet, a win, a second and a third. We're happy with her."

Kandinsky: Sterling Racing went to \$300,000 to buy son of Scat Daddy at the 2016 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga sale of selected yearlings. He's unraced with six works at Saratoga, including a half on the Oklahoma grass in :49.34 Monday. "Unfortunately it doesn't look like he'll get to start here, he got delayed because of the rain. He's a nice big colt, just about ready to run but we're running out of time. We started training for Sterling Racing last fall. They had some horses we needed to move along. we bought three 2-year-olds, plus one they bred. We're excited about the future for them."

Chasindamoney: Duffryn Run Farm's 3-year-old Freud colt, a \$72,000 buy at the 2016 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga New York-bred sale, started his career with Linda Rice before moving to Serpe's barn this year. He finished third in a state-bred maiden June 7. He's entered in Thursday's 10th race going 6 1/2 furlongs on the dirt. Serpe would prefer turf. "Unfortunately he would be 6-5 in a maiden New York-bred special weight going 5 1/2 on the turf but they haven't been able to fill the race the whole meet. Book 1 the race didn't go, Book 2 the race didn't go, Book 3 the race didn't go. A maiden New York-bred 5 1/2 on the turf, you'd think there would be 20 in there. I don't know what's going on."

State Of War: Unraced 2-year-old cost Sterling Racing \$190,000 at Fasig-Tipton Midlantic May sale. He's breezed three times at Saratoga, including a half on the main track in





:49.38 Monday. "He's by Declaration Of War, an up-and-coming young sire. He's a month or so away from running. We like how he's doing, breezing after the break."

World Affairs: A \$300,000 graduate from Fasig-Tipton Midlantic's yearling sale in 2017, Sterling Racing's 2-year-old Cairo Prince colt shows five breezes at Saratoga, including a half in :49.38 Monday with State Of War. "He's in the same training pattern as State Of War. Another really nice horse, and Cairo Prince is off to a huge start. Considering most of these horses look like they're going to stretch out. Ours is a big, long-bodied colt. We love him. We really, really love him."

The Postmaster: Hilly Fields' 2-year-old full-brother to Goodbye Brockley is on the shelf after a third and a second in state-bred maiden races in May and June at Belmont. "Following in the footsteps of his sister ran a couple times then needed to go home for a little while. Nothing serious, but you take care of 2-year-olds and they'll become good 3-year-olds. If you don't then you have to pay the price. We're very excited. It's funny, we're sitting here and it's the end of August and we're already talking about a horse we can't wait to get back here next July and August. It will be exciting."

Sweet Chance

Casse looks to shed losing skid with 2YO filly Chocolate Kisses

Mark Casse won't let the losses – even Wonder Gadot's last-place finish in the Travers – ruin his mood in the waning days of the Saratoga meet.

"I'm a lot stronger," Casse told a small group of reporters while he watched training from the backstretch of the main track. "They say what doesn't kill you makes you stronger. So I'm a hell of a lot stronger than I was five days ago."

Casse laughed as he spoke those words, which he repeated from a similar conversation about an hour before. He's not about to call it quits or pack up the stable just yet and will look to add another win with Chocolate Kisses in today's \$100,000 P.G. Johnson Stakes.

P.G. JOHNSON STAKES PREVIEW

Chocolate Kisses gave Casse his second win of the meet, taking a 1 1/16-mile turf maiden two days after Catherinethegreat provided the barn's first victory in the Grade 3 Schuyler-ville Opening Day. Even though 42 losses followed the 2-year-old Candy Ride filly's victory, Casse prefers to look at the big picture.

"She's the last horse I won with," Casse said. "We won two the first three days and have been in a drought since. But horses ran well in some big races, too. We were second in the Sanford (Strike Silver), second in the Jim Dandy (Flameaway) and third in the



Hall of Fame (Ride A Comet)."

Casse's record is 2-for-54 going into today's card but sports 11 seconds and nine thirds, putting his in-the-money strike rate at 41 percent.

"You don't see us run in any of the claiming races," Casse said. "We might have one or two, maybe a starter, but we come and play, we run in the big races. And my percentage couldn't have been too good to start off with, we ran three in the Schuyler-ville. So you kill yourself there."

Chocolate Kisses is the 7-2 second choice on the morning line for the 1 1/16-mile P. G. Johnson, run in memory of the Hall of Fame trainer who won at least one race at Saratoga from 1962 to 2003 and sent out Volponi to a monster upset in the 2002 Breeders' Cup Classic.

Owned by Debby Oxley and a \$410,000 purchase at last year's Fasig-Tipton Saratoga sale of selected yearlings, Chocolate Kisses also owns the distinction of being the only member of the field with a victory at Saratoga. Three of the 11 fillies entered for the turf – Dogtag, Global Exchange and Varenka – are maidens while the others bring vic-

tories at Ellis Park, Belmont Park, Delaware Park, Presque Isle Downs and Listowel in Ireland.

The Listowel winner is Mintd, a daughter of Olympic Glory purchased privately by Madaket Stables and Bradley Thoroughbreds from owner/trainer Willie McCreery after her runner-up finish in the Coolmore Pride of Dubai Tipperary Stakes at Tipperary racecourse July 5. She's the 5-2 favorite on the morning line for the meet's leading trainer and jockey, Chad Brown and Irad Ortiz Jr., respectively

"I guess the unknown will be Chad's filly from Europe," Casse said. "We'll have to see how well she runs."

Chocolate Kisses ran well in her maiden victory, stalking the early pace of stablemate Toy Moon before taking the lead at the end of the far turn. She cleared Toy Moon and held off a late run from Aunt Ashley to win by a length in 1:44.27. The victory came a month after Chocolate Kisses finished second in an off-the-turf maiden race going 5 1/2 furlongs on a sloppy track at Churchill Downs.

"She's really done well since her race up here," Casse said. "She's grown up. She went from being a little girl to becoming a woman. It's a tough post, but I think there will be a scratch or two."

If the race stays on the grass – which is likely with only a chance of morning thunderstorms to-day – Chocolate Kisses will move in at least two spots from her No. 10 draw. Adirondack Stakes third Guacamole drew post 3 but is entered main track only. Global Exchange will also scratch after

suffering a hind ankle injury that required surgery Tuesday at Rood and Riddle Saratoga.


"Just a freak thing," said Jimmy Toner, who trains Global Exchange for Mike Ryan. "This place will get you. It will humble anybody, that's for sure. Usually you come up here early, try to win, take a breather and feel like you're in good shape. If you don't win you just try and get out of here in one piece. That's the way it usually is here."

The field could decrease further if Miss Technicality, a winner in her debut going 6 furlongs on the turf at Belmont July 6, ships to Kentucky Downs for Saturday's \$400,000 Exacta Systems Juvenile Fillies Stakes.


Dogtag, a daughter of War Front owned by LNJ Foxwoods, finished third via disqualification in a 7-furlong off-the-turf maiden race here Aug. 5 for Chad Brown. O'Malley ships in from Michael Stidham's base at Fair Hill off a victory in a 7 1/2-furlong turf maiden at Delaware Aug. 8.

The other two entered for the grass are Chasing The Kitty, a daughter of Kitten's Joy who walloped maidens by 10 1/2 lengths going a mile on Presque Isle Downs' synthetic track for trainer Adam Rice July 25; and Varenka, third in a 5 1/2-furlong turf maiden at Laurel July 20 for Graham Motion.

Cassies Dreamer, claimed by trainer Barclay Tagg for \$50,000 out of a victory going 5 1/2 furlongs Aug. 3, is also entered for the main track only and is entered in Saturday's Spinaway Stakes.



Singing Along

Opry charges home in 2YO turf stakes

Everett Dobson and Ed Gaylord partnered on many horses over their three decades of friendship, some good, some bad, yet their association waned a bit in recent years.

Dobson, the managing partner of the Oklahoma City Thunder of the NBA with a passion for racing, wanted to keep his friend involved and hatched a plan almost a year ago to the day of Wednesday's Grade 3 With Anticipation Stakes at Saratoga Race Course.

"He and I have been friends since we were in our 20s and we're not in our 20s anymore," Dobson said with a laugh Wednesday. "We've been friends for 30-plus years, we've owned racehorses together, we've owned mares together but we haven't done a lot together in the last few years.

"I was talking to Ed last year about this time, going into the Keeneland September sale, and said, 'What do you think about buying just one more horse together?'

Gaylord, whose family enjoyed a long association with the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville and remains a majority shareholder in the publicly traded company, agreed and the two men set an amount they were looking to spend at the September sale.

Gatewood Bell, who operates Cromwell Bloodstock in Lexington, found a colt by multiple Group

1 winner Declaration Of War that was slated to sell midway through the sixth session of the sale. They bought the colt for \$180,000, toward the top end of the session's most expensive lots and significantly more expensive than the day's average price.

"We got lucky and got the right one apparently," Dobson said Wednesday, moments after the subsequently named Opry overcame a slow start to break his maiden in the \$150,000 turf stakes for 2-year-olds.

Dobson and trainer Todd Pletcher, who also saddled Azar to a maiden-breaking win in the 2015 With Anticipation, didn't feel lucky watching the start of this year's edition.

Opry hopped slightly at the break and veered a bit to the right, spotting the field a few lengths past the finish the first time. Javier Castellano, who won his sixth Travers last weekend aboard last year's With Anticipation winner Catholic Boy, angled Opry from the inside part of the turf course to the two-path as Joyful Heart set the pace ahead of the Pletcher-trained Seanow and 6-5 favorite Somelikeithotbrown heading around the first turn.

Opry raced 7 1/2 lengths back through the opening quarter in :23.29 and 6 1/2 back through the half in :47.91.

"He broke a bit slow out of the gate, but he didn't panic," Castellano said. "This was his second start and first time on the grass. I wanted to let him figure it out by himself a little. Todd told me in the paddock that he really liked this horse and the way he's worked on the grass. After the break, we were really able to get comfortable."

Joyful Heart still led entering the far turn with Seanow and Somelikeithotbrown still chasing. Joyful Heart still led turning for home as Somelikeithot-

brown continued his run after going three-wide around the far turn.

Castellano angled Opry about eight paths off the inside - probably on a part of the turf not too chewed up after this year's rainy meet - and mixed a few crosses with a couple right-handed cracks of the whip. Opry rolled past the field in a flash and increased his margin on the group approaching the finish. Somelikeithotbrown held second, 2 1/4 lengths in front of Joyful Heart with Swamp Rat fourth in the field of six.

Opry won over the firm turf in 1:42 to give Pletcher his seventh win in the With Anticipation and Castellano his third.

"It made me nervous when he

broke like that," Pletcher said walking down from his box. "I told Javier he would break better second time than he did the first time."

Oprv broke slow in his debut, an off-7-furlong the-turf maiden race Aug. 11. He still managed to finish third, losing by just a half-length.

Pletcher entered Opry for the first time in a 1 1/16-mile turf maiden on the the also-eligible list.

That race came off the turf and while Opry could have drawn into the race, Pletcher opted to wait for another

The race came up again a week later and wound up being moved to the main track.

"The horse had trained well enough on the dirt so I wasn't concerned, I actually thought he might win an off-the-turf type race," Pletcher said. "A couple of his turf breezes were pretty impressive and we felt like he was a little better on the grass.

"I told Mr. Dobson after (the Aug. 11 race), 'Look, if this horse trains OK, I'm going to look at running him back in the With Anticipation. I've won it with a maiden before, I think he's good enough to do it if things go well.' Then he trained the way we'd hoped he would after (the first race)."

Hot Spa card a mixed bag

Brown doubles to get to 36 wins

Wednesday's 35th day of the 2018 Saratoga Race Course season felt like many from the summer – hot and steamy, with plenty of action thanks to 10 solid races, a two-day carryover in the Pick Six and a strong guitar-solo National Anthem performance by NYRA sound man John Getzler in the winner's circle to start things off.

On the track, the big names got their wins but so did a few others.

Leading trainer Chad Brown doubled, taking the fourth with Prognostication and fifth with More Mischief. The former led a 1-2 finish for owners Klaravich Stable and Bill Lawrence as Financial System finished second in the 1 1/16-mile starter allowance on the inner turf. Brereton Jones bred the winner, who won a \$40,000 maiden claimer last fall at Belmont and added a waiver claimer here Aug. 11. Brown has 36 wins, four short of the record he and Todd Pletcher share.

Pletcher won the featured With Anticipation with late-running 2-year-old Opry. Joe Sharp and Kiaran McLaughlin each picked up his eighth win of the meet while Robert Falcone Jr. collected his second and Mike Miceli won the finale to get on the board at the meet. Rick Violette (three wins at the meet), and Linda Rice (seven) also saddled Wednesday's winners while jump trainer Jack Fisher teamed up with jockey Willie McCarthy for their second wins at the meet.

Leading jockey Irad Ortiz Jr. merely singled, but is running off with the championship at 46 wins to 35 for Javier Castellano, who doubled on the card. Luis Saez delivered a riding triple in the third (for Sharp), eighth (for McLaughlin) and 10th (for Miceli) to get to 29 wins at the meet.

The big pick six carryover helped the pool grow to more than \$1.7 million with a winning ticket worth \$53,157.

WEDNESDAY RACING RECAP

• Tom Caldroney thought about getting out of the business when his friend, former employee and partner in racehorses and breeding prospects passed away unexpectedly in March 2013.

Caldroney later reconsidered and wound up buying a French Deputy mare Tres Chaud from the late Ian Mulholland's wife Kristin with hopes of carrying on his friend's legacy with a small breeding operation. Caldroney, who breeds and races in the name TLC Thoroughbreds, sold a few foals out of Tres Chaud and kept the Freud filly Tres Charmant when she failed to meet her reserve on a \$27,000 bid at the 2014 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga fall mixed sale.

Tres Charmant broke her maiden last August, giving Caldroney his first win at Saratoga, and provided a second when she took the sixth. Trained by Linda Rice, Tres Charmant won the \$40,000 claimer for fillies and mares going 5 1/2 furlongs on the turf by 1 3/4 lengths under Jose Lezcano.

"I still own the mare, she's at Bill Johnson's place Stonegate Farm up in Fort Edward," said Caldroney. "Bill and Ian were best buddies. He and I both were hit like a ton of bricks when he passed. Big time.

"So much so that I almost got out. Flatterywillgetyou (winner of the 2016 Bouwerie Stakes for Rice and a finalist for champion New Yorkbred 3-year-old filly that season) was the last horse we sold. That was as a weanling and that got Ian's wife out of all the horses. And I was almost out, too. I was down to one broodmare but decided to stay in. Now I've got three broodmares and three others in partnership with Bill at Stonegate."

Tres Charmant bounced back from a sixth in an off-the-turf 5 1/2-furlong

claimer Aug. 5. She'd never raced on the main track in five prior starts.

"We tried her on the dirt and it did not go well," Rice said. "I was relieved to get her back to the winner's circle after that. Sometimes that'll take a race out of them, but fortunately she rebounded well enough to get back to the winner's circle."

• The Caretaker survived the steam bath that was Saratoga Wednesday and picked up his third straight win in the eighth, a far cry from his 2018 debut at Aqueduct when exposed for a relatively cheap claiming price.

"He's gotten good. He's come a long way. I'm glad we didn't lose him for the quarter that day," said Kiaran McLaughlin, who trains the 4-year-old Speightstown homebred for Chester and Mary Broman. "He's just improved a lot and my team has done a great job. We're very happy. It's great to win for Chester and Mary Broman, they're great breeders and owners here in New York."

The Caretaker, who held off a late run from stakes winner Aveenu Malcainu to win the 7-furlong optional claimer for state-breds, started his 2018 season for that \$25,000 claiming price Jan. 25. He finished second that day and competed exclusively in

allowance or starter allowance events in seven subsequent starts leading up to Wednesday.

The Caretaker won a 7-furlong starter at Belmont July 12 and an off-the-turf 5 1/2-furlong allowance at Saratoga Aug. 4 prior to his latest victory. Luis Saez rode The Caretaker in his last three starts and was back aboard Wednesday.

"Luis rides him very well," Mc-Laughlin said. "Luis is doing well and the horse is doing really well."

The victory was McLaughlin's eighth of the meet and he hopes to add at least one more.

"We've had a great meet," he said.
"I'd like to finish it up with a Prioress win with Dream Pauline on Sunday, that would be great."

• Mike Miceli figured a state-bred maiden turf sprint would be exactly what Whiskey Run would need to break his maiden and give the trainer his first win at Saratoga since 2014. Unfortunately he could never find one that would fill, so he changed gears and Whiskey Run found the winner's circle.

li said. "Finally I just decided to put him in going long. And he delivered."

Whiskey Run took the finale for High Over Stables and Miceli, taking the lead from the start and holding off The Sheik Of Araby by a half-length under Luis Saez.

The 4-year-old Utopia gelding hadn't been out since a fourth in a 6-furlong maiden turf race June 7, an effort that came about a month after he finished second in a similar race at 100-1 odds.

Miceli, a former jockey who won 653 races and a trainer since 1988, last won at Saratoga when Coast Of Sangria took a \$25,000 claiming race July 30, 2014. Whiskey Run improved his 2018 Saratoga record to a win, a second and two thirds from eight starts.

"I won one up here a few years ago," Miceli said. "I always try to knock out at least one a year."

• Willie McCarthy walked back to the jocks' room after Wednesday's opener and shook his head.

"I would have been so bullish afterwards..." McCarthy said.

Minutes earlier, the Irish-born jump jockey had simply steered Irish-bred Dark Gemini to an easy win in the allowance hurdle. Unfortunately, the 5-year-old bowed his right tendon in the effort. The horse went home in the equine ambulance and McCarthy walked home thinking about what might have been.

"He pulled up lame, not very, very bad but enough for me to not ride him back today, just keep the horse's best interest into account," McCarthy said. "Such a shame, I've said it before, he's one of the best horses I've ever ridden."

McCarthy and Dark Gemini improved their hurdle record to two wins from five starts (with three seconds) in the final hurdle race at Saratoga this season. McCarthy parked the former George Weaver trainee in the back of the five-horse field, holding him around five turns and over nine hurdles before allowing the bay gelding to pick it up in the stretch the final time. Sent off favorite, Dark Gemini zipped inside longtime leader Dancin

In The Rain and stalker Ocean Ready to score by a comfortable 5 1/4 lengths for trainer Jack Fisher and owner Serendipity Stable.

"He's such a talented horse, but very fragile, I was dreaming of the Champion Hurdle at Far Hills all year with this horse. I have full confidence in this him, there's a change of plan, we have to wait now," McCarthy said. "So talented, so, so talented. He's like driving a Ferrari around there, I could have ridden him anywhere and won that race. When you're traveling like that, it's like a knife through butter."


McCarthy rode Dark Gemini with aplomb, using two underhanded smacks after the wings in the stretch and staying low to the wire.

"I like the way you kept him together," flat jockey Kendrick Carmouche said as McCarthy opened the door to the jocks' room.

McCarthy thanked Carmouche, then shook his head for the second time

"Hard to be excited about it," Mc-Carthy said. "At least it's...yes, he'll need some time off. He's a very talented horse, he can come back for his 6-year-old season and hopefully maybe get to the Champion Hurdle next year."





Simon Says

Canadian-based trainer engineers stakes win with 3YO Rose's Vision BY SEAN CLANCY

Stuart Simon walked to the bottom of the club-house stairs and instead of going left to the winner's circle, the Canadian-based trainer made a short right turn and stopped. And stood.

"Ahh, you just want to soak it all in," he said, moments later. "You want to make sure you're not just dreaming."

Simon wasn't dreaming. Rose's Vision, owned and bred by Chiefswood Stable and trained by Simon, had just won Monday's feature, the Better Talk Now. The 3-year-old colt settled in sixth in the field of nine, rallied on the inside to run down Have At It to win the restricted 3-year-old turf stakes by a neck. Jose Ortiz partnered the Canadian-bred son of Artie Schiller, finishing the mile on the firm inner turf in 1:35.82.

"It's a big thrill, I've only run one other horse here at Saratoga, actually in this race," Simon said, referring to Dragon Bay who finished third but was

disqualified to fifth in 2016. "We've won the English Channel at Belmont, I've won races at Keeneland and Gulfstream but there's no place like Saratoga. It's really, really thrilling. It really is."

Rose's Vision earned his first stakes victory in his 12th career start, securing Simon's ninth win this year and 783rd for his career.

Ortiz roused Roses's Vision for five strides from post 4 before letting the bay colt settle along the hedge in sixth going into the first turn. New Jersey shipper Ceevee led Corot and favorite Strike Power through a quarter mile in :24.17 and a half in :48.49. Have At It found a spot in fourth and Westerland set up just to his inside. Ortiz cocooned Rose's Vision along the rail, inside Westerland and Prioritize. Ortiz's cocoon looked more like a steel cage as Strike Power began to backpedal and the rest of the field cut the corner or swung wide into the stretch. Passing the quarter pole, Rose's Vision slid to second-to-last.

Far from alarmed, Ortiz aimed Rose's Vision outside Strike Power, getting past him nearing the eighth pole. While Ortiz was waiting, Ceevee and Corot tried to hang tough, Have At It kicked and Prioritize circled. Slicing between Strike Power and Ceevee, Rose's Vision accelerated along the rail as Have At It angled toward him. As the fourth choice reached Rose's Vision, he swapped to his left lead for a stride, bobbled slightly, swapped back to his right lead before wrestling a neck advantage over Have At It. Ortiz stood up at the wire, swiped his right hand down Rose's Vision's mane twice and slapped him on the neck, like a high five to a wing-

man. Rose's Vision pricked his ears for the first time since the post parade.

"Things roll off him like nothing, he's got nerves of steal," Simon said. "He goes off by himself in the post parade, Jose had him standing on the outside fence watching the grandstand. He was just looking around, he's a cool customer, he wastes no energy on bad stuff. He just puts it all in the right focus."

Rose's Vision needed his focus after a potentially taxing 2018 campaign. He broke his maiden at Gulfstream Park in February, came right back to win an allowance on the turf at Keeneland in April. From there, he finished sixth in the Grade 3 Marine on Woodbine's synthetic track, second in the Queen's Plate Trial in June and 14th in the 10-furlong Queen's Plate June 30. Simon knew the latter might have been a bridge too far.

"We thought it was probably too far but he ran good enough in the Trial that you've got to try for a million bucks. We thought all along he's a turf miler, maybe a mile and an eighth, that's his game. We got kind of got chasing," Simon said. "You always worry, it was really hot, he ran hard, then give in, you're always concerned, but he did seem to take the race OK. The next morning, he had eaten up, he was perky, he seemed to bounce out of it surprisingly well. We're not really aggressive training in the morning because he's done a lot in the evenings and the afternoons, you just have to tick him along and he'll do the rest."

Unfazed by the Queen's Plate debacle, Rose's Vision returned to the turf with a solid second in the

Toronto Cup. If he had won that, Simon would have sent him here for the Grade 3 Saranac Saturday. Instead, he was still eligible for the Better Talk Now, restricted to 3-year-olds who had never won a sweepstakes at a mile or over.

"He's an honest little horse when he gets a chance. The only time he's been worse than third on the turf was his first lifetime race, where he got a real tough trip," Simon said. "It's thrilling. We've won big races at a lot of different racetracks, but this is the ultimate place to win. Especially a stake race, it's not like we came here and won a claiming race, it's nice to come and prove you belong with good horses and good people."

Simon has been proving that since starting with a few claimers in Western Canada in 1983. Shortys Lad won a claimer worth \$1,900, Dad's Delivery provided another win nine days later in a maiden claimer worth \$1,600 at Regina. That was Simon's start. From there, he hung a shingle

at Marquis Downs before moving to Stampede Park in 1988. He won at least 20 races from 1990 through 2008.

In 2009, Simon slipped to 19 wins, but it was far from a slip in quality. Before that season, Simon listened to trainers/friends, Loren Richards and Terry Jordan, and a jocks' agent, Danny Williams. They convinced Simon to venture to the bright lights and big city of Woodbine Racetrack in Ontario.

"They went there and they kept saying, 'Stuart, you should come out here, you should come out here,' " Simon said. "Racing out (west) was going backwards and Woodbine was really rolling, still is. It was a big move, like going from Canterbury Downs to New York. We thought we might as well try it, we've made a couple of jumps and it keeps being good to us."

No horse has been as good to Simon as Atlantic Hurricane. Simon claimed her for \$40,000 in 2011. Racing for Simon, Carl Hollick and Brent and Russ Mclellan, the Florida-bred won seven races, including three Grade 3 stakes and was voted Canada's champion female sprinter in 2011.

"I owe most of it to her. She helped get me Chiefswood Stable about seven years ago," Simon said, as he collected his papers from the racing office. "They breed and raise, we just try to progress young horses into being good horses. That's where all of our energy goes. Chiefswood will give you every chance, any of their horses could turn out to be anything. You hit on the right thing, it could take you anywhere."

Simon turned to his wife, Valerie, and smiled.

"Like here," he said. "Like here."

One of a Kind

Once a day, or at least it seemed like that much, John Harrell would pick up his phone around mid-morning, punch in 10 numbers, wait a few seconds and call out "Asher" not quite at the top of his lungs but certainly loud enough for anyone within earshot to hear.

The Asher was of course John Asher, who passed away Monday and left a chasm the size of the Grand Canyon in the Thoroughbred industry. John and John were longtime friends, Louisvillians through and through. They loved the Kentucky Derby, Churchill Downs, everything about the Derby city, music, food and so much more.

The memories of those phone calls – 20 years ago when I was starting out on the staff at Thoroughbred Times – came flooding back as news of Asher's passing came to light. The conversations didn't last long, Harrell probably picking Asher's brain about some racing tidbit or sharing a fact he'd uncovered about the Derby during his personal research.

For a few months the name Asher was only that, a name I'd hear or see at the top of Churchill Downs' barn notes or press releases. I'd see him on the simulcast feed and even sat next to him at the 1996 Breeders' Cup at Woodbine. Asher worked for WHAS radio in Louisville then, no doubt providing listeners in Louisville the top-tier coverage that earned him five Eclipse Awards before he went to work for Churchill.

We exchanged hellos and idle chit-chat, but didn't know each other.

That changed in the days leading up to the 1998 Breeders' Cup at Churchill Downs when John introduced me to John.

"Tom, this is my friend John Asher," Harrell said one morning in the old Churchill press box. "If you ever need anything, call John, he's the best."

Then Harrell flipped the script.

of him out here this week and down the road. Tom

started with us a few months ago. He's from Saratoga."

The conversation from there went where if often does when the word Saratoga comes up. Asher, a racing man who could appreciate a big event, wanted to know what it was like growing up in Saratoga when the show came to town every summer. To no one's surprise, John Asher and I became fast friends.

Harrell left Thoroughbred Times a few years later to take a job closer to home and his wife and young daughter and eventually landed his dream spot on the editorial staff at the Louisville Courier-Journal. He passed away suddenly at age 37 in April 2003, right before his favorite time of year, Derby season.

his funeral and mentioned that Asher would be one, too. Someone suggested that I should prepare some remarks – a strange concept for a 32-year-old mourning the passing of his 37-year-old friend and colleague. Asher eventually became the point man to deliver Harrell's eulogy. He proved to be the right man for the job – just as he did for more than 21 years at Churchill Downs – and hit it out of the park with class, sincerity and emotion.

We'd talk about our late friend, and many other topics. One of our favorites was running. Asher was a runner and I liked hearing about his progress through the Louisville Triple Crown road races each spring, always trying to convince him to join me in the Derby Festival Half Marathon.

"I'm a little busy for that one," he'd say, "Maybe one day I'll join you on the Bourbon Chase."

It's sad to think that will never happen, and even more sad to think about Churchill Downs and the Kentucky Derby without John Asher.

What will Louisville be like without its greatest ambassador of all things First Saturday in May? We'll get a glimpse come October and November "John, this is Tom Law, you're going to see a lot when the Breeders' Cup returns to Churchill Downs, but the full blast won't come until next April.

One of the best parts of the president's post of the National Turf Writers And Broadcasters is contacting individuals who will be honored at the organization's annual awards dinner the Wednesday prior to the Breeders' Cup. Two calls were at the top of my Monday to-do list - to Mike Smith and Donna Barton Brothers - and both involved Asher.

"What a loss," said Smith, the Mr. Fitz Award winner for typifying the spirit of racing. "He was such an amazing guy, so smart, so passionate. I just saw him the other day, when we paraded Justify at Churchill Downs. I'm going to miss him; it won't be the same there without him."

Brothers, winner of the Jim McKay Award for Harrell's wife asked me to be a pallbearer at excellence in broadcasting, couldn't hide her emotions on the phone or in an email that night.

"It seems fitting that I learned of this honor on the same day - and within the same 60 to 90 minutes - that I learned of John Asher's passing since he's really the person who got me started on this path," she wrote. "After retiring from riding in 1998, spending the winter in New Orleans at Fair Grounds with my husband (Frank Brothers) and dabbling in some minor TV stuff here and there, upon returning to Churchill Downs in the spring of 1999 John asked me if I'd have any interest in assuming his role as paddock handicapper.

"He'd been promoted . . . and would no longer have time to share the role of handicapping with Mike Battaglia. I jumped at the opportunity even though I was not sure I was suited for the role. And then it was while doing the on-air racing analysis with Battaglia that NBC saw my work when they were at Churchill during Derby Week in 2000 . . . Unbeknownst to me they were also looking for an on-track reporter and it's because of John that I was in the right place at the right time. In any case, I have John Asher to thank for all of this, including this unfathomable honor and on the day of his passing."

Rest in peace John Asher. You were the best.

Saturday at Saratoga, trainer Dale Romans won the Grade 1 H. Allen Jerkens Stakes with Promises Fulfilled. The 3-year-old blitzed eight others, won his second graded stakes of the meet, led a 1-2 finish for his trainer and took the lead among the country's 3-year-old sprinters. Afterward, Romans took part in all the official winner's circle stuff - handshakes, congratulations, photos, yadda, yadda, yadda.

Then he did something cool. In the midst of the hubbub he leaned over and spoke to trainer Jimmy Jerkens, who presented the trophy in memory of his father. The two men stepped away from the crowd, with the trophy, and posed for a separate photo just the two of them.

Pretty classy move.

"He meant a lot to me," Romans said of Allen Jerkens. "My barn was right beside his at Gulfstream and we spent a lot of time socializing over the years and him advising me. Winning that race was extra special for sure."

Romans, 52, first came to Saratoga when he was 26, and was immediately struck by the history of mal. Not this time. the place - with Jerkens a big part of it.

"I felt like I stepped into a movie," Romans said. "All the people I read about my whole childhood were here and he was one of the biggest. I saw him sitting on the pony. It took me two years to talk to him."

October 6, 2000. I was covering the jump races at Colonial Downs in Virginia. Dynamite Vic won the first. The second, the Zeke Ferguson Memorial Stakes, attracted nine including stars All Gong, Rowdy Irishman, Ninepins and Pompeyo. Spring Salute freaked and upset everybody with Al Skywalker second and heavy favorite Pompeyo third.

Behind them all, early leader Darn Tipalarm fell hard at the last fence. His jockey, Jonathan Thomas, wound up in the Richmond hospital and I stopped

on my way home to check on him. I've seen plenty of jump jockeys fall, and the typical hospital visit involves a broken collarbone, arm, wrist, something. He or she is hurt, but not incapacitated. The nurses usually allow visitors. You stop in, say hello, tell the jock, "Get better, OK? Can I get you something?"

Once a ride home is organized, it's all pretty nor-

where I was going.

"To see Jonathan Thomas, the jockey," I said.

"Are you family?"

"Uh, no, I guess not."

"Nobody can see him except family."

"Is his family here?"

"Not yet, but they're on the way."

Then I realized what they were saying. This was not your typical jump-jockey fall. Nobody unrelated to Jonathan Thomas was getting in to see Jonathan Thomas. He'd suffered a spinal injury, and things were pretty shaky. I took a long walk back to the parking garage, and an even longer drive home.

Thomas won 13 races in his first two seasons – that's a lot for an American jump jockey. Though he rode a handful of more races in 2006, he never won again. Of course, Thomas slowly launched a new

career as a trainer. And Saturday he won the Travers with Catholic Boy. I hope somebody tells the nurses.

One of my great racing memories will forever be when I stood next to John Asher and watched Lonesome Glory win at Churchill Downs in 1998. John rarely watched a live race then. He was doing pre-race analysis for Churchill in the paddock, and spent the in-between time in his office where he could watch the races on television.

He said he wanted to see a true champion live. so we watched the future Hall of Famer bomb seven others in the Grade 1 Hard Scuffle steeplechase stakes on what I think was closing day of Churchill's spring meet.

Asher was impressed by the horse, proud of him. So was I, but the man was pretty cool too. He did the seemingly impossible – made me appreciate one of Thoroughbred racing's all-time great horses a little bit more.

I also got the feeling that he was simply happy The nurses stopped me at the desk and asked that Churchill got a chance to showcase such a standout horse and that such a standout horse got a chance to grace Churchill with his presence.

> Asher was the unofficial/official ambassador between racing fans and all things Kentucky Derby. Officially, he was the vice president of racing communications but there was way more to it than that.

> Asher died of a heart attack Monday, at age 62, while vacationing with his family in Florida. The five-time Eclipse Award winner was a giant in our industry. He will be missed for any number of reasons: his work with Churchill Downs, his love of the Western Kentucky Hilltoppers, his musical advice (I know who James McMurtry is because of John), the joy he showed in his family and a love of all things racing.

> I hope there's a John Asher Stakes at Churchill someday. Watch it in person if you can.



The Travers feature, written in the waning hours of a torrid Saturday at Saratoga, finished at 1,613 words. Cutting and pasting, scrapping and accentuating, at one point, I had five ledes and a dozen kickers about Catholic Boy and owner Bob LaPenta, trainer Jonathan Thomas and jockey Javier Castellano. By the end, a writer just has to let it go, hand it to your editor, in my case, it always goes into the capable hands of Joe and Tom. They make it fit, make it better.

In the cold light of Tuesday afternoon, I looked back at the file called, "Travers didn't use." It was 1,115 words. Here's the best of what didn't make it the first time.

Thomas in the paddock before the race: "I love three quarters of a mile, just to keep him sharp so going back to the holding barn in these big races, seeing all the horses, I still wouldn't trade mine. We'll get a position, if someone's going to do something stupid, we can rate. He'll break him away from the pony and warm him up, he can carry it. I don't want to get intimidated by the distance and try to ride to get the trip, which would be completely contrary to what he does best."

Thomas about buying Catholic Boy at Keeneland January in 2016: "It was January, I was by myself, looking for a horse to buy for these guys. He was angular, athletic horse, it was cold, snowy and he just stood, all the other horses were moving around. It was horrible, like it was 10 below. I let him RNA and grabbed the guys and we did the deal in the back ring. I was just buying him, at that time, we weren't training racehorses.'

Thomas on Catholic Boy's week of training before the Travers: "I changed up a little bit, knowing gave him a paddock school, he didn't gallop over low. That was a low."

young, they meld. My most vivid race was Ferdinand winning the (Kentucky) Derby, like vivid. Birdstone was my most memorable (Travers). I was trying to ride. I think I was leaving here to go to work for Jack, or maybe I was starting to work for Clement. I watched it from the backside, I got out of my car, I didn't care that it was raining, I remember hearing them come around the turn."

LaPenta on his history with the Travers: "I started coming here when I was 18 or 19. I've seen some great Travers. We've had some ups and downs, we got close with The Cliff's Edge. The most difficult year was when...I would buy some horses in the sale, sell some, pinhook. To this day, I don't know wasn't drinking that day.' I don't know what hap- I was too far back and got there. Keen Ice, nobody pened, I sold Stay Thirsty to Mike Repole. When he could beat American Pharoah, thinking be third or he would get the trip. I really kept him fresh the last ran in the Travers that day (in 2011), that's the only fourth, we got lucky. This horse, man, he's a good seven days, we jogged him a lot, cantered a little bit, Travers I missed since I'm 18 years old. That was a

LaPenta on dealing with that low: "It's life, sometimes the harder you fall, the harder it is to get up, but the stronger you are to move forward and that's what I did. What that represents today is what life is all about. This horse is a blue-collar horse that nobody really thought a lot about, what he's got is heart and determination. I've had more horses than I care to admit, but The Cliff's Edge and him, they're two of my greatest horses, ever. And I've had some good ones, War Pass, Dialed In, it's been unbelievable. Keep fighting. Blue collar. My father never made more than \$50 a week. The Lord was good to me. Fought hard. Fought hard. This was not a gift. This was hard work. But in the end, God allowed this to happen. That's why I say, take me to church."

Castellano: "He won a Grade 1 on the grass in Thomas about indelible races: "When you're New York, then you put him on the dirt and he wins the Travers, can you imagine how good is the horse? You can do anything you want with him, you want to go to the lead, you can go to the lead, you want to take him back, you can take him back. Working him every time built a lot of confidence, you know what you have in your hands, when I warmed him up, I was like, 'This is my track.' Just the way he warmed up, he came out of there, boom, like a rocket. I was in control all the way."

Castellano on six Travers wins: "Bernardini was pushbutton. Afleet Express, he was OK. I won on Stay Thirsty, you had to pedal, you had to pedal, he was not pushbutton, you had to work hard, I think we got lucky, the right place, the right time. how I did it, whenever I think about it, I say, 'I Then V. E. Day, I don't know where it came from, horse. (Knocks wood). Keep your fingers crossed, keep him healthy and you might see anything."
