He was as good a guy as you could ever meet, he'd say, 'That, Allen, he think he know everything.'



With Tom Amoss

Tom Amoss remembers the firsts at Saratoga. First as a fan. First as an assistant. First as a trainer.

"My first time to Saratoga was 1983," Amoss said Tuesday morning. "I had graduated college during the summer, and I came up here for a week before I started work at the track. Al Stall came with me. He was still in school; he had another half a semester to go. We spent a week up here going to the races."

Four years later, Amoss had a badge and a job.

"My first year up here was 1987 as an assistant trainer for John Parisella," Amoss said. "Our barn was at the three-eighths pole, and I saw Lady's Secret, it was an early race, an allowance race, she was overwhelming favorite and she bolted right out of the gate. Literally, when she came by me, I could have reached out and touched her she was so close to the outside fence. That was an amazing thing to see."

Thirteen years later, Amoss was here for good.

"After that, I guess, the year Heritage Of Gold won my first Grade 1 was my first full-time to be a trainer up here," Amoss said. "It's a special place. You come up here and it's like drinking from the Fountain of Youth, I'm getting ready to be 62 years old and I've been doing this a long time. You come up here and it just rejuvenates you. It's a special place, it's a throwback, the town centers around it, it's fun to feel like you're a part of something."

With 15 horses stabled in Pat (and T.J.) Kelly's old barn deep in the corner of the Yaddo trees, 36 bedded down at Churchill Downs and another 20 at Ellis Park, Amoss is well on his way to another solid year.

"It's unusual for us to be in three spots. Typically, we like to be in two spots. By the standards of what stables are nowadays, I guess, we have a little less horses than usual. If we were considered a large stable, we'd be considered on the very small side of a large stable," Amoss said. "We know what we can handle, we've been bigger, but we don't do as good a job when we get any bigger than that. We like to keep it this size."

Amoss has produced 47 wins and \$2,310,632 this year. He's won four races from 10 starts at Saratoga this summer. And has a strong group of 2-year-olds in Kentucky.

"Back in Kentucky, those horses are just start-



ing to gear up," Amoss said. "Our feeling with the young horses is if they're really, really showing they want to do it early, then full steam ahead, but otherwise, September-ish is when we try to start getting it going. That's typically what we did with Hoosier Philly and others like her last year, things really gear up in September and October with the young horses."

Amoss walked his shedrow with The Special's Sean Clancy during the 8:30 break Tuesday morning.

Ba Dee Yah: Ontario-bred daughter of Uncle Mo finished sixth in her debut Aug. 13. "Just ran this past weekend on the grass here, was middle of the pack but it was a get-acquainted race. We think she's got a pretty good future. We bought her at the Fasig-Tipton Sale this past October. We use Lauren Carlisle as our bloodstock agent on some of our horses. She bought this horse for Gold Standard Racing who also has Hoosier Philly, which is one of our best horses in the barn. She was due to run up here in the Coaching Club and came up with a little bruise in her foot. She's back on the track and doing well."

Need Some Money: A \$9,000 yearling, the daughter of Street Sense joined Amoss' barn through a \$50,000 claim in May. "I don't have any peppermints for you, mama. She's in Wednesday, it's a starter race on the turf. She doesn't have any experience on the grass, but she's a quirky kind of horse. She doesn't like dirt in her

face. Her best races are when she can get outside and make a late run. We're going to take a shot on the grass, now it looks like it's going to rain off, if it does, we'll stay in and see if we can get the job done. We can't breeze her on the grass because she's run for a claim, so we're stuck."

Girl Named Charlie: Owned by Jerry Caroom and Jeffrey Lambert, the 3-year-old filly finished sixth in the Searching Stakes at Laurel Saturday. "She's a stakes winner from down at the Fair Grounds. Grass horse for us, will probably run toward the end of the meet in an allowance race."

Higgins Boat: Owned by Ensemble Racing II, the son of Omaha Beach finished seventh in his debut at Churchill Downs June 1. Tuesday morning, the bay colt was stretched out like an afternoon drinker. "It's actually a pretty cool name. In World War II, when they invaded Normandy and hit the beaches, the boats were invented by a guy named Higgins who is from New Orleans. The World War II Museum has one of those boats in it. I like him. I'm looking for a maiden race for him at the end of the meet."

Sixtythreecaliber: Owned by MyRacehorse and Spendthrift Farm, the daughter of Gun Runner sports a stellar 6-for-12 career mark. She won the Grade 3 Comely in November and an allowance here July 19. "She's been very productive for us, we're going to swing for the fences and run in the Personal Ensign (Aug. 25) against the best, Nest, Clairiere, et cetera."

Lyrical Pardon: A \$190,000 graduate from the Fasig-Tipton Kentucky Fall Mixed Sale in 2021, Late Night Stable's 2-year-old filly finished seventh in her debut at Ellis and fourth here Aug. 9. "Justify filly. We ran her on the dirt, and she disappointed us because she trained so well. We breezed her on the grass and we liked the way she breezed a lot but her race got rained off, so we had to run her on the dirt again. One of the things about Saratoga is if you are scheduled for the grass and it goes to the dirt and you still run, you preserve your (preference) date. The only way we could get another chance to run her was to stay in the race. She was fourth. Look for on the grass Labor Day weekend."

Rally Squirrel: Owned by Larry Law, the 5-year-old son of Mshawish owns four wins and joined Amoss' barn through a \$10,000 claim at Ellis Park June 15. Another one lying down sleeping. "He's in Friday, he's the only New York-bred I have. I claimed him in his last start in Kentucky because he was a New York-bred, he's got both dirt and grass form. If the race were to get rained off, we'd probably go ahead and stay in and run."

Alys Beach: Owned by Greg Tramontin, the daughter of Omaha Beach won her debut here July 30. "The one who you wrote about. She's 1-for-1. She came out of the race and has really gotten a big understanding of what she's supposed to do. She's into her training a little bit more, we often see that with horses who make a start and go to their second start. We're probably going to run in the Spinaway, which is going to be a who's who of impressive maiden winners here at Saratoga. If you look at her hind end, I bought her for that. When she came out of the stall and I looked at her, I said, 'Man oh man, she's going to have to have a lot wrong with her up front for me not to want to buy her.' "

Icy Stare Down. A \$95,000 purchase at the Fasig-Tipton Kentucky Fall Yearling Sale in 2020, the Ontario-bred daughter of Frosted sniffed a reporter's notebook Tuesday morning. "This is Icy Stare Down. We claimed this horse here at Saratoga, it's the only claim we have so far. We'll run her back at the end of August. She did not run well the day we claimed her, but I really like the way she's trained for us. She gets around the track well, she's enthusiastic about her workouts. When we first got her, she was mean, mean, mean and now she's a kind girl. We have a real advantage back here, I love this. You come midday; every horse is laying down. A lot of guys want to be up front, close to the track, not me, not me. This is like being on a farm. I love it."

Broughty Ferry: Another one racked out and unbothered by the tour. Owned by Joel Politi, the daughter of Audible has breezed twice on the turf and once on the dirt at Saratoga this summer. "Unstarted 2-year-old filly. We've been practicing on the grass with her. There's a very good chance

that her start here will be a grass start for us. Look, it's the middle of the morning, look at how many horses are laying down, it's such an advantage in my opinion."

Noriskit Nobiscuit: Two-year-old daughter of Omaha Beach finished sixth in her debut here for Politi. "This is a filly we ran last week. She tensed up a lot during the race and didn't have her breathing as good as it could be, we performed a little minor surgery on her, a myectomy. That should help her a lot for her second start. She trains very, very well."

Win For Speight: Owned by Greg Tramontin, the daughter of Speightstown has breezed twice on the dirt and twice on the turf at Saratoga. "She's unstarted, she's a May foal, we're hoping to have her ready to run by the end of the meet here. She's shown grass and dirt to us. Another 2-year-old, I've introduced a lot of the 2-year-olds here, we're heavy in that."

Storm The Court: A graduate of the Fasig-Tipton Kentucky February Mixed Sale, the millionaire son of Court Vision has breezed four times at Saratoga, including a 5-furlong turf move in 1:02.90 Aug. 6. "The horse out walking right now is probably the most interesting horse. He won the (2019) Breeders' Cup Juvenile out in California. He's had a few tries with different guys. I'm the guy who's got him now, off the layoff. He's going to run on Saturday in an allowance race on the grass here. If we were to get rained out, we'd run him on the dirt as well. He's trained well for us; I like him in his comeback. I've had him for probably two and a half months. We'll see what happens there. I'm looking forward to that."

Hoosier Philly: Gold Standard's standard has banked four wins and \$644,510 in her seven-race career. The daughter of Into Mischief owns three stakes wins, including the Grade 2 Golden Rod in November. "We mentioned her a little bit. We missed our race and based on the rules we have with HISA, you can't work back right away when you have to withdraw from a race. The Alabama was a target, but it's a mile and a quarter and we're not going to be able to be ready for that. We're going to run in an alternative race, the West Virginia Oaks that same weekend, it's seven-eighths. It's disappointing because we really wanted to run here at Saratoga with her."

One last question. Pointing to the initials on the back of some of Amoss' webbings. Who is DJV?

"Oh, you're getting too smart. Dwight J. Viator was a friend of mine and he got out of racing. We had the same colors. But he had initials on his webbings, he asked me if I would buy all his stuff, blankets to fans, I bought it all. I just turned the webbings inside out, so you can't see them, they're still blue. You can't see his initials unless the stable guard is open."

Viator, who died in 2020 at age 67, trained 462 winners from 2,895 starts, retiring in 2020. His best horse, Brownsboro, won the Grade 3 Louisiana Downs Handicap in 1989. His webbings are still going strong at Saratoga.



Aiming High

Antonacci, Thundara take swing at stakes BY SEAN CLANCY

Nehantic Kat won three times, including the 2009 Yaddo, at Saratoga. Her daughter Thundara is 1-for-1 at the Spa and makes her stakes debut in today's Suzie O'Cain Stakes.

The \$125,000 stakes, restricted to 3-year-old New York-bred fillies, attracted nine starters for its 1 1/16-mile journey on the inner turf. The eighth race on the nine-race card runs at 5:10 p.m.

Owned by Lindy Farms and trained by Philip Antonacci, Thundara spots experience to all her rivals and is 12-1 on the morning line. Hall of Famer Javier Castellano takes the call.

Tuesday morning, assistant Tyler Rosenkranz walked the shedrow of Antonacci's barn deep inside the Horse Haven track and introduced the diminutive chestnut filly.





"The first time I saw her on the farm, she did this little dog flutter on my arm. From there, I thought, 'You're a little bit smarter than the others,' "he said. "I spent more and more time with her, and we ended up becoming really good friends. I was lucky enough to name her. I knew she would run like her mom, and it was very nice to see her break her maiden like her mom."

Nehantic Kat won her debut going 5 ½ furlongs on the dirt at Saratoga for Statehouse Stable and trainer Barclay Tagg in 2006. She came back the next year and posted two thirds. A year later, she took an allowance race and finished fourth in the Mollie Wilmot Stakes. The following year, she captured the Yaddo Stakes, the traditional New York-bred filly and mare turf stakes at Saratoga. She finished her career with a second in the Grade 2 Sheepshead Bay in 2010.

Antonacci purchased Thundara for \$40,000 at the Fasig-Tipton Kentucky Fall Yearling Sale in 2021 and knew he would play a waiting game.

"She's an English Channel filly, they can be fairly later developing so we took our time, she had a very solid foundation," Antonacci said. "Racing as a 2-year-old for her wasn't even in the cards. Just let her come to herself. We always liked her to a level,

but she definitely came to her own on race day."

Thundara made her debut for a \$40,000 tag against New York-bred fillies and mares here July 13. Equipped with blinkers, a ring bit and a shadow roll, Thundara broke outwardly from the outside post before sliding over to a spot just off the vanguard. From there, she pulled Irad Ortiz Jr. into seventh, stayed wide, circling past rivals to the front. In the stretch, she drifted out, then in and then gone. She won by 1 ½ lengths over Arisaema, 0-for-9 in her career, and Jannie Mae, 0-for-13 in her career.

"She came out of that race really well, put on weight and has been training well," Antonacci said. "For a New York-bred 3-year-old filly long on the grass this is kind of her only shot the rest of the year to face restricted company. She gave us all the signs to take a shot. Obviously, she has to improve off her last race, hopefully she can step up to that level."

Antonacci, 28, sent out his first runner in November 2020. The Darley Flying Start graduate produced three wins from 28 starts in 2021 and improved that to seven wins from 62 starts in 2022. This year, he's sent out three winners from 27 starters. Like all trainers, Saratoga is the goal. Antonacci just missed winning his first stakes in 2021 when Fauci fell a neck short in the Mahony. Last season,



he won two races from 12 starts at Saratoga. This year, he's collected two wins from seven starts at Saratoga.

"We have a small stable so for us we have to pick our spots. We go to Florida for the wintertime but we're not very active," Antonacci said. "For us, Saratoga is a very important meet and we kind of save up all year to get these horses primed and peaking toward Saratoga. A lot of our owners and clients, they enjoy Saratoga more than anything else. The horses are running to their form so it's fulfilling to the team. One horse lost by a bob and Fauci had a hard-closing second so we could be at four winners but there's a lot of could bes in this game."

From a long-established family in Standardbred racing, Antonacci has 15 horses at Saratoga and 12 at his family's farm in Somers, Conn., about two hours from Saratoga. They built a 7-furlong woodchip gallop to leg up and freshen horses. He spends Monday to Wednesday on the farm and the rest of the week in Saratoga.

"I grew up on the farm and worked as assistant for my brother when he trained Standardbreds so it's kind of all I knew growing up," Antonacci said. "Just started spending a few summers in Saratoga, following around Wesley (Ward) and then went down to Australia and worked for Gai Waterhouse, she pushed me to do the Flying Start program. It's been a snowball of interest; I love horses and love being competitive and winning races."

Silver Skillet attracted favoritism at 2-1 on the morning line. The daughter of Liam's Map won a New York-bred allowance race against older rivals on the turf here July 15 to improve her record to two wins from seven starts. Owned by Reeves Thoroughbreds, Steven Rocco and Tango Uniform Racing, the gray filly switched to the turf and finished second by a neck at Belmont Park June 10. Trained by Christophe Clement and ridden by Joel Rosario, Silver Skillet breaks from post five.

Orange Freeze seeks her second stakes win at the meet after taking the New York Stallion Series Statue of Liberty Stakes July 19. Bella Cavello Stable and trainer Bill Morey claimed the daughter of Freud for \$40,000 in her previous start at Belmont Park June 23. Flavien Prat takes over for Rosario on the 5-1 shot from post seven.

Three fillies earned 6-1 odds on the morning line. Berkshire Stud's homebred Kosuke won her debut in April for trainer Jim Bond. The daughter of Karakontie returned with back-to-back thirds against allowance foes at Belmont and here July 15.

Jose Ortiz takes over from apprentice Jaime Torres. The bay filly breaks from the rail.

Smokie Eyes breaks from stall two for Reeves Thoroughbreds, Darlene Bilinski and Steven Rocco. Trained by Clement, the daughter of Nyquist hasn't won since breaking her maiden at Aqueduct at Belmont in October but posted two sharp stakes tries against open company in the Chelsea Flower and Tepin to close her juvenile season. This year, the dark bay filly faded to fifth in an off-the-turf allowance at Belmont and faded again when seventh in a New York-bred allowance May 29. Irad Ortiz Ir. rides for the first time.


Collaboration aims for her third career win for Barry Schwartz and Linda Rice. The daughter of English Channel and Schwartz's stakes winner Parc Monceau won a New York-bred allowance at Belmont in June and finished seventh in a New York-bred second-level allowance here July 19. 

Rematch

Cab Calloway's top three meet again in Rick Violette Stakes

What's horse racing if not a family sport? Visit Danny Gargan's barn to find brothers standing in adjacent stalls.

Ramblin' Wreck will attempt to outdo his older half-brother Dakota Gold and win this year's Rick Violette Stakes, the feature on Thursday's card at Saratoga Race Course.

Dakota Gold was the heavy favorite in last year's Violette but came up a head short of Practice Squad. Ramblin' Wreck hasn't finished out of the exacta since last November. He brings in a record of 2-2-0 from seven starts and \$270,710 in earnings. The son of Redesdale breaks from the rail in the 1 1/16-mile turf stakes for New Yorkbreds and is the 9-5 favorite on the morning line.

Ramblin' Wreck finished second, beaten a neck by Itsallcomintogetha, in the Cab Calloway division of the New York Stallion Series Stakes July 20 at Saratoga.

Vacation Dance looks to stretch out and adds blinkers for trainer John Kimmel, who hopes the equipment change will ignite some focus in the 3-year-old son of The Lieutenant. Vacation Dance finished third in the Cab Calloway, 4 3/4 lengths back.

THURSDAY STRAKES PREVIEW

"He didn't really show the kind of speed we were expecting of him," Kimmel said. "He just kind of sat in behind. Looked like he had a perfect trip but didn't really finish that well. We're adding blinkers for this race and hopefully that will kind of help focus him a little more."

Vacation Dance broke his maiden in his debut here going 5 1/2 furlongs on the turf. He's run in 6- and 7-furlong turf races since, along with a try on the dirt and last time out going 1 mile.

"This will be his last shot at going longer distances on the turf and if he, to my expectations, doesn't run a little better with blinkers, he'll go back to sprinting," Kimmel said.

Hilly Fields Stable's homebred Itsallcomintogetha looks for back-to-back stakes wins for trainer Phil Serpe. The son of Weekend Hideaway meets Ramblin' Wreck and Vacation Dance again, along with Willintoriskitall, who finished fourth in the Cab Calloway.

King Of Comedy, winner of a state-bred allowance at 9 furlongs on the grass July 2 at Belmont Park; and

Let's Go Big Blue, a winner in a 1-mile state-bred allowance here Aug. 3, complete the field.



Casa Creed catches Annapolis in Grade 1

Bill Mott jumped out of his clubhouse box seconds after Casa Creed collared Annapolis in the Grade 1 Fourstardave at Saratoga Saturday.

"That was ----- amazing, huh?" Uh huh.

Bounding down the steps toward the winner's circle, Mott explained his amazement.

"I knew they were going to try to get first run on us and they did," Mott said. "That was the same kind of effort Elite Power put in, they didn't have to get there. This horse didn't have to get there today. That horse had the jump on him turning for home, which is what they wanted, and he just ran him down."

Four-year-old Annapolis, indeed, got first run. Seven-year-old Casa Creed, decisively, got last run. And, yeah, it looked similar to when the Mott-



trained Elite Power went after and wore down Gunite to win the Grade 1 Vanderbilt earlier in the meet.

In a rematch from opening weekend's Grade 3 Kelso, when Casa Creed moved first and held off Annapolis, the playbooks flipped with Annapolis kicking to a lead turning for home. Casa Creed lowered down, stretched and ran down his rival.

Owned by LRE Racing and JEH Racing Stable, the son of Jimmy Creed added his ninth victory to a 33-start career and pushed his earnings to \$2,460,308. In a race named after a Saratoga legend who won at least one race (six stakes) eight years in a row here, Casa Creed won for the fifth

time (fourth stakes), in his sixth season at Saratoga.

"That's something you can't pick out. You lead them up on a shank and you don't know. You just never know," Mott said. "He's been very sound. Most horses as they get older, they'll improve if they're sound. This horse, he's sound and he's kept his desire. He gives it to you, he digs in and gives it to you. He likes the game."

Loves the game.

Casa Creed broke alertly from post six in the seven-horse field, moved forward four wide, before moving over two wide, just outside Annapolis. The rematch was on. My Sea Cottage led through a quarter-mile in :23.31. So High eased off him in second. Annapolis and Irad Ortiz Jr. settled in third with Casa Creed and Luis Saez lapped onto him from the outside. Emmanuel found a spot in fifth with Full Screen, who blew the first turn, unsettled in sixth and Ice Chocolat well back in last.

My Sea Cottage rolled through a half mile in :46.57 as Ortiz positioned Annapolis outside So High and inside Casa Creed. Into the turn, My Sea Cottage led and Annapolis pulled Ortiz into second while Saez began to nudge on Casa Creed, 2 length be-

hind his main foe. Turning for home Annapolis engaged My Sea Cottage as Ortiz switched his whip to his left hand and Annapolis momentarily drifted out. All the while, Saez was in a full drive and Casa Creed was winding up like Tony Gwynn with two strikes.

"I didn't know at the quarter pole because those other two got away from him," Mott said. "It looked like they were going to pull it off but that's a pretty good horse that was chasing him."

Annapolis ran past My Sea Cottage nearing the eighth pole and looked home free. With Saez in his poised, perfect rhythm, Casa Creed did his best Elite Power and gradually wore down Annapolis, grudgingly a runner-up.

Making his fourth start in the Fourstardave (two wins, two thirds), Casa Creed collared Annapolis inside the sixteenth pole to win by three-quarters of a length. Casa Creed finished the mile on the inner turf in 1:34.20. Favorite Annapolis was a game second with fourth choice Ice Chocolat, who lost position when Full Screen drifted out into the first turn, closing for third.

"He's just one of those horses, knock on wood," Mott said, reaching for a paddock tree. "Some of them get some little aches and pains and it



holds them up, it hinders their form. But we've been fortunate with him. That's the whole thing with Channel Maker, he's been very sound all his life. Some of them aren't that lucky and we're not that lucky with some of the others."

Channel Maker, 9, won the Grade 3 Bowling Green July 30. Mott has garnered four graded stakes at the meet with three horses whose average age is 7.

Bred by Silver Springs Stud and picked out by Kenny McPeek for Lee Einsidler's LRE Racing at Keeneland September Sales for \$105,000, Casa Creed finished sixth going 6 furlongs on the dirt in his career debut here in 2018. Seven days later, he won going 7 furlongs on the dirt. He followed that with a seventh in the Grade 1 Champagne and a sixth in the Spendthrift Juvenile Stallion Stakes at Churchill Downs. Switched to the turf, he won the Kitten's Joy at Gulfstream Park in his 3-year-old debut and has never looked back.

Casa Creed added the Grade 2 Hall of Fame Stakes here in 2019. In 2020, he was winless but finished third in the Fourstardave. The Kentucky-bred took the Elusive Quality and the Grade 1 Jaipur in 2021. In 2022, he nabbed the Jaipur again and his first Fourstardave. This year, Casa Creed began with a second in the Grade 3

1351 Turf Sprint in Saudi Arabia before finishing third in the Jaipur and winning twice at Saratoga.

After the race, Mott congratulated groom Ana Urista, assistant Neil Poznansky and Einsidler. After the winner's circle photo, the Hall of Fame trainer walked up the stretch where Urista held and Poznansky hosed off the living legend, then Mott watched the trophy presentation outside the winner's circle next to photographers Skip Dickstein and Dave Harmon. Once the formalities were over, Mott shook the hand of Fourstardave's trainer Leo O'Brien, hugged his granddaughter Lerina and his daughter, Leona.

"We give him every chance. We've been lucky not to have any mishaps. it's hard to explain. We've trained him on good racetracks. He's had to go out there and gallop in the mud sometimes, but you just never know. He's a lighter made horse, he's kind of easy on himself. Got a little bit of knee action but he's not a big, heavy horse," Mott said. "He's been well taken care of. The people that I have around him are just terrific. Ana, she's a very good groom. He's always had a good groom. He's easy to ride. We don't always keep the same rider on him, just depends on the set list looks like. Everybody's had a chance to get on him. Neil makes the set sheet out and usually puts himself on him, I don't blame him."

A race after the Fourstardave, Mott legged up Joel Rosario on Forrest City and waited under a tree in the paddock. Seven horses later, Ortiz rode past on Ice Road.

"It was a good try," Mott said to the jockey.

He shook his head and didn't utter a word. The silent, painful taste of defeat.

Two-year-old Rhyme Schemes makes it look easy in Gr. 2 score

Ask Ricardo Santana Jr. about Rhyme Schemes and be prepared to wait. He'll take a long pause, remove his right glove, shake your hand, tell a young fan that he's not Trevor Mc-Carthy, look you in the eye and say softly, "He's a nice horse. I can't say much more. He's just a nice horse."

Aboard for all three starts and several breezes by the 2-year-old Ghostzapper colt, Santana felt that way before Saturday's Saratoga Special Stakes and was convinced afterward. Racing for Pura Vida Investments, Rhyme Schemes rallied from third early and fourth on the turn to pass Market Street and Woodcourt in the stretch while drawing off to win the Grade 2 stakes by a geared-down

9 1/2 lengths in 1:17.12 for 6 1/2 furlongs. Market Street finished second, three-quarters of a length ahead of Haul.

Trained by Norm Casse, the chestnut duplicated the winning margin of his maiden-breaker at Ellis Park in June and took aim at the Grade 1 Hopeful at Saratoga Race Course Sept. 4.

The win looked easy, felt easier.

"I was just a good passenger," Santana said. "When they're a good horse, you just try to be a good passenger. He's improving more and more and I'm really happy with him.

When I worked this horse the first time, I told Norm 'I don't know what type of 2-year-old this is, but he's a runner.' I told him I wanted to ride this one. He promised me I was going to ride him."

So far, so good. Rhyme Schemes finished sixth in his debut at Churchill Downs in May. A disappointed Santana hopped off and suggested blinkers. A month later came the lopsided maiden win, which brought along gaudy speed figures and new targets.

"When he broke his maiden we had options," said Casse, who splits his stable between Churchill and Saratoga this time of year. "We could have run him right back in the Bashford Manor (at Ellis July 2). We could have run him in the Sanford (here July 15). We decided on this. You've got to dream big sometimes and we wanted to win the Hopeful. We felt coming here in this spot and coming back in the Hopeful was the best way to do it."

A \$210,000 Keeneland September purchase by Pura Vida, Rhyme Schemes prepped for Saratoga with four July breezes at Churchill and then a final half-mile (:49.33) tightener at Saratoga a week before the

\$200,000 Special, run in memory of Thoroughbred Charities of America founder Herb Moelis this year.

The race lured six entrants. Haul cost \$260,000 at OBS April and won his debut at Belmont Park July 9. Edified cost \$650,000 as a yearling and won his debut at Ellis July 1. Ellis winners Woodcourt and Market Street joined the field along with Gulfstream Park maiden winner Lasso.

Casse was optimistic about his horse's chances, but knew where he was shipping. The Special dates to 1901, when it was winner-take-all and horses had to be nominated in sets of three for a single fee. Come race day, an owner could only run one horse. Winners include Sysonby, Colin, Roamer, Regret, Top Flight, Whirlaway, Native Dancer, Bold Forbes, Swale, Summer Squall and – far more recently – Jackie's Warrior.

"To me this is one of the most iconic races they run up here," Casse said. "To just be involved was humbling and to win it is just amazing."

The trainer thought Rhyme Schemes deserved his chance.

"From day one, you knew that he was a good horse," Casse said. "One of the things about him is you don't have to work him fast to know he's fast and that is when I think you find out a horse is really talented. He

doesn't do anything flashy, he does everything, but you can see he's got plenty of gear under him. But it's Saratoga. I don't expect anything here."

From the outside stall, Rhyme Schemes broke to his left and banged with Edified (who got crunched by Haul from the other side) before straightening and finding a stalking spot in third behind Market Street and Woodcourt through a first quarter-mile in :22.18. Lasso took third along the rail early on the turn, but Santana sat and waited. After a half in :45.71, Rhyme Schemes advanced on the leaders and came off the turn full of run. To his outside, Haul tried to keep pace. Santana looked under his right arm twice at the top of the stretch, once more at the three-sixteenths pole, and checked the infield video board twice while his horse built a daylight advantage. After one more glance at the sixteenth pole, the jockey said enough, put his hands down, stood taller in the stirrups, let his horse coast home and played pas-

senger.

While not quite a mirror-image to the Ellis race, the score confirmed Casse's opinion of his horse.

"That number was so big it was hard to believe it," the trainer said of the speed figure (a 94 on the Beyer scale). "I needed some more affirmation and I think we got it today. The only thing I was really concerned about today was if we go and get into a speed duel with somebody and we take away his nice rhythm. He broke slowly, it forced Ricardo to get him into his nice rhythm and he runs much better that way."

Pura Vida's Deuce Greathouse watched it and, like everyone else, left wide-eyed.

"You know I probably watch 50 races a day all year long," he said, "and you see, I don't know, five or 10 of those a year that kind of make the skin on your neck stand up."

L J's Emma uses late bid to land turf sprint stakes for Kenneally

Eddie Kenneally didn't need directions.

He didn't need anyone from the NYRA horsemen's relations team to show him the way to the Carmen Barrera Room for a well-earned cold bit of refreshment following L J's Emma's victory in Saturday's \$150,000 Galway Stakes at Saratoga Race Course.

"I know where it is, I've been there before," Kenneally joked as he made his way out of the winner's circle and through the crowd spilling from the porch to escape the rain.

Kenneally made his first trip to the spot reserved for the winning connections of the day's stakes in 2015 when Freudie Anne won the Statue of Liberty division of the New York Stal-

lion Series Stakes and well before the room was named for the late Barrera. L J's Emma gave Kenneally his fifth Saratoga stakes victory, getting up in the final strides to edge Stone Silent in the 5 ½-furlong turf stakes for 3-year-old fillies.

To say Kenneally expected to be in the hospitality room might be a stretch, but not completely out of line.

"Looking for some black type, guys, with a very well-bred filly," Kenneally said. "We thought she's on the improve, wanted to take a shot and it is a good place to showcase a quality filly like this. We weren't expecting to

win it, but thought she'd be competitive."

L J's Emma, a daughter of Into Mischief owned by John Gaynor, won by a neck under Luis Saez after a sustained run down the stretch at 17-1. She edged the 10-1 Stone Silent, who led by 1 1/2 lengths at the eighth pole, with 13-1 Isabel Alexandra third in the field of 10. Love Reigns, the 6-5 favorite who hadn't been out since winning the Limestone Stakes in mid-April at Keeneland, finished seventh. L J's Emma won in 1:02.27 over the turf rated good.

Kenneally, a Saratoga regular for several years before the pandemic, shipped L J's Emma in from his main base at Churchill Downs. He did the same last year with Just Cindy, winner of the Grade 3 Schuylerville on Opening Day 2022, and with By Your Side, winner of the Grade 3 Sanford on the third day of the 2019 meet.

L J's Émma won her third straight in the Galway, after taking a maiden special weight at Churchill Downs June 2 – under Saez – and an allowance race at Ellis Park July 16.

"The timing of this race was good from her most recent allowance race in Kentucky," said Kenneally, who also won the 2016 Sanford with Bitumen. "The timing was great and I'm glad we took a shot."

L J's Emma started her career on dirt, finishing

well back in a pair of 6-furlong maiden races at Fair Grounds. Kenneally moved her to the grass at the end of the Keeneland spring meet and she finished third behind eventual Lake George Stakes third-place finisher Secret Money. L J's Emma hasn't lost since.

"She's a whole lot different on the grass," Kenneally said. "Early on she showed a lot more speed, but she's matured a lot especially since she came to the grass. She's matured a lot and relaxes good now, that allows her to finish so much better. She's a different kind of horse on the grass, but she's maturing

and growing. Great for John Gaynor and Boxman Stables to get a stakes win at Saratoga, for sure."

Stone Silent took the initiative from the break, opening a 1 1/2-length lead over My Sweet Affair, Beauty Of The Sea and Isabel Alexandra through the opening quarter-mile in :22.26. Saez was content to let L J's Emma track in sixth, just 3 3/4 lengths back, to that point before angling the filly out around the far turn.

L J's Emma was still fifth approaching the stretch around the turn while down inside, until Saez tipped her out about five paths off the temporary rail approaching the top of the lane. Stone Silent put away the chasers turning for home and opened up past the half in :44.78, just as L J's Emma emerged on the scene approaching the eighth pole.

"I know she has a big turn of foot, and at the three-eighths, I felt like I had so much horse," Saez said. "We were very comfortable."

Stone Silent continued on approaching the sixteenth pole, clinging to about a 2-length advantage before L J's Emma made up the deficit under a hand ride from Saez.

"When we got to the last horse to pass, she kind of rebroke, so we had to really work a little there," Saez said.

L J's Emma picked up \$82,500 for the victory, boosting her bankroll to \$203,545.

Kenneally said he might make another trip to Saratoga to run the 2-year-old More Than Ready filly Mya's Halo in the Aug. 20 Bolton Landing Stakes. And he won't need directions.

"We can't win seven races at Saratoga," Hennig fired back just as quickly.

Apparently, they can.

Saturday, Hennig collected his seventh win of the 2023 Saratoga Race Course season when Spinning Colors captured the finale to give the trainer 1,500 for his career.

A former assistant to Hall of Famer D. Wayne Lukas, Hennig started training in 1992 – Arabian Ace came through at Hollywood Park July 16 with Laffit Pincay Jr. in the saddle to get it started – and hadn't won more than six races at Saratoga since 2004 (when he won eight).

Bred and owned by longtime Hennig clients Bill Parsons and David Howe, Spinning Colors spent much of the 1 1/16-mile trip in traffic after

breaking with a hop from the inside post. 



Closethegame Sugar adds to Rice's Saratoga haul Sunday

Adam Rice brought a Saratoga record of three wins and a third in six starts when he shipped Closethegame Sugar here for his debut at the end of last year's meeting. Most would say winning at a 50-percent clip at the toughest meet in America isn't sustainable, and that the law of averages is sure to kick in.

Closethegame Sugar won his debut at 5 1/2 furlongs over good turf Aug. 31, 2022 to improve Rice's mark.

Rice and the law of averages met again Sunday at Saratoga.

The Presque Isle Downs-based conditioner and his 3-year-old gelding came out on top again, this time with a win in the \$150,000 Mahony Stakes.

"You know you're reaching coming up here some days, coming out of Presque Isle, and the horses are nice," Rice said. "If they're nice, they'll tell you what they want to do. He's one of my favorite horses to ride every day."

The son of Girvin captured his second win in three starts for owners Rice and Sugar Diaz. Last August, Rice's brother-in-law Jose Ortiz rode the gelding out of Casual Cocktail to victory on the inner turf.

"Jose [Ortiz] was excited when he got off of him," Rice said of the 2022 debut win. "Jose couldn't ride him today, but that's OK, Jose Lezcano

brought it home."

Uncashed and Harry Time dueled through an opening quarter-mile in :21.49, opening a 4-length lead on post-time favorite No Nay Hudson and the rest of the field. Closethegame Sugar sat in fourth, just inside of Drew's Gold.

As the field bunched up around the far turn, Lezcano held his ground-saving position and waited for a gap. His patience paid off when the two leaders faded along the rail, and Closethegame Sugar unleashed his run to the inside of No Nay Hudson and James Graham.

After establishing the lead and holding off a late charge from Private Creed and Joel Rosario, Closethegame Sugar went on to win by a half-length.

Eye Witness, Jose Ortiz's mount in the Mahony for Wesley Ward, had won three straight including stakes at Turfway Park and Belmont Park. He made a late run from last to finish third. No Nay Hudson, Ward's other runner, faded to fourth.

Closethegame Sugar stopped the clock in 1:02.54, almost four seconds faster than his Saratoga debut win at the same distance last year, when he beat Mark Casse's standout Grade 2 winner Webslinger.

"There is so much fight in this horse it's not even funny," Rice said. "He gives every bit you ask if you ask him. His first out, he was a little bit short I think and that horse [Web-slinger] gave it to him, and he still gave it.

"The horse that ran behind him was a monster this year. I've been excited to see if mine could somewhat come back up, but to be here against these horses, these horses are all nice. If it was on the dirt it would've been a little different race, but it was my race today."

Webslinger most recently finished second in the Grade 1 Saratoga Derby Invitational and has collected \$1,025,320 in his career.

Bred in Kentucky by Brereton Jones, Closethegame Sugar only ran once between his debut and Sunday's Mahony, a second in the June 6 Tom Ridge Stakes on Presque Isle's synthetic surface.

Rice, the nephew of New York-based trainer Linda Rice, also collected a win in Sunday's second with Dancing Spirit, a 2-year-old filly with Ortiz aboard. Rice has now won six races in nine starts at Saratoga.

The Mahony is Rice's second stakes win, the other coming in the 2020 Fitz Dixon Jr. Memorial at Presque Isle with Like A Saltshaker.

Rice doesn't have any secrets to his success at Saratoga, but he said that getting them used to the environment is key, even just for weekend stays.


"I ship into the receiving barn. I call the racing secretary and see if they let me come in early, and if they do I come in," Rice said. "I train them the day of the race just to get them quiet because they're here, and we do our best."

Back to Normal

Sunday puts wraps on fifth week of meet

The fifth weekend of the meet felt like a return to normalcy at Saratoga Race Course.

All races ran on their scheduled surfaces, the power stayed on and most importantly, all of the horses came home safe. Part of Saratoga's normalcy also includes seeing some prospects for the future, and Sunday delivered just that.

The 24th day of the meet featured several promising winners who have opportunities to do bigger and better things.

Adam Rice collected the first of his winners on the card in the second, with Dancing Spirit making a successful turf debut for the owner and trainer. The filly shipped in from Presque Isle Downs and made the trip worthwhile in a maiden score.

The second was also run as the Mike Hernandez Memorial, in honor of the late graded stakes-winning trainer who was based in New York throughout his career. Hernandez died at the age of 99 late last year. Family, friends and the jockeys who participated in the inner turf contest gathered in the winner's circle to celebrate his life and contributions to the sport. Saratoga was always a happy place for Hernandez, his daughter Cathy Hagney said.

"My father was Mike Hernandez and this was his magical place," Hagney said. "He always said Saratoga was magic to him. It would put air in his lungs. I was fortunate enough to move here five

years ago, and he allowed me to get into the circle. It was the best thing that could've ever happened to me."

Winchell Thoroughbreds' Magic Tap won the eighth race for trainer Steve Asmussen and could be headed to Grade 1 company in his next start in the \$1 million Pennsylvania Derby at Parx Racing Sept. 23.

Wonder Ride won her debut in the opener, a maiden special weight for 2-year-olds going 7 furlongs, for owner Walking L Thoroughbreds and trainer Kenny McPeek. She'll most likely run next in the Grade 1 Spinaway Stakes on closing weekend

He'smyhoneybadger continued trainer Tom Amoss' strong meet winning the ninth, a 7-furlong allowance-optional for 3-year-olds and up on the main track. Amoss improved to 4-for-10 at the meet with the victory. Chad Brown extended his lead in the trainer standings with a win in the fifth, a 9-furlong allowance-optional on the turf. Owned by Klaravich Stables, Activist Investing hadn't been out since his maiden win in mid-October at Aqueduct. Legion Racing's Zadorsky gave trainer Wayne Catalano his first victory of the meet in the sixth, a 6-furlong maiden for 2-year-olds.

• Walking L Thoroughbreds' Wonder Ride gave McPeek reason to think big after she won Sunday's opener in her debut under Julien Leparoux.

"Julien was patient and saved some juice for the finish there," McPeek said of the daughter of Gun Runner's half-length victory over Stellamaris. "That was the difference. She's done everything right. Every move she's made as a young horse has been the right one."

McPeek said the Grade 1 Spinaway could be next for Wonder Ride.

"Obviously, today is a good first step. And maybe we'll bring her back in the Spinaway," he said, adding that the Grade 3 Pocahontas Sept. 16 could also be a target. "We'll nominate to that, too, but because she's here and she had a good run over the track, we'll look at the Spinaway."

• Sometimes, success runs in the family. One month after trainer Linda Rice won the first race of the Saratoga meet, her nephew and owner/trainer Adam sent out his first starter of the season and came away with a victory in Sunday's second.

Sent off at 8-1, Dancing Spirit broke from the outside post in a field of nine going 1 1/16 miles on the inner turf. The daughter of Social Inclusion settled in third behind Dr. Ray D. and Out Too Late, made a three-wide bid on the far turn to make the lead at the top of the stretch and held off the closing Sea Dancer. She won in 1:45.03 under jockey Jose Ortiz, who is Adam Rice's brother-in-law.

Rice shipped the filly from Pennsylvania

"My stable is based out of Presque Isle, so I shipped in to run here," Rice said of the track in Erie. "I'll place them as they come along, but this filly seemed right and it seemed like the right place, and yes it was."

Dancing Spirit made her debut July 17 at Presque Isle, finishing second in a 5-furlong maiden on synthetic. Rice said the stretch out to two turns and the switch in surfaces, though a big adjustment, helped Dancing Spirit get the job done.

"You're never confident, or at least too confident," Rice said. "I got her in here last night and galloped her this morning just to get her out of the stall and be happy. I've had a good record flipping them to the turf and they seem to like it, but I think that synthetic surface really helps us get them happy and prepared. It shows. The filly showed up."

Dancing Spirit may be headed to some stakes closer to home.

"We'll see what comes down," Rice said. "She's Pennsylvania-bred, sired and bred, so there's a sire series at Parx, but she'd have to like the dirt and who knows how that goes."

Rice later won the Mahony Stakes with Closethegame Sugar to improve to 2-for-2 at the meet.

• Trainer Wayne Catalano made a quick business trip to Saratoga from Churchill Downs for last week's Fasig-Tipton Saratoga sale of selected yearlings. He made a point of staying through Wednesday, to run the promising 2-year-old Tapiture filly Zadorsky in the fifth that day.

Catalano had his filly in the paddock and was waiting for jockey Jose Lezcano when, as the saying sort of goes, "stuff happens."

What happened was a power outage. All the electric power at the track went out. The tote board went black, the lights went out, the wifi was gone. Everything stopped. The outage was blamed on a tree falling on the Yaddo property or a tree or branches falling near a barn on the backstretch. Catalano took the delay in stride.

"Basically we just continued walking her in the paddock while the lights were out," Catalano said. "It was like schooling her."

The electricity returned after 41 minutes, but by then the fifth race was canceled. Zadorsky went back to her barn. And Catalano went back to Louisville.

Fast forward four days. The deleted race had been rescheduled as Sunday's sixth. The same 10 fillies were led to the paddock. The valets brought out 10 saddles. Ten jockeys walked to their mounts. Everything was the same as Wednesday except Wavne Catalano was 800 miles away from the Saratoga paddock.

Zadorsky and Lezcano got the job done without him. Lezcano urged his filly to the front in a hurry and they ran in tandem with Luis Saez and Lady Prospect for the first half-mile of the 6-furlong maiden special weight. Zadorsky opened up on the field by 2 lengths at the quarter pole and maintained that lead to the finish. Shimmering Allure bested Crazy Cami for second by a head.

Lezcano took a congratulatory and appreciative phone call from Catalano leaving the winner's circle.

"I wish it could have been Wednesday," Catalano said later, "but winning at Saratoga is great anytime, even four days late."

"This is ideal," Asmussen said of the 9 furlongs. "He has run good numbers. Huge pedigree. Has a lot of talent. Has kept great company in the morning. He's very impressive."

The close win for Magic Tap is a reversal from a narrow defeat in his last start June 30. Pressured on the front end that day at Ellis Park, he got outdueled by stakes-placed Tapit's Conquest by a head. Asmussen was happy to see the change in tactics under Tyler Gaffalione.

"Him not being the target today and getting worn down, him laying off of them and handling them like he did, we needed to see that," Asmus-

Magic Tap improved to 2-for-4. He broke his maiden two starts back going 1 1/16 miles at Churchill Downs after a sixth in his debut in mid-April at Keeneland. Asmussen said maturity has been the key for the \$450,000 Keeneland September yearling sale purchase who prepped with the trainer's father Keith in Texas.

"He came with a nice tested group from the barn last year," he said. "He came from my father's place extremely well-touted. He didn't handle it mentally last year, and he's putting it together. He has always been in the upper echelon of horses in our stable with talent."

Asmussen said Magic Tap could take some top members of the sophomore class next time out.

"We are going to probably run him in the Pennsylvania Derby off of this," Asmussen said.

Strong Finish

Sales season closes with more records for NY-bred yearlings

Fasig-Tipton Co. followed up its record-breaking Saratoga sale of selected yearlings with more records at the two-day New York-bred yearling sale that brought the live auction season to a close Monday.

Fasig-Tipton reported sales on 219 of the 300 yearlings through the ring for a record \$20,904,000, up 3.6 percent from last year's record of \$20,175,000 for 188 sold.

The increased number of yearlings sold – which came after an initial catalog of 364 – and rise in overall RNA rate led to a drop in average price. Average price came in at \$95,452, down 11.1 percent from last year's \$107,314. Median rose 1.4 percent from \$74,000 in 2022 to \$75,000.

"All in all it's a healthy market," said Boyd Browning Jr., Fasig-Tipton president and chief executive officer. "You've heard me describe for a while, in July and again here, it's going to be fair marketplace. The buyers were complaining that they couldn't buy the horses that they wanted and the sellers were saying they wish they had a little bit more marketplace, particularly in the \$30,000 to \$60,000 price range. That's indicative of the world we live in today.

"Overall, a very successful sale. The New York-bred program continues to be a leader in the United States certainly and probably in the world of a state-bred type program. There's great incentives for people to both breed and to race in New York and that was reflective of the results the last two days."

Two colts – one early in the first session and another late in the second – shared honors for highest price at \$380,000.

Hip 306, by Violence from the family of graded stakes winners Itsaknockout and Rush Bay, went through the ring in the first few minutes of bidding Sunday evening. Chris Baccari, bidding alongside trainer Kenny

McPeek and on behalf of country music star Toby Keith, signed for the colt out of the winning Liam's Map mare Liam's Lookout.

The colt, consigned by Hill 'n' Dale at Xalapa, sold as a short yearling to SKPJ Stables for \$175,000 at this year's Keeneland January sale. Liam's Lookout, a \$100,000 yearling at the 2018 Fasig-Tipton Kentucky July sale, won two of 10 starts with four seconds and earned \$49,222. She's a half-sister to Itsaknockout, winner of the Grade 2 Besilu Stables Fountain of Youth Stakes at Gulfstream Park and ninth in the Kentucky Derby in 2015; stakes winner Storm Power and stakes-placed winner Hot Sean.

Tom McCrocklin, who bought nine yearlings for multiple clients including Champion Equine for an average of \$131,667, purchased the other \$380,000 colt. Offered as Hip 628, the colt by Practical Joke is out of the Grade 3-winning Awesome Again mare Golden Mystery.

McCrocklin also bought the topper at last year's New York-bred sale, going to \$700,000 on behalf of Champion Equine for a colt by Arrogate. He later sold that colt, a full-brother to multiple Grade 1 winner Cave Rock, for \$1.05 million at this year's OBS March sale.

McCrocklin said he plans to pinhook this year's co-topper, along with his other purchases. He said he liked "everything" about the Practical Joke colt.

"I thought he was the best horse in the sale and just when you thought Practical Joke was sleepy, he's come back to life," said McCrocklin. "I mean the filly of Chad's [Brown], she's a legitimate horse, Ways and Means. It's a little bit of trying to look into the future so that's what we do and it's a lot of risk and a lot of money. It worked out last year on a few horses and it's extreme risk mitigated by expertise. It's not necessarily my ex-

pertise but somewhere in there there's got to be expertise."

The top-priced filly went through the ring Monday afternoon when trainer Wesley Ward landed Hip 463, a daughter of Munnings out of the Malibu Moon mare To The Moon Alice for \$340,000.

"She just looked like a standout individually in the sale," said Ward, who signed for the filly in the name Preferred Equine, agent. "We're really happy with her. She looked like the best filly we've seen in this sale."

Bred by and foaled at Old Tavern Farm in Saratoga Springs, the filly is the fifth foal out of the half-sister to Grade 2 winner Unchained Melody. To The Moon Alice is the dam of New York-bred winner Two for Charging and the unraced New York-bred 2-year-old Ghostzapper filly Don't Scroll who sold for \$160,000 at the 2021 Saratoga New York-bred yearling sale.

Niall Brennan, agent for JR International Holdings, landed the fifth most expensive yearling and second highest-priced filly when he went to \$325,000 for Hip 619, a daughter of Munnings out of multiple New Yorkbred stakes winner Freudie Anne.

"From the first time we saw her I felt like she was a very, very good Munnings. He's a great stallion; it doesn't matter if it's fillies, colts, turf or dirt," said Brennan, who said the filly would be raced by Richard Spoor. "The mare was excellent. They do a great job at Hunter Valley. They raced the mare,

they raised this filly. She looks like a really good Munnings."

Bred by Fergus Galvin, Marc Detampel, Jayne Johnson and Adrian Wallace and consigned by Hunter Valley Farm, agent, the filly is the fourth foal out of the Freud mare who won the 2015 Statue of Liberty division of the New York Stallion Series Stakes at Saratoga. She's also a full-sister to the 2-year-old Lamorna, who sold for \$320,000 at last year's Keeneland September sale; the 3-year-old filly Showemyourheels who sold for \$350,000 at the 2021 Saratoga New York-bred sale; and the winning 4-vear-old colt Eddie the Great, who sold for \$100,000 at the 2020 Fasig-Tipton Select Yearling Showcase.

"She's been an incredible mare for us, we've sold over a million dollars out of her," Galvin said. "This is her fourth Munnings. It's a great cross, with Freud. It's super physically as well. We've had a pretty good sale. We brought some nice horses. I know it's been a little bit patchy for some people, but we got the right bounce of the ball so to speak."

Those four yearlings were among eight to sell for \$300,000 or more and 26 that brought \$200,000 or more. Last year's New York-bred sale saw 12 yearlings bring \$300,000 or more – including colts for \$700,000 and \$600,000 – and the same number sell for \$200,000 or more.

Yeah, horse racing will make you question what you're doing with, what you've done with, your life.

For Lee Einsidler, there was a day when he never questioned horse racing and his life in it again.

It was a Saturday in Saratoga. August 22, 2020. Eleven days after Einsidler's 34-year-old son, Aaron, and his wife, Sara had died, leaving behind their three-week-old daughter Allie.

"When Aaron and Sara passed away three years ago, it was beyond belief, beyond dark. It was the first time in my life that I was ever in a dark place," Einsidler said Saturday. "I came here a couple of days later, when Casa Creed walked into the paddock, he was 4. Billy Mott was there and I thought, 'Somehow, someway I'll get through this.' All because of horse racing."

Einsidler's big horse, Casa Creed, trained by Mott, finished third that day. Einsidler wasn't complaining about a 2 ½-length defeat behind Halladay and Got Stormy. No, that day, was about distraction, about the momentary respite of sport from the hard reality of life.

It's been three long hard years for Einsidler and his family. Horse racing - and Casa Creed - have done their part to salve an unsalvable loss.

"I can just sit there and watch replays of races we've won, look at win pictures, and it puts me in the most happy place I could possibly be," Einsidler said. "It's my most happy, safe place in the world."

There is no happy for a parent after losing a child. It's about being the most happy you can possibly be in a world which will never be the same.

Somehow, horse racing and Casa Creed continue to offer a safe place, a most happy place for Einsidler and his family. The 7-year-old overachiever overachieved yet again Saturday, winning a stun-

ning edition of the Fourstardave. Sure, for Todd Pletcher, Ramona Bass, Irad Ortiz Ir and the Annapolis team, it was another notch in racing's belt of defeat. For Einsidler, it was escape. Pure escape.

"It's a very emotional time for us. My son and his wife passed away three years ago yesterday," Einsidler said at the end of the day. "I said in the interview on Fox and I meant it, 'You know I think Aaron is probably looking down on us and if he is, it will give us at least a couple of lengths on the competition.' And it turned out to be true."

So true. Down and seemingly out at the quarter pole, Casa Creed clawed and clutched his way back into contention by the eighth pole, gradually reeling in Annapolis to win his second consecutive Fourstardave by the hardest-fought three-quarters of a length. Luis Saez pumped from atop Casa Creed and maybe, somehow, Aaron Einsidler implored from above.

"How do you do that at 7 years of age? Come on, now," Einsidler said. "When we won the Kelso, we got the jump on Annapolis. Today we had to go get him. You can't even imagine running in the same Grade 1 race four years in a row in Saratoga. It's unheard of. The after the worst day. Horse racing had done its part.

only other horse to do that is Fourstardave. Now they call him the mayor of Saratoga. Casa Creed. I couldn't be more proud of him. I couldn't be more proud of him."

In the ever-eclectic world of horse racing, Einsidler weaved his own patch in the quilt. From a kid tagging along with his dad to a \$2 bettor to an owner of a four-time Grade 1 stakes winner and a Saratoga legend.

"Like a lot of us degenerates in New York, our dads took us to the track. When I was a little kid, I was mesmerized by it. When I got a little older, my friends would go to Yankee games or Met games and I would get on the bus and go to Aqueduct or Belmont," Einsidler said. "I just fell in love with it as a kid and it stayed with me ever since. I never dreamed I'd be in a position to own racehorses but fortunate enough, I've been able to do that and here we are."

From working in his father's liquor store to becoming CEO of Sidney Frank Importing Company, creators of Grey Goose Vodka, to the CEO of Casamigos Tequila, Einsidler certainly rose to a position to own racehorses.

And, more importantly, enjoy horse racing, enjoy Saratoga.

"I guess it's the ultimate escape from reality. All of us need some escape from the trials and tribulations of everyday life," Einsidler said. "Maybe somebody buys a yacht, or somebody buys a plane, or somebody goes on a trip to Italy, or somebody sails around the world, Saratoga is my marlin if you know what I mean. To me, this is the most special place in the world. To come here and participate at the highest level and win this super important race today, it's a horse owner's dream come true. It's just so special."

Einsidler finished the conversation, posed for a
