He filled notebooks, recorders and brains with wisdom, advice, quips, opinions, history, perspective and more for 15 seasons of this newspaper even if he wasn't sure what to make of us at the beginning. For years, we ran a daily quote. We'll try to bring one back as often as we can.

"My father came from Austria, the way I understand it, his father had a big farm, my father decided he didn't want to go back home and got a job milking cows. He never told me how he wound up working for H.T. Peters, he was a pretty prominent man in show horses and hunting. He worked for him for over 20 years and then he and his friend opened a riding academy, in '37, '38, he was broke from then on. Somehow, I don't know where the hell he got them, but people would send old bowed horses and we would walk them in the bay, walk them back and forth and give them a whole year. There was a pretty famous veterinarian who would come out and fire them. We always fired horses in those days. We got them back to the races. Some of them, a couple of them, won."

With Bill Mott

Near the end of 56-plus minutes of a Stable Tour Wednesday morning, trainer Bill Mott leaned on a fence post and stared at two trainees. One has been a part of the barn for more than two years. The other just got there. He talked to them, watched them, then pondered a question.

This is work, but what do you like about training horses?

"Hmm," said the Hall of Famer. "I just enjoy looking at one like him (the newcomer, Bendoog), and thinking what he might be. It's always exciting. You always have the future to look at. There are always possibilities. There are disappointments. If you're able to get a few victories, they kind of outweigh the losses. You're going to have some losses along the way. I enjoy the horses and the people. I've been doing it awhile now."

Yes, he has. The Hall of Famer's Equibase profile starts in 1973, but he was winning races in his native South Dakota before that and worked for Hall of Fame trainer Jack Van Berg before starting his own stable. The horses have won 5,341 races (through Thursday) and earned just shy of \$334 million. Both numbers are top seven all-time.

The youngest trainer in history to be inducted, at 45, Mott joined racing's Hall of Fame in 1998. He first brought a stable to Saratoga in 1987 and has won nine training championships since. This year, his 17 wins (through Friday) put him fourth on the leaderboard.

Mott and his dog Winston walked the two barns on the Oklahoma Training Track side with The Special's Joe Clancy Wednesday morning.

Trucker: Bruce Lunsford's 2-year-old Flatter gelding, a \$150,000 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga yearling purchase, occupies the first stall in the main barn with a view of the Oklahoma, horse path, stable-area road and the daily meeting of The Railbirds at Doc Richardson Corner. The chestnut finished last of 10 in his debut here July 22. "He's got a great disposition, he likes it over here. He got beat way off the first time, bit of a surprise. He had trained much better than that. We kind of liked him. You've got to give them the benefit of the doubt if they train OK, you like them and they don't run any good. You've just kind of got to see them a second time."

Knightsbridge: Godolphin homebred 2-year-old Nyquist colt is a half-brother to Grade 1 winner Speaker's Corner. "We backed off and gave him some time, and he's back training now. You have to be a little patient with them. He should be back on a breeze schedule in, hopefully, September. We haven't been that far along yet to compare him to Speaker's Corner, but he's been OK."



Billal: Kaleem Shah's 2-year-old Steet Sense colt finished third, behind runaway winner Fierceness from the Todd Pletcher barn, in his debut here Aug. 25. "He ran well, ran into a real fast one of Pletcher's. We were lapped up on him at the quarter pole, but couldn't stay with him. He's a muscular kind of horse, more of a sprinter/miler type body as far as his frame. I guess the Street Senses, some of them are more compact like he is and some are big, longer types."

A snort and a whinny from up the shedrow interrupted the tour, and took Mott's attention briefly: "What in the world is that?" Satisfied after listening for a bit, he returned to the next stall door.

Resilience: Pam and Marty Wygod's homebred 2-year-old Into Mischief filly made her debut going a mile Friday. She finished sixth. "She's a big, scopey horse. A little more scope than some of the Into Mischiefs I'd say. You see some that are blockier, but she's not like that at all."

Informed that a few weeks ago, a Saratoga Special reader asked the definition of scopey, Mott paused and tried to put a few more words to the horsemen's term. "A little more length maybe. I guess that's what it means to me anyway. I don't know what it means to other people. How did you answer them?"

We're not sure we did, but here goes. Mott's description fits. A scopey horse looks longer and lankier than others, without being out of proportion. Tall, rangy, athletic. Greyhounds and Pointers are scopey. Bulldogs are not. To us anyway.

Jefferson Street: Godolphin's homebred 2-year-old Street Sense colt out of Apiary, a half-sister to Met Mile and Whitney winner Frosted, makes his first start in today's seventh race going 7 furlongs. "We've liked him all along. He's a nice type. You want to see, too, Winston? OK. You better get out of there, Winston. That's his space."

More snorts and whinnies come from up the shedrow, near Trucker's stall. "I have to see what's going on up there."

Baie Longue: Named for a beach on St. Martin, Andrew Farm's American Pharoah 3-year-old gelding was supposed to run Travers Day, but was scratched after the race came off the turf. He finished fifth off a 10-month layoff here July 15. Entered at Kentucky Downs for Saturday, he hit the also-eligible list. "We wanted to get him going, but they took it off the turf."

The noise returns, louder. "I'll be right back. I just want to see if that's mine or somebody else's . . . He's messing around. It's fine. Some of these stalls have gaps in the boards and horses get messing around with each other sometimes."

Bold Journey: The Hard Spun chestnut colt has won twice this year, including an allowance at Belmont Park in June. The New York-bred was second after stumbling at the start in an open-company allowance on Travers Day. The 4-year-old appreciates the visit. "He's got his ears up like he wants to be nice, but I don't always

trust him. He's just a little tough in the stall and aggressive lately. He's manageable, but he's a colt."

Frank's Rockette: The first stakes winner on the tour carries a 12-for-29 record with 10 seconds, four thirds and \$1,482,733 earned for owner/breeder Frank Fletcher. Six-year-old mare won her first two this year and was third in the Grade 2 Honorable Miss here July 26. She went to Charles Town Aug. 25 and finished second in the Misty Bennett Pink Ribbon. Mott greets her with four pats on the neck, a couple of chirps and then three more pats after stepping into the stall. "You've been a pretty good girl, haven't ya? We've put her in against some very good horses, but we try to keep her where she can be competitive. We've run her in the Breeders' Cup a couple of times. We ran her against the boys once, which was a mistake. She's never liked Keeneland. Everywhere else, she's run well."

In three starts there, she finished 11th in the 2020 Breeders' Cup Sprint, fifth in the 2021 Thoroughbred Club of America and 11th in the 2022 Breeders' Cup Filly and Mare Sprint – the only worse-than-third finishes in her career.

War Like Goddess: Another 6-year-old mare, George Krikorian's daughter of English Channel has earned \$2.2 million while winning 10 of 16. She made a case for a female turf championship (which went to Regal Glory) last year, with a Grade 1 win against males, two graded wins in her division and a third behind European raiders in the Breeders' Cup Turf. She opened 2023 by winning the Bewitch, but was sixth in the New York in June and second by a neck to McKulick in the Glens Falls here Aug. 3. Mott poked fun at her origin story — \$1,200 weanling, \$1,000 RNA as a yearling, \$30,000

purchase as a 2-year-old — while opening the screen. "Here's our thousand-dollar horse . . . The last one, there might have been enough pace. He wanted her to stay a little closer so he asked her out of the gate and she was rank with him around the first turn and then she was pulling the whole race. I think she just wants to settle and make a run. I'm skipping the Flower Bowl (today). She had a fever about two weeks ago and I missed a few days with her and just decided we're going to skip this race. She's been too good to try to run her in any kind of a compromised situation. She had a little fever and her bloodwork was out of balance so we decided to just give her a week to get over whatever was going on. Whether it was a little virus or something, she seems fine now. She's back training and she'll either run in the Kentucky Turf Cup against the boys (Sept. 9) or the Joe Hirsch against the boys, too (Sept. 30)."

Just Jules: A 2-year-old Justify filly, a half-sister to Grade 3 winner Ballet Dancing owned by co-breeder Old Oak Farm is getting ready for her first start. Wednesday, the \$1.05 million yearling stood sideways across her stall, dozing with her right hind leg cocked. "The way she's standing doesn't help the way she looks, she's a nice-looking filly, but I'd like to figure out how to put about a hundred pounds on her. I don't know, I'd just love to see her looking better."

Life's Joy: Debby Oxley's 2-year-old Mitole filly looks fast standing still. She's run twice here, a fourth July 23 and a 10th Aug. 26 after leading early both times. "She's got a ton of speed. It looks like I need to find her a 5-furlong race. That's just the way she is."

Caramel Swirl: Godolphin's 5-year-old Union Rags mare finished fourth in the Grade 1 Ballerina here Aug. 26 after finishing second last year. Five-time winner (and \$642,450 earner) owns a Grade 2 win and a Grade 3 win. "She ran well, got beat a nose for third. She's been good, always right there. She's Grade 1-placed, not a Grade 1 winner. Maybe..."

Scotland: LNJ Foxwoods' 3-year-old homebred by Good Magic, won the Curlin Stakes here July 21 to earn a spot in the Grade 1 Travers. He and jockey Junior Alvarado led early, got pressed and faded to sixth. "He got pushed along a little bit when they got midway down the backside and he didn't really get a chance to give him a breather. He popped right out on the lead and the horse we thought would be on the lead wasn't. It left us there, and then the horse we thought would be on the lead wound up pushing us midway in the race. I don't know why they did that. It cost them and us."

Kingdom Come: Bruce Lunsford's homebred 2-year-old daughter of Justify is a half-sister to Grade 1 winner Art Collector, whose death this summer of laminitis was another blow during a tough summer. Seventh in Thursday's first race on the turf, after finishing eighth in her debut Aug. 6. "Nice filly. She may not necessarily have to have the turf. We might give her a chance on the dirt."

Sweet Dutchess: A recent addition after racing for trainer Kathleen O'Connell through her first 15 starts. Four-year-old filly finished third for Mott on the turf at Belmont Park July 9 and was eighth on the dirt here Aug. 25. Daughter of Will Take Charge was rattling her teeth on the wall for entertainment Wednesday morning. "Eating that wood isn't going to put any more weight back on you, I don't think. She probably carried more weight for the other trainer. She's got a good coat and everything, she's fine, but boy she's tough to keep weight on. We tried her on the dirt the other day, which was a mistake, but now we know."

Paradise Lane: Two-year-old daughter of Quality Road and Grade 1 winner Paradise Woods (who earned \$1.1 million for co-owners Pam and Marty Wygod) finished fourth in her debut two days after the tour. Mott walked into her stall, and kept narrating: "Her mother





was a good mare in California. She lost a shoe and I just want to make sure it's back on. Come on, come on, let me see \dots " It took several tries, but she picked up each front foot — shoes on.

Provocateur: A Keeneland November purchase for Joe, Anne and Mike McMahon, the Into Mischief colt won three races (two stakes) last year, and placed in the Grade 1 Woody Stephens, for trainer Todd Pletcher. He finished third in his debut for Mott, and first start since October, Aug. 11. "That was a tough allowance race, three-other-than that a pretty nice horse of Asmussen's (Marsalis) won. Hopefully we'll get him in stakes company later on.

Montego Bay: Unraced Speightstown 2-yearold filly joined the Saratoga string in May and was making steady progress for her debut until she missed a few weeks of training and Mott hit pause. "She was real sick earlier. When the meet started, she got sick, so we missed a lot of time with her and I don't think she's going to be able to run here. You miss three weeks with them and by the time you get them back going the meet's over. A lot of our horses are getting close to ready to run at the end of the meet."

Munny Rockette: A Fasig-Tipton Saratoga graduate as a yearling last summer, she joined owner Frank Fletcher's operation for \$1 million in March. She finished third as the favorite in her debut Aug. 20. Like plenty of the Mott 2-year-olds, the first race is a steppingstone and a learning experience. "She ran well, her race was good and she should improve. She probably wants more distance."

Just F Y I: Owner/breeder George Krikorian's Justify 2-year-old filly won her debut on Travers Day, prevailing by a head going 6 furlongs on the dirt. With a nod toward Munny Rockette next door, Mott tried to explain training 2-yearolds. "She won and she didn't, but if you'd have asked me beforehand who's better. I wouldn't have been able to tell you. It's all what situation it is, who they're in against, a lot of things. They both ran well. She won and the other one didn't. She's got feet like this (hands six inches apart) and you'd think, 'Well, maybe she's going to have to have grass' but she never worked like she did. Some of the Justifys go to the turf. He's had some success in Europe, so they tell me. I don't pay as much attention to that stuff as I probably should."

Elite Power: Champion male sprinter of 2022 had his eight-race winning streak snapped in last week's Grade 1 Forego. Gunite set the pace, took advantage of three quarter-mile splits of :23 and change, and fought off a challenge along the rail to avenge a loss in the Grade 1 Vanderbilt four weeks earlier. The defeat ended a string of excellence that started with a maiden win at Churchill Downs last June and rolled through two allowance races, the Vosburgh, Breeders' Cup Sprint,

Riyadh Dirt Sprint in Saudi Arabia, True North and Vanderbilt. Like he was answering a stage call, the chestnut 5-year-old son of Curlin stuck his head over the screen to say hello. His ears went up, he bumped a Jolly Ball hanging to his left and looked for attention. "Don't trust him too much. He's tough. You go into catch him . . . the grooms bribe him with carrots but if you go in there without them, he can be pretty tough on you. The winner came back quick too out of the same race, but . . . coming back quick . . . slow pace . . . we gave the winner six pounds. You can make some excuses or reasons (for the defeat). I think the pace probably worked against him. He was right behind the winner. The winner's got natural zip. The inside opened up and he got through, but you'd have rather had them going in :45 than :46. Two good horses. I don't know, he might just go straightaway into the Breeders' Cup. We'll see. He's been a little bit of a challenge. Early on, we had to take our time with him. His 3-year-old year we never got much done with him. We got him started a couple times, but that was it. The rest of it's been a lot of fun."

A La Carte: Speedway Stable's 5-year-old Uncle Mo gelding sports a 1-for-6 record, all this year, and finished fourth and fifth in two Saratoga allowance races. "Mayyybee he hasn't reached his full potential. Off his first couple races (a second and a win at Gulfstream this winter) I thought he would wind up a little bit better but he's kind of leveled off. We'll see."

Hunt Ball: Godolphin's 2-year-old colt, a half-brother to millionaire Cody's Wish, snoozed while standing along the side wall. Mott opened the screen and had a look at the son of Into Mischief, second in his debut here Aug. 19. "He's actually starting to put some weight on now. He was awfully light before, but he's filling out now. You want to be a racehorse? Huh? Big boots to fill. The way he ran, I think he's going to be OK. He broke, he was last, he made his way up through horses. He got there and then he couldn't catch the leader. That was a good race."

Channel Maker: He could almost conduct the Stable Tour at this point. Nine-year-old gelding took part in his sixth Saratoga this summer and won the Bowling Green on the front end to snap a seven-race losing streak July 30 and was last of six in the Grade 1 Sword Dancer on Travers Day. The 10-time winner has earned \$3.9 million in 55 starts. He greeted the morning interruption with gusto, as Mott tried to open the screen to show off the veteran's condition. "Back, back up, get back, I want to look at ya, I want this guy to see ya. Pretty good for a 9-year-old gelding, right? It's hard to get that much color on a 9-year-old gelding, you know what I mean? He looks great. I think they kind of tag-teamed him the other day. The winner (Bolshoi Ballet) and the horse that pressed him (Stone Age) are the same ownership. They might have used that horse to force the pace a little bit, just watching it. It was going to be harder for him after he won the Bowling Green anyway. Everybody was like, 'OK, now we

can't let him get away.' They had kind of forgotten about him."

Channel Maker has run in seven Breeders' Cups. Does an eighth fit in his schedule? "I don't think anybody wants to do that. I wouldn't mind running him again if it wasn't so competitive. The thing is, it's hard to find lesser spots at that distance. There's a limited number of those around."

Channel Maker made his case as his trainer tried to close the screen. "Ah, ah, ah, don't. You're nasty. That's why you're a gelding. Don't be like that. We'll see ya later."

Bendoog: In first stall in Mott's second barn across the yard and past the trainer's office building stood a new arrival. A robust bay 4-year-old by Gun Runner out of stakes winner Nellie Cashman watches staffers prep a neighbor for a race. "This is Bendoog — B-e-n-d-double o-g. He just came in from the farm today. He was in Dubai and ran in a bunch of those big races over there. He got turned out for 60 days and was started back at GMP Farm (in Schuylerville). They had him jogging and can-

tering over there and we just brought him back in. He's got a pretty good eye on him, a decent look about him. He ran in some of those trial races for the Dubai World Cup. I guess he ran in the World Cup. They sent me some videos of his races and I'm not sure which races they actually were."

Owned by Mohammed Khaleel Ahmed, Bendoog ran 10 times at Meydan Racecourse in 2022 and 2023, winning twice and placing in a Group 2 and a Group 1. Sixth in the World Cup in March, he was sent to Mott with an American campaign in mind. Be patient. "Hopefully he'll be ready to run in these races coming up in the winter. Now it's September. . . do we get a race into him in November or December? Is he a horse for the Pegasus?"

Cody's Wish: Godolphin's 5-year-old finished third in his first three starts in 2021, then won nine of 10 (with a second) over the next two years with Grade 1 scores in the Forego, Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile, Churchill Downs and Met Mile. He finished third in the Grade 1 Whitney here Aug. 5, his first start beyond a mile since a second in the Challenger going 1 1/16 miles at Tampa Bay Downs in March 2022. In the 1 1/8-mile Whitney, he skidded out of the gate, made a run to reach contention at the top of the stretch but settled for third behind White Abarrio and Zandon. Bendoog's neighbor didn't need much introduction, but Mott tried. "You know this one? Here, put your hand in here and see what happens." Nobody bit on that suggestion, not even Cody's Wish. "We tried something different (in the Whitney). We tried the mile-and-an-eighth. There were some suspicions that it wasn't his best distance and it turned out that way. I guess I could have waited for the Forego, but I had the other horse for that. It was just kind of thinking that if he was able to win the Met Mile and the Whitney, that would be pretty special. What else could you expect? He'll go to the Vosburgh (at Aqueduct Sept. 30).'

Waskesiu: Chiefswood Stable's 2-year-old daughter of American Pharoah was an hour or so from making her second start in Wednesday's second race. Fourth in her debut July 30, she finished second to heavy favorite Emery going 6 furlongs. "We were pretty high on this filly going into her last race. I said that if anybody beats her, they'll be a Grade 1 horse. Well, there must have been three Grade 1 horses in there. That's how smart I am. You never know, the first time they run. I'm sure it's a loaded field again, but she's pretty nice."

Sugar Hi: CJ Thoroughbreds' 2-year-old Twirling Candy filly won her debut by 6 lengths on Opening Day and has been prepping for Sunday's Grade 1 Spinaway ever since. Did Mott think she had that potential from her first days with him. "Umm . . . she's been in that stall ever since she's been here."

out for 60 days and was started back at GMP Farm A winner on Opening Day, Sugar Hi represents the Mott barn in Sunday's Grade 1 Spinaway.

Casa Creed: LRE Racing and JEH Racing Stable's 7-year-old won the Grade 3 Kelso here July 15 and was even better in the Grade 1 Fourstardave Aug. 12. They were victories four and five at Saratoga for the son of Jimmy Creed. The success began with a win on the dirt here as a 2-year-old in 2018. He added the Hall of Fame Stakes in 2019, the Fourstardave last year and then the 2023 double. He's run in the last four editions of the Fourstardave – two thirds and two wins. "He's had some career. He was just another horse when he was here as a 2-year-old year. We found out the surface and the distance and let him put it all together. He's been an incredibly nice, fun horse to have around because he's pretty easy to do anything with. He doesn't like Keeneland (where he's 0-for-4, all in Grade 1 company). They weren't easy races, but we'll need to find somewhere else to go before the Breeders' Cup."

Vittorio: Kaleem Shah's 5-year-old son of Ghostzapper started his career in California, and won twice, before joining the Mott barn this winter. He's been second three times, once by a nose, since. "He's had some seconds and thirds in the two-other-than. Those can come up tough."

Mellifluous: The unraced Coal Front 2-year-old colt came in from the farm with Bendoog a day earlier and no matter how you say it he'll get a chance. "His name is Mellif . . . Mellifil . . . M-e-I-I-i-f . . . Mellif-louis . . . Mellif-il-us. He's a 2-year-old, we'll get him going some more and see."

Genetics: Glassman Racing's 2-year-old filly is aptly named as the daughter of leading sire Tapit and multiple stakes winner Points Of Grace, whose five other foals to race are all winners. This one finished third in her debut Aug. 13 and was entered in Sunday's sixth race. "She ran OK the first time, was a little green, made the lead turning for home and kind of got thrown all over the place, which cost her."

Baby Yoda: The 5-year-old gelding has won seven of 18, earned \$548,390 and placed in two graded stakes. Not bad for a horse who won his debut for a \$10,000 claiming tag. Purchased after his first two starts, he races for Pantofell Stable, Wachtel Stable, Gary Barber and Jerold Zaro. The Florida-bred won twice here in 2021 and again last summer while also placing in the Grade 1 Malibu and Grade 2 Vosburgh and Kelso. Third here July 16, he finished last of 10 in the Russell Road Stakes at 5-furlong track Charles Town in West Virginia Aug. 25. "That was poor judgment. I sent him to Charles Town and he didn't do any good. I don't think the two turns, or

whatever, suited him there. He's had a great career, he's been a lot of fun."

Feathering: John O'Meara's 3-year-old Empire Maker filly finished sixth in her debut going 7 furlongs here July 20. Mott thought about the turf for her next start, but changed course after a workout Aug. 20. "She's made one start and was on the lead turning for home. It was seven-eighths, she probably doesn't want to go that far. I wasn't crazy about her when I worked her on the turf. She didn't look like she was enjoying it that much. We'll wait and run her back on the dirt."

Matagora Bay: Mike Rutherford's Bernardini filly lives in half of the free-standing shed between the main barn and the office next to stable pony Bugsy. It's airy, bright – like living outside (almost). "She actually doesn't like some of these other stalls. She gets a little anxious and she gets pretty busy in here early in the morning if she doesn't get out right away. She gets restless, but she's better out here. She's got the best stall in the whole place now. I entered her as a main-track-only for (today). We'll get her a race and see what she's got."

Bugsy: A stout chestnut with plenty of white markings, he could pass as an extra in a Tom Mix movie. He flinched awake from a standing nap when Mott called his name and walked over to say hello. "Bugsy, you've put on about a hundred pounds since I bought you. I bought him when I was in Del Mar. I saw him and asked the girl who was riding him if he was for sale. I kind of liked him, he kind of caught my eye. He rode the van all the way from California to Florida, shipped good in a box stall. I don't know how many hours it is (37, without traffic, according to Google Maps). That's the only time I've ever vanned a horse that far. When I offered to buy him. I didn't see that spot on his side. I wasn't so sure I could ride one like that, but I'd already stuck my foot in my mouth so here he is."

And that's the end. There are more horses on the harness side, and still more at Belmont Park and Churchill Downs. Mott needed to get to the races to saddle Waskesiu. The trainer would sneak home for a bit before heading back to the track for Magic Cross' start – and win – in the P.G. Johnson Stakes.

For a moment, Mott turned into a dog trainer.

"Well Winston, we might have to go to the races," he called. "You want to wait in the car while we run one in the first? You sure cover all the bases, you've been running around here. I guess the good thing is you haven't run away."

Winston wouldn't dream of it, and neither would the horses.

Showdown at Big Sky

Proxy, Rattle N Roll clash in Gr. 1 with Breeders' Cup spot on line

Proxy did everything he was supposed to do as a 2-year-old, winning two of his first three late in 2020 and turning the page to some of the early Kentucky Derby preps in Louisiana the next year.

Then, things went a little sideways. Four starts (all losses) into his 3-year-old campaign, owner/breeder Godolphin and trainer Mike Stidham hit pause and took the bay Tapit colt out of training. He went to the farm in Kentucky, sat out a couple months, didn't race for more than 10 months

and returned as a 4-year-old at the Fair Grounds in February 2022. He rewarded the decision by winning the Grade 1 Clark Stakes at Churchill Downs in November, surpassing \$2 million in earnings and elbowing his way into the conversation at the top of the older horse division this year.

Twice a graded winner this year, he's the 2-1 second choice for today's Grade 1 Jockey Club Gold Cup, the 11th of 12 races with a post time of




6:18 p.m., at Saratoga Race Course. The 5-year-old breaks from the rail for Joel Rosario in a field of eight that includes multiple Grade 3 winner and 9-5 favorite Rattle N Roll.

Stidham called Proxy a great example of being patient with a horse.


"He showed he could run with the

very best as a 3-year-old, against Mandaloun and Midnight Bourbon and some of those other horses," the trainer said. "We just felt like he wasn't mentally and physically ready – he's a big colt that wasn't really ready for

that, to take on Triple Crown stuff. Like always, Godolphin allows you to do what's right for the horse. They allowed me to back off, let him grow up and he's come back a better horse."

Proxy put up a symmetrical 2-2-2 record in six starts last year. The wins came in his first start, an optional claimer at Fair Grounds in January, and his last, the Clark in late November. In between, he placed in four stakes (twice to last year's Jockey Club winner Olympiad). This year began with a wide-trip fifth behind Art Collector in the Grade 1 Pegasus at Gulfstream Park in January. Long a believer in Proxy's distance capabilities, Stidham sent his charge to the 1 1/4-mile Santa Anita Handicap in March. The horse did everything but win neck behind Stilleto Boy.

"I've always thought and believed that the more distance the better," Stidham said. "The mile-and-a-quarter helps him tremendously. The Santa Anita Handicap, even after a bad trip, he looked like he had no chance to get there and he almost got there. A couple of times he just absolutely looked like he had zero chance and that last eighth of a mile he just flies home."



while rallying from well back to finish a Favored in the Jockey Club Gold Cup, Rattle N Roll eyes his fourth win this year.

Off the California try and shortening up slightly to 1 1/8 miles, Proxy won the Grade 2 Oaklawn Handicap in April. The good races stopped at two when Proxy finished eighth behind West Will Power and Rattle N Roll in the Grade 1 Stephen Foster at Ellis Park July 1. Proxy put the defeat behind him three weeks later while odds-on in the Grade 3 Monmouth Cup at Monmouth Park. The front-running tactics surprised Stidham.

"That was a shocker," he said. "Going into that race, it looked like it was our race to win or lose and the only thing I told Rosario was, and I don't tell him a whole lot, 'We cannot take a chance of getting shuffled back in a field where there isn't any real speed.'

Stidham suggested breaking forward and getting an early position. It was a little earlier than the trainer wanted.

"I just dropped my head," Stidham said. "I was having a hard time watching. He had been close to the lead before, but he'd never gone wire-to-wire. They came to him, and he brushed off one and then another horse came to him at the three-sixteenths pole and hooks him, and he went on and pulled away. That was a new dimension."

The sixth win in 18 lifetime starts sends Proxy to the Jockey Club Gold Cup. Stidham could have lived without the in-Matt Wooley/Eclipse Sportswire side post draw, and would prefer not to be on the lead early, but knows the extended trip should help his horse work out a trip.

"The one hole in the Foster at Ellis on a speed-favoring racetrack was the death of him but Joel's ridden him so many times now he knows what he's got to do," Stidham said. "I'm hoping he can break, get a little position, get him off the fence. They're going a mile-and-a-quarter so that should enable him to run his race. The talent is there. It's just him



getting the right trip and things working out."

Part of the Breeders' Cup Challenge Series, the Jockey Club Gold Cup comes with an automatic entry into the Classic at Santa Anita, but that's been the goal all year for Stidham.

"When we made the trip to the Santa Anita Handicap, the main reason for that was we were hoping we'd be around for the Breeders' Cup," Stidham said. "Knowing the Breeders' Cup was at Santa Anita this year, it was a good chance to give him a race at a mile-and-quarter over the track where we hoped we would be at the end of the year."

Proxy meets a somewhat familiar foe in 9-5 morning-line favorite Rattle N Roll, winner of three in a row before he finished second in the Stephen Foster. Rattle N Roll finished 6 lengths ahead of Proxy in the Foster, and hasn't made another start since by design.

"I thought he had run pretty hard all spring and that it probably would be wise to wait, skip the Whitney," said Kenny McPeek, who trains the 4-year-old Connect colt for Lucky Seven Stable. "He's done really well up here. He was a little jammed up coming out of the Ellis race. He was a little stiff for a week or so after he ran. But he's better now. He's great now. Doing super."

Like Stidham, McPeek hopes for the Breeders' Cup entry that comes with a win, but left open the possibility of a start in the Grade 2 Lukas Classic Sept. 30 at Churchill Downs as a possible additional prep.

Rattle N Roll won a trio of Grade 3s – the Ben Ali at Keeneland and Pimlico Special going 1 3/16 miles and the Blame going 1 1/8 miles at Churchill. The 10 furlongs of the Jockey Club Gold Cup figure to suit Rattle N Roll, who breaks from post four under regular pilot Brian Hernandez Jr.

"The more ground the better," McPeek said. "Proxy looks tough but I beat him last time. ... With that distance, it's a jockey's race. A horse can get off on an easy lead and sometimes can be hard to catch. That's out of our control. Thankfully Brian knows him really well."

Tyson, one of two Canadian shippers for trainer Josie Carroll, is the 5-1 third choice on the line for Manny Franco. The 4-year-old son of Tapit won back-to-back starts – the Grade 3 Dominion Day and Grade 2 Seagram Cup – on Woodbine's synthetic surface and makes his dirt debut.

Carroll also sends out Duke Of Love, winner of the Grade 3 West Virginia Governor's Stakes on West Virginia Derby Day at Mountaineer Park last time out. The 4-year-old Ontario-bred son of Cupid is unbeaten in two dirt starts, with a win in the Canadian classic Prince of Wales Stakes last season at Fort Erie. He's 15-1 on the morning line from post seven under Luis Contreras.

Bright Future is also 6-1 on the line for Repole Stable and St. Elias Stable and trainer Todd Pletcher. Eighth in the Grade 2 Brooklyn Stakes two starts back, the 4-year-old son of Curlin won a 9-furlong allowance-optional at Saratoga July 21 to earn his spot in the Gold Cup field. Javier Castellano rides from post eight.

Clapton, a recent private purchase for Sheikh Rashid Bin Humaid Alnuami's RRR Racing, makes his first start for trainer Chad Summers.

Runner-up to Charge It in the Grade 2 Suburban at the Gold Cup's 10-furlong trip July 8 at Belmont, the 4-year-old son of Bretheren finished third behind Rattle N Roll and Speed Bias in the Pimlico Special two starts back after winning the Grade 3 Ghostzapper at Gulfstream park April 1. Irad Ortiz Jr., on his way to another Saratoga riding title, rides from post five at 8-1.


"It's exciting, I'm very thankful for the opportunity," said Summers. "We love the diversity and the fact that he's run 22 times in 25 months. He can sprint, he can go a mile, he can go a distance of ground and he's run at multiple tracks. Those are the things you like. He's got a running style where he's just going to grind it out. Especially now as a 4-year-old, he keeps coming and keeps coming. That's going to help him."

Longshots Unbridled Bomber, third in the Suburban for trainer Jim Ryerson; and Warrior Johny, a runaway winner at Saratoga last summer for Phil Bauer, complete the field.

Halfway There

Clement sends out two of four runners in Grade 2 turf stakes

Christophe Clement won last Friday's Smart And Fancy with Roses for Debra, went 3-for-3 with his stakes runners on Sunday's New York Showcase Day and sent out Loon Cry to a dominant victory in Thursday allowance at Saratoga Race Course.

In short, the barn is rolling.

"They've been running very well," Clement said of his stable he oversees with his son and assistant trainer Miguel. "We're very lucky. Well done the team, well done Miguel. Life is good."

Clement hopes to keep the good feelings in today's Saturday's Grade 2 Flower Bowl Stakes, which offers an automatic berth in the Nov. 4 Breeders' Cup Filly and Mare Turf at Santa Anita Park.

Amazing Grace, likely the more popular Clement runner at the windows, breaks from the outside post in the field of four. Moyglare Stud's



German-bred mare has run four times in the United States for Clement, after shipping overseas from Waldemar Hickst's care in Europe for the remainder of her career.

The 5-year-old daughter of Protectionist won her stateside debut in the Grade 3 Orchid at Gulfstream Park, and has since run fourth in the Grade 2 Sheepshead Bay and Grade 2 Belmont Gold Cup against males, both at Belmont Park, and most recently third in the Glens Falls Stakes at Saratoga. The most recent start came behind McKulick, the 4-5 morning-line favorite for today's 1 3/8-mile inner turf stakes. Clement believes that effort came after bad racing luck.

"She was an unlucky third," he said. "The race was a little bit against her last time. She ran a good race.

We're not foolish. McKulick is a very, very good filly. I get it. It's fun, it's a Grade 2. The Flower Bowl is a major race. I want to be there. So, it's fun to be there, we'll try our best."

As for any possible change in tactics with just a quartet of runners, Clement said he'd leave it up to jockey Joel Rosario.

"I just train them and we'll let the jock figure it out," he said.

Clement's other entry, Parnac, breaks from the rail under Dylan Davis. The 4-year-old French-bred filly by Zarak was scheduled to run in an Aug. 11 allowance

McKulick looks to duplicate her win in the Glens race, but after stewards were concerned about horses who started in the Robert G. Dick Memorial at Delaware Park (Parnac finished third).

"It's OK, it's life, and you just have to adapt," Clement said.

Now 24 days after the scratch, Clement thinks the filly owned by West Point Thoroughbreds and Dream With Me Stable is ready to tackle the much harder task.

"She's doing well," he said. "She's trained well. It's a tough spot, it's a Grade 2, but she's doing well and I'm excited to see her run."



Falls Aug. 3.

Clement trains half the field, but the filly to beat is McKulick, who will try to become the third horse after Casa Creed and Echo Zulu to win two graded stakes at the meet. Trained by Chad Brown, who has won the Flower Bowl seven times. the daughter of Frankel exited her Glens Falls victory in good order.

"She's done well since her last race. which was a nice win for her run-

ning down a very good filly," Brown said, "I liked her works since. She looks good."

Ridden by Irad Ortiz Jr, McKulick pulled off a mild upset in the Glens Falls when beating the twotime defending champion War Like Goddess. With nobody in the Flower Bowl field quite as daunting as that rival. Brown is a little more confident his filly will once again find success while still being wary of what can go wrong in a short field.

"Anytime you have to run against War Like

Goddess, it's never something you're looking forward to," Brown said. "We were lucky enough to beat her last time, but not having her in there, I'm not upset about that. We still have to beat the other horses in the race, and there's some nice horses in here. Sometimes your trip can get a little messy in a short field, so we'll have to see what happens."

Should all go well for McKulick, Klaravich Stable's filly could be seen in the Filly and Mare Turf.

"A mile and a quarter will suit her just fine, so it's definitely on the table," Brown said.

Rounding out the field is Tamarama, who makes her U.S. debut for new trainer Jack Sisterson. The English-bred daughter of Muhaarar was last seen at Royal Ascot finishing 15th in a 1-mile handicap for trainer Ralph Beckett.

Sisterson said Tamarama, owned by Andrew Rosen and Linda Shanahan, will be ready under Iavier Castellano.

"She came in great shape," Sisterson said. "Ralph does such a good job there. We just kind of stayed out of her way. She came in great condition, fitness, everything was great. We just moved her forward each week and she really bought into the American style of training, which is completely different to Europe.

"I'd be shocked if she's not on the lead. There's no speed in the race and she has speed, so I assume she'll be on the lead. If someone wants to be on the lead in front of her, they're going too fast. So, we'll be on the lead and see how she goes from there."



Tom Morley prayed for rain last time. This time he doesn't figure to get it, amazing considering the soggy summer of Saratoga 2023.

So, he's looking elsewhere heading into today's Grade 2 Prioress Stakes with Unified Alliance.

"I don't know, to be honest. It's a tough race," Morley said outside his barn Friday morning, waiting for turf works on the Oklahoma Training Track. "I would have much preferred an outside post position. Obviously, there are five fillies in there and they're all very tactically fast. It's going to be a bit of a scramble to see who has position on the turn."

Reagan Jack Racing's Unified Alliance won the off-the-turf Coronation

Cup Stakes July 14. The 3-year-old daughter of Unified made her first start for Morley in that 5 1/2-furlong event, breaking from post three of the four who remained following a bevy of scratches.

Unified Alliance and Javier Castellano, who rode the filly in her last two starts including a runner-up in the Jersey Girl for trainer John Servis, drew post two for the \$250,000 Prioress. Unsung Melody, third in the Wilton Stakes, breaks from post three with Delaware Park shipper Alva Starr in four and 6-5 morning-line favorite Dazzling Blue in five. Jersey Pearl, fifth in the Grade 1 Test Stakes Aug.



5, breaks from the rail.

"Alva Starr ... I would imagine she would be pretty hard sent from the four hole," Morley said. "We will definitely go forward with a view that we might get a nice stalking trip. the others up a bit. We're in that position this time.



Midlantic May sale, won two of her first five starts for Servis. Both wins came at Parx Racing, and she also finished fourth in the off-the-turf Memories Of Silver Stakes going 1 mile April 29 at Aqueduct before her second to L Street Lady in the Jersey Girl the day after the Belmont Stakes.

Morley took over Unified Alliance's training shortly after the Jersey Girl and continues to be impressed.

"She's a nice filly," he said of the 10-1 morning-line outsider. "Everyone said to me about the Prioress, 'Do you think you're in over your head here?' Honestly I'm a great believer that when 3-year-old fillies start to improve they can really, really improve and that's exactly what she's done. She's a big filly, she's done very, very well since we've had her. Physically she's a big, strong filly and she might just be getting better."

Juddmonte's Dazzling Blue shipped to Saratoga from Kentucky with other members of trainer Brad Cox's string shortly after finishing second behind the ill-fated Maple Leaf Mel in the Grade 3 Victory Ride July 8 at Belmont.

The daughter of Into Mischief won her three prior starts before the Victory Ride, including the Letellier Memorial Stakes late last December at Fair Grounds. Joel Rosario takes the call for the first time on Dazzling Blue, a \$500,000 purchase at the 2021 Keeneland September sale.

Unsung looks to continue a strong meet for owner Bill Simon's WSS

Racing and trainer John Ortiz. The daughter of Maclean's Music finished third, beaten 11 ½ lengths by eventual Alabama winner Randomized, in the 1-mile Wilton Stakes and shortens up to 6 furlongs for the Prioress. She's 2-for-4 with a second at the distance and Ortiz likes how she's coming into her second Saratoga start.

"She's been doing really well. We've been training her in interval training, like we did with (Adirondack Stakes winner) Brightwork," said Ortiz, who is 2-for-5 with a second and a third at the meet. "She's been on Clare Court going nice and easy, we took her to the main track and let her have some strong gallops. We gave her one week going into this, and we realized that she likes to go into races very fresh and so we're hoping that she's as fresh as can be and she takes them wire to wire."

Alva Starr, winner of the July 8 Dashing Beauty Stakes at Delaware Park, also runs her best races on the front end. The daughter of Lord Nelson comes into the Prioress with two wins and two seconds in her four starts for trainer Brett Brinkman and owner Dale Ladner. Jose Lezcano takes the call on the 2-1 second choice.

Jersey Pearl returns to Saratoga for trainer Darrin Miller and owners Tom and Bonnie Hamilton's Silverton Hill. She won back-to-back starts before the Test, allowance-optionals at Churchill Downs and Ellis Park, before her somewhat troubled run in the 7-furlong Test. Irad Ortiz Jr. takes the call on the 3-1 third choice.

The Prioress goes as the second of four stakes on the card and the fifth race at 2:52 p.m.

Thin White Duke, 2022 winner, makes 4th start of meet for Donk

Dave Donk knows the score.

He runs Thin White Duke in today's \$150,000 Harvey Pack, a race he won last year when run as the Lucky Coin Stakes, and acknowledges the 5 1/2-furlong turf stakes isn't totally about the 5-year-old New York-bred gelding.

"If he gets back to one of his best races he's pretty tough," Donk said of Thin White Duke, who makes his fourth start of the meet. "But the race goes through Clement. That horse, maybe Christophe is putting us all off how he's not ready, but if he's running him, he's ready. He's not going to run him if he's not happy with him."

That horse is Big Invasion, runner-up in the Grade 1 Jaipur, Royal Ascot performer in June and multi-

ple stakes-winning turf sprinter. The 4-year-old Declaration Of War colt hasn't been out since finishing 13th in the Group 1 Queen Elizabeth II Jubilee Stakes June 24 at Royal Ascot, and comes off a pair of works on the Oklahoma Training Track dirt course Aug. 14 and 23.

Clement said this week that he was "running him back a little bit quick, but I don't like my choices."

He also said last year's Grade 3 Quick Call winner, the 7-5 favorite on the morning line against five others entered for the grass, would be ready.

"He's fit enough," Clement said. "We've had a discussion with my son

(and assistant Miguel) every day. I think it's OK. He's good enough to overcome what we're doing."

Donk hopes maybe Big Invasion isn't quite back to the same level that saw him win six of eight last year, and that Thin White Duke can run back to his nose victory over Dancing Buck in last year's Lucky Coin.

The Dominus gelding won three of 11 last season for owners Phil Gleaves, Steve Crist, Ken deRegt and Bryan Hilliard, and he's been in the top three on Saratoga's grass six times in eight starts.

"He runs well here. He's typical of a lot of horses that do well here," Donk said. "He seems to handle this grass course, which a lot of horses don't, especially at the 5 1/2. He's doing well, bounces out of these races well. There are limited opportunities and he's been fortunate to get on the grass. ... Now with the drying weather, it's been a touch on the wet side the last couple of times. It will be nice this time. Listen, he always shows up."

Thin White Duke finished fifth, third and fourth in his three Saratoga runs this season, the middle effort in the Grade 3 Troy Stakes on soft ground on Whitney Day. He closed from deep in the field in each start and lost those three by a combined 5 3/4 lengths.

Jose Lezcano takes the call on the earner of \$600,105, the 5-1 fourth choice on the line behind Big Invasion, Our Shot and Dancing

Buck.

"It's a six-horse field, he's supposed to be there," Donk said. "He doesn't have to win it, but hopefully he makes his run."

Big Invasion also likes Saratoga. He's 2-for-2 on the turf here, with a win in last year's Mahony about a month after the Quick Call. Big Invasion finished the season with a third in the Grade 2 Franklin-Simpson Stakes in early September at Kentucky Downs.

Clement rested the colt for several months and he returned with a victory in

March at Gulfstream Park. After a seventh in the Grade 2 Twin Spires Turf Sprint on Kentucky Derby Day and a close second to Caravel in the Jaipur, Big Invasion headed to Royal Ascot.

"It was very tough on him," Clement said of the British journey. "We ran him in the Jaipur. Ascot was very aggressive, running right back. We gave him plenty of time, he looks good, he's training well. As I said, small question mark on the fitness, but he's a sprinter at the end of the day and he should be able to overcome that."

Our Shot, the 2-1 second choice under Javier Castellano for trainer John Terranova, comes off a win at the Harvey Pack trip July 26. The 4-yearold son of Kantharos has won three of five this season, including back-toback starts at Tampa Bay Downs and Keeneland in March and April.

New York-bred Grade 3 winner Dancing Buck makes his first start since finishing sixth as the favorite in the Aqueduct Turf Sprint Championship in late November for Michelle Nevin. The 5-year-old War Dancer gelding won the Grade 3 Belmont Turf Sprint before that effort after a nose defeat to Thin White Duke in the Lucky Coin. Manny Franco rides the 7-2 third choice from post two.

Mister Mmmmm, sixth in the Troy and claimed two starts back by trainer Jason Barkley; and Chess Master, claimed last time out for \$32,000 by Jorge Abreu, complete the body of the field. Willy Boi, Sheriff Bianco and Jake Rocks are entered for the main track.



Tee It Up

Carl Spackler adds second turf graded stakes victory of season

Bob Edwards of e Five Racing Thoroughbreds may have watched the movie Caddyshack countless times, but you'd be hard-pressed to blame him after his 3-year-old colt Carl Spackler (named for Bill Murray's groundskeeping character) dominated Friday's Grade 3 Saranac Stakes at Saratoga Race Course.

Asked about the number of times he's seen the movie, Edwards said, "Probably too many. My wife actually watched it after the last win, just to keep pace with us."

Breaking from post two, Carl Spackler sat right off the pacesetting Taking Candy, applying mild pressure through fractions of :23.58 for

the quarter and :48.56 for the half. Under Tyler Gaffalione, Carl Spackler started to ramp up his momentum on the turn, switched leads early in the stretch, and took off. He hit the wire 3 1/2 lengths in front, an even bigger margin than his Grade 2 Hall of Fame score Aug. 11. The final time for the 1 1/16 miles on the inner turf was 1:42.23 over the course labeled good.

"Once we had a target, I felt pretty good," winning trainer Chad Brown said. "I thought we would be on the lead actually, but Tyler knows this horse so well and, with all his horses, he comes well prepared. These short fields with a short price can be tricky



sometimes, and I just said, 'Look, ride it loose and if you go to the lead, which I expect, fine. If someone really wants to go, it's even better."

Gaffalione talked about the change in tactics after closing in the Hall of Fame.

"That day I wanted to be a little more forwardly placed, but we had a little hiccup out of the gate," he said. Carl Spackler broke his maiden in his second start at Gulfstream Park in February, making amends on a debut loss by a head to eventual Grade 1 winner Far Bridge. The Irish-bred out of the Grade 2-winning More Than Ready mare Zindaya finished eighth in the Grade 2 American Turf on Kentucky Derby Day at Churchill Downs, before coming back big at Saratoga.

"It's very rewarding," Brown said.

"I trained this horse's mother for the Edwards family. It's one of our first big winners together. To see her handsome colt that she threw out here winning two stakes at the same meet at Saratoga, it's hard to do."

Up next for Carl Spackler could be a crack at Grade 1 company and older horses in the Oct. 7 Coolmore Turf Mile at Keeneland.

"I decided to run back on short rest, just thinking I gave him quite a break since Churchill when he didn't run that well," Brown said. "He was just doing so well out of the Hall of Fame win and I'm looking at what we want to do with him in early October at Keeneland. I just thought it was too big of a gap because we're going to possibly go after the Coolmore Mile, which will be a tall order.


"I love a little cutback into a mile in a bigger field with some pace. He'll get a little bit of a weight break being a 3-year-old."

Now with two graded stakes wins at the meet, Carl Spackler is becoming one of the best 3-year-old turf horses in the country.

"To get one graded win in Saratoga is tough and everybody dreams to have that happen," Edwards said. "To be in a spot where I had two in three weeks is exceptional."

Carl Spackler is one of several horses Edwards has named with the intention of making fans curious. He hopes the names will pique interest and attract people to the game.

"We're all here because we love the sport, we want more people to love the sport," he said. "So, you have a little fun with this and we bring people in. You saw how big our winner's circle was. Quarrel scores popular win for Ribaudo, Keller in allowance

Marc Keller's homebred Quarrel provided trainer Bob Ribaudo with his first win of the Saratoga Race Course meet in Friday's seventh, a 1 1/16-mile allowance on the inner turf.

Ridden by Javier Castellano, the 3-year-old daughter of Speighstown returned to her more favorable surface and won by a length over Swoop To Finish.

"It's been a rough meet for a lot of people, not only myself," Ribaudo said. "A lot of scratches, enter and then scratch, enter and then scratch. This race wasn't on the radar. She was going into straight 3-year-old filly races the whole meet. Unfortunately, they kept coming off. We were ready

to go home and she was kicking the walls down.

"This race certainly suited her. We entered, we hoped for the weather, we got it, and Javier did a great job putting her on the lead and getting her to settle a little bit. It worked out great."

Quarrel made her most recent start in a 1-mile off-the-turf allowance-optional during opening week, finishing third, but Ribaudo was pleased to get the filly back on grass.

"She hadn't run on the dirt since she was a 2-year-old and it wasn't a bad race, but once they get on the turf and get used to it, sometimes they just don't come back to the dirt," he said.



"She was third, but not a very good third. The next couple of times we were in and the race came off, I just felt it wasn't really the thing to do."

Quarrel took the lead from the start Friday and set relaxed fractions of :24.43 and :49.46 for the first halfmile. Odds-on favorite Expand The

Map looked threatening at the top of the stretch before Quarrel kicked into gear to win in 1:43.29. Swoop To Finish finished 3 1/2 lengths in front of the favorite.

"He used her a little bit to make

the lead, and then he wrapped up on her," Ribaudo said. "Nobody challenged us down the backside, so you know she was going to have a little something left for the finish. Blinkers had a lot to do with it also, made her a little more aggressive, and she responded well."

• Locked delivered a powerful performance in his second start for trainer Todd Pletcher, winning a 1-mile maiden special weight for 2-year-olds on the main track in the fifth.

The son of Gun Runner improved at the break, starting quickly enough to settle just off the lead held by longshot Arteta. Locked toyed with the competition late and won by 7 1/4 lengths over Drum Roll Please, who was 13 lengths ahead of Sturdy. Locked won in 1:36 for jockey Jose Ortiz.

"He showed good tactical speed, put Jose right into the race," Pletcher said. "Jose said he was traveling very comfortably all the way down the backside and when he squeezed him, he jumped underneath him and finished up impressively. Second horse looked like he was way clear of the third horse, and the final time I thought was exceptional."

Locked finished third behind two

highly regarded runners in Just Steel and Be You in his debut. Those two are entered in Monday's Grade 1 Hopeful Stakes. Pletcher said Locked got an educational first start, which set him up well for the win.

"We were very pleased with his debut," he said. "He didn't get away real sharp that day, took a lot of dirt, he did like a lot of first-timers will do, he climbed from the kickback, but when he leveled off, he really came with a strong late run. Exceptional gallop out. Came back with two dynamite breezes afterward. We've been pointing for this race since we knew it was here, and we were expecting good things from him."

Owned by Eclipse Thoroughbred Partners and Walmac Farm, Locked will most likely make his next appearance in one of the major Grade 1 events for 2-vear-olds with an eve on the Breeders' Cup Juvenile.

"Either the Champagne or the Breeders' Futurity," Pletcher said. "We'll talk to the connections and come up a final decision as we get closer."

• Off for 22 1/2 months since a maiden win in October 2021, Forced Ranking returned with a victory for owner Klaravich Stable and trainer Chad Brown in the eighth, a \$25,000 claiming event going 7 furlongs.

The 4-year-old gelding by Mastery turned for home with the lead and extended it to 2 lengths at the wire under Manny Franco.

"His only career win was at 7 furlongs, so the distance appealed to me for this race," Brown said. "We took a big drop in class, he hasn't run in two years, so at this stage of his career with us and our stable, this made a lot of sense. He won nicely. I want to give my Monmouth division a ton of credit for getting this horse ready off a layoff to run very quick, seven-eighths in (1:23.65). They've done a terrific job down there."

With three days left in the meet, Brown owns a two-win lead over Linda Rice in the trainer standings. Brown said defending the title isn't what's important, rather getting through the rest of the meet with good performances from his horses.

"We're just trying to get through each card the best we can, race to race," he said. "I feel like we've entered the horses well with the races that have gone. We have some clear weather right now, which is really starting to help us. The weather has hampered us a bit. We've had a great

meet nevertheless. I'm very appreciative for all the big wins, appreciative for all the stake wins. Hopefully we can finish this meet off much the way that it's went for us, which has been successful."

One highlight of closing weekend could come from debut winner Ways And Means in Sunday's Grade 1 Spinaway. Brown said the 2-year-old filly is coming into the race in great shape.

"Ways And Means really came out of her dazzling debut in good order," he said. "Has had a couple workouts since that I've been very pleased with. We decided to go ahead and enter her in the Spinaway. We drew a nice post and we're excited to see her run."

• Vacation Dance gave Castellano's his second win of the day in the ninth, a 5 1/2-furlong allowance on the Mellon Turf Course. Owned by Sleeping Giant Stables, America's Pastime Stables and KimDon Racing, the New York-bred colt by The Lieutenant cut back in distance from 1 1/16 miles in his last start and swept to a 2 3/4-length victory at 7-1. Trainer John Kimmel thought the cutback would suit Vacation Dance, along with a drop from stakes company.

"He's coming out of route races," he said. "He was a sprinter back as a 2-year-old. Today, I figured maybe coming off those route races he wouldn't be as sharp. I think that was a benefit today because they went extremely fast. I know the time doesn't look all that fast, but the turf course still got a little cut in it, and I think it's probably one of the faster 5 1/2 turf races we've seen today and certainly in the last few days. Once Javier found a nice seam for him, he got him out. Coming off those route races he had plenty of fitness and basically showed them the last eighth of a mile."

Kimmel is confident he's found that short distances are ideal for Vacation Dance.

"The horse is 17 hands, and you would think for all intents and purposes he could route, but the proof is in the doing, and he just never really finished like he needed to," Kimmel said. "They had the nice stallion series for those horses. He's a stallion-eligible horse. We went back to really what he's best at and that's sprinting on the turf."

Flashy Filly

Well-marked Gala Brand beats the boys in With Anticipation

Arnmore Thoroughbreds' and Even Keel Thoroughbreds' 2-year-old Gala Brand drew a certain amount of attention in the paddock prior to Thursday's 19th running of the Grade 3 With Anticipation Stakes at Saratoga Race Course.

First because she was the only filly in the field of seven, and second because of her unique markings.

Gala Brand is a chestnut daughter of Violence with a large splotch of white on her underside and her four white stockings come up high enough to make her look like she's wearing go-go boots.

"At the sale, she might have looked just a little 'off' to other buyers," said Arnmore Thoroughbreds' Megan

Jones, "so I think the color helped us buy her. Because when we looked at her there I couldn't find any holes in her otherwise."

There was certainly nothing wrong with the way she looked crossing the finish line a half-length winner over favored Carson's Run. Ridden by Jose Ortiz, Gala Brand came from last on the second turn and into the stretch. She battled the runner-up down the lane, earning the win in the final yards.

Jones, Arnmore's chief executive officer, works as the point person for the partnership and takes a hands-on

Gala Brand also had to come from behind in that maiden ef-

fort. After 3 furlongs she trailed by 14 lengths, but swung four wide and passed them all, winning by 2 1/2. On the strength of that, Mott entered her in Wednesday's more logical P.G. Johnson Stakes at the same distance as the With Anticipation, also on the grass, but for fillies.

"I owe a lot to Megan because she made sure the filly was entered in both races," Mott said. "Then

the Wednesday race comes off the turf and so we're up against the colts in the With Anticipation."

Mott wound up winning both the 2-year-old stakes as another of his filly charges, Magic Cross, won the P.G. Johnson on the dirt.

Jones has enjoyed success at Saratoga in the past and makes no secret of her fondness for the meet.

"It's one of my favorite times of the year," she said last year after winning the Galway Stakes here

with the filly Poppy Flower, "because you get to share the experience with everyone. It's really important to us who reside here for the summer."

Gala Brand's next move is as vet undecided.

"We'll just enjoy this one for now and then get together and see where we go, but she showed me something today," Jones said. "They went slow up front and still she ran them down. Plus, she was challenged for the first time and she galloped out nicely. I was proud of her."

Mott was also pleased with the filly's effort given the circumstances.

"For some reason, good turf horses can close off a slow pace," he said. "Don't ask me why."

• Gold Lightning provided a birthday surprise for Audrey Schwartz, the wife of the Bolt

d'Oro filly's owner Martin Schwartz, with a 14-1 victory in Thursday's opener.

ping the boys a few hours later.

Trained by Brad Cox and ridden by Manny Franco, Gold Lightning sat toward the rear of the field for the majority of the 1 1/16-mile maiden special weight on the inner turf. She outkicked her rivals, swept to the lead in the stretch and won by 2 ½ lengths over Positive Carry.

Schwartz had reason to believe his filly would be a good one despite her odds.

"I was told by Barry Eisaman, who broke the horse down in Ocala, that he liked her quite a bit," he said. "I was just hopeful, hoping we would hit the board."

• Trainer Robert Falcone Jr. got his first win of the meet in the fifth with Disappearance, who took the 7-furlong \$20,000 maiden claiming event on the main track.

"Feels great," Falcone said.

Disappearance made a move around the far turn under Kendrick Carmouche to put himself into contention at the top of the stretch. The 3-year-old Good Magic gelding gobbled up ground well out in the stretch on the way to a 3-length victory.

"Everything worked out well," Falcone said. "They were moving up front. Kendrick did a perfect job. He followed Chad Brown's horse (Scraming Uncle) sort of, and he just ended up kicking in."

Disappearance came into Thursday with three fourths to start his career. Though those results came on fast and sloppy tracks and Falcone was pleased to see the sun shining for his gelding's fourth career outing.

"It probably helped him out a little bit," Falcone said. "I thought he'd like the slop a little bit better, but fast track probably helped him out."

Dropping from maiden special weight company into maiden claiming competition helped as well.

"We tried a few different things – stretch him out, try the blinkers – but it all didn't work," he said. "He just found the right level."

Disappearance was claimed by owner/trainer Oscar Barrera III.

• Trainer Derek Ryan had only run one horse at the meet before Thurs-

day, finishing seventh with Bunty Windermere in the 11th race July 29, and won Thursday's eighth with Cicciobello.

"We usually try to get one late, sneak it in and get one at the end of the meet," Ryan said after the 4-year-old Bellamy Road gelding won the 1-mile New York-bred allowance on the main track. Owned by Massimino Rapuano, Cicciobello got involved in a mini speed duel early with Pineapple Man. That didn't worry Ryan, who was confident his horse would be able to handle the pressure.

"He's such a big striding horse, he's like 17 and 2," he said. "It's going to take a good horse to lay up on him. I wasn't really too worried."

Cicciobello eventually gained a clear lead and opened the gap to 2 lengths at the wire.

Cicciobello improved to 2-for-3 under Javier Castellano.

"He won pretty easy with Javier and came back and ran a big race with Javier," Ryan said. "I was just glad to get Javier back on him. He suits the horse. I've been very successful with Javier over the years and I like the way he rides my horses."

• More Mango lit up the board in the finale, winning the \$35,000 claiming event going 1 1/16 miles on the turf at 44-1 under Jaime Torres. The 6-year-old More Than Ready mare also gave trainer Jimmy Ferraro his first win of the Saratoga meet. Though the price on More Mango was massive, Ferraro's confidence in his mare to outrun her odds may have been even bigger.

"Yes," he emphatically said after being asked if he thought More Mango could win. "She was always capable."


The upset aside, Ferraro was pleased for his first victory of the meet.

"It's a big relief," Ferraro said. "Everybody loves to win at Saratoga. ... The trip was ideal. Keep close, not too far out and let her roll."

The 19th edition of the P. G. Johnson Stakes may go down as one of the oddest yet.

Not only was the race taken off the turf, but it also lost its heavy favorite just as the field was going to enter the gate on the Wilson Chute.

Miz Sense, a 4 1/4-length winner on debut for Todd Pletcher at Saratoga Race Course, reared up, dropped jockey Jose Ortiz and ran a portion of the clubhouse turn before being caught by an outrider. Stewards made the decision to remove her from the field

Amidst all the pre-race chaos emerged James Karp's Magic Cross, who took advantage of being the only filly in the field with dirt experience to get the stakes victory for trainer Bill Mott.

Mott surely was happy with the win, he showed sympathy for the connections of Miz Sense.

"I'm sure they're not happy about that call," he said after the race.

Breaking from the inside post in a field cut down to four, Magic Cross won the battle for the early lead and set moderate fractions of :24.16 and :47.39. Though it looked like a three-horse duel could be in store on the far turn, the 2-year-old daughter of Good

Magic put that possibility to bed at the three-sixteenths pole when she opened up on under Junior Alvarado. She completed the 1-mile stakes 4 1/2 lengths ahead of runner-up Takemetothebeach in 1:40.15 on the fast track.

"It was a good trip," Mott said.
"She had a horse dogging her a little
bit down the backside, but she was
able to put that one away. I would
still probably give this one an opportunity on the grass at some point."

After seeing races run throughout the day that played kindly toward speed horses, Alvarado made the decision to go to the lead though these tactics hadn't been employed in the first two starts of her career.

Alvarado, announced as the 2023 Mike Venezia Memorial Award winner Wednesday, made all the right moves in earning his second stakes victory of the meet.

"I was playing the track a bit," he said. "The track has been carrying speed, so I was breaking and I knew she had speed and she's been on the muscle lately. I just broke out of there well and hustled her out of there. After that, I just tried to get her to relax so she can finish and she really

showed up today."

A combination of factors – specifically the move from turf to dirt and the easier competition from her start in the Grade 3 Adirondack against Brightwork – made Magic Cross the eventual 3-5 favorite. However, Mott was confident in her ability to run well even if the race had gone as scheduled.

"We were going to run this filly one way or another," he said. "The other filly, Gala Brand, we are waiting for the race tomorrow. We scratched one and ran one and it turned out right.

"The filly we ran against in the race last time is a very top filly. You get lucky sometimes. These races scratch down, they come off the grass, and you're just better than the rest of them."

Magic Cross improved to 2-for-3, with victories in her debut at Belmont and the P.G. Johnson. Even with the success on dirt, Mott said he'd consider the Miss Grillo at Aqueduct or Jessamine at Keeneland.

"I would pursue a turf start with

her," Mott said. "She's deserving and I'm not sure what surface she'd be better on. I need to try the turf to see if she moves forward on that."

• Little Prankster became the 14th horse to win two races at the meet, taking the fourth for owner Rigney Racing and trainer Phil Bauer.

"It's very special in a place like this," Bauer said.

In her maiden breaking score in July, Little Prankster crushed a field of nine in an off the turf contest going 5 1/2 furlongs. Wednesday's race was a much tougher task, facing allowance horses going a furlong longer. The job didn't phase the 3-year-old daughter of Practical Joke, who won on the lead under Tyler Gaffalione.

"We were able to kind of take advantage of weather in breaking her maiden," Bauer said. "Caught a diluted field, easier group, but there were some horses in here that have ability. We take what we're dealt, and she's got the ability to handle it."

Little Prankster prevailed by a head over Mongolian Partner, winning in a quick 1:15.91. After a successful summer, the filly will go back down to Bauer's base in Kentucky.

"She'll go back to Churchill," he said. "We'll let the dust settle and see, but she'll run in Kentucky somewhere."

• Gilmore enjoyed a drop in class from graded stakes company when winning the fifth, a 1-mile allowance race for 3-year-olds that was taken off the turf.

After competitive but not triumphant finishes in the Grade 3 Bay Shore, Grade 2 Pat Day Mile and Grade 1 Woody Stephens, Gilmore was placed in a spot where trainer Brendan Walsh was confident he'd find success. Entered for the main track, the Twirling Candy colt coowned by Starlight Racing won for the second time in nine starts.

"It's Brendan's choice, and he wanted the horse to be in a position where he'd be competitive and go off at 3-5," Starlight's Jack Wolf said. "He obviously was the class of the race and showed his guts by winning at the end there, so good for Brendan Walsh."

Gilmore raced third early before making a three-wide bid on the far turn to strike the lead under Irad Ortiz Jr. He fended off a determined Antares through the stretch and won by a neck.





• Wednesday's first race, a \$70,000 steeplechase allowance and the final jump race scheduled for the season, was canceled because of wet conditions.





Big Saturday

Three stakes highlight stellar card

Three stakes. One hour, seven minutes. \$4 million.

Kentucky Downs kicks into high gear with an 11-race gem, highlighted by the Gun Runner, the Big Ass Fans Music City and the Mint Millions Stakes Saturday. The trio of stakes starts at 5:21 p.m. eastern time.

Led by two-time stakes winner Wadsworth, the Gun Runner attracted 10 3-year-olds for its \$1 million

Owned and bred by Godolphin, Wadsworth earned 5-2 favoritism after winning back-to-back stakes at Ellis Park this summer. Trained by Brad Cox, the son of Quality Road has become potent since switching from the dirt to the synthetic at Turfway park this winter. The bay gelding won twice there and then improved again when switching to the turf. He finished second in the Caesars Handicap at Horseshoe Indianapolis and added the American Derby and the Kentucky Downs Preview Dueling Grounds Derby at Ellis. Florent Geroux takes the return call.

Trainer Shug McGaughey had a choice with second choice Talk Of The Nation. Stay home and face Carl Spackler for \$175,000 in the Saranac or go on the road to take on Wadsworth at Kentucky Downs. The Hall of Famer opted for the latter. Runner-up in the Grade 3 Manila at Belmont Park in July, the son of Quality Road has posted five breezes on the turf at Saratoga. Jose Ortiz rides for Joseph Allen and CHC Inc.

"It was either the Saranac or the Gun Runner. We chose the purse, so we elected to ship him down there. I think it turned out to be a good spot," McGaughey said Friday afternoon. "I just thought as hard a race as the Manila was, we would be better off giving him some time in between. This kind of hit him in the head. The Saranac would have to, but we went for

the big money. It's worth giving him a chance."

Like most trainers, McGaughey wades into the unknown at the undulating Kentucky Downs course.

"Some of them move way up on it," McGaughey said. "And some of them go the wrong way but it's worth a chance."

The Gun Runner also enticed 2-for-3 Georgie W, stakes-placed Highway Robber, stakes winner Gaslight Dancer, maiden winner Smokey Mandate, stakes-placed California shipper Escape Artist, two-time dirt winner Communication Memo, Grade 3 winner Tall Boy and dual Grade 2 winner Major Dude.

A race later, the Big Ass Fans Music Stakes lured 12 entries, plus four on the also-eligible list for its \$1 million purse.

Kelsey Danner unleashes two fillies for the 6 ½ furlong stakes. The Kentucky-based trainer will have to keep her eyes wide as Danse Macabre drew the inside post and Mohawk Trail drew the outside post.

Owned by NBS Stable and Elements Racing, Danse Macabre rides a two-win streak into the Grade 3 stakes. The daughter of Army Mule hasn't been off the board in seven career tries. She took the Grade 3 Herecomesthebride Stakes at Gulfstream Park in March and the Mamzelle at Churchill Downs in May.

"She was laid up because of a setback, she got turned out for 30 days, but this was pretty much the plan all along. John (Ballantyne of NBS) really likes Kentucky Downs, we pretty much aim everything he has to Kentucky Downs if possible. She won there last year, so it makes sense," Danner said Friday afternoon, "She runs well off a lavoff so I'm not too concerned. You always think, 'if I had one more breeze,' but she's a nice filly and she's ready to go."

Adam Beschizza takes the return

call on the Kentucky-bred who owns wins from 5 ½ furlongs to a mile on the turf.

"She loves those middle-ground distances, it's what she really wants," Danner said. "The one hole, she should sit in a good position and hope something opens up and she kicks in."

Mohawk Trail will ship with Danse Macabre Saturday morning but will be a long way from her at the start. NBS Stable's daughter of Pioneerof The Nile drew the outside post for her 10th career start. She, too, rides a two-race win streak, capturing the Alywow and the Grade 3 Ontario Cotillion at Woodbine in her two most recent starts. The dark bay filly owns wins from 6 1/2 furlongs to 1 1/16 miles on the turf.

Julien Leparoux takes the ride for the first time.


"She continues to get better with each race. Wanted to cut her back this winter, but I didn't want to cut her back to five eighths, so Woodbine fit her well," Danner said. "She has the same running style; she can lay off it and do whatever the jockey wants. He'll have to work out his trip from the 12 hole, but she usually breaks quick so she should get a good posi-

L J's Emma earned 7-2 favoritism. Boxman Stable's daughter of into Mischief finished off the board in her first two starts before switching to the turf. She's won three of four on the grass, including the Galway Stakes at Saratoga in most recent start. Trained by Eddie Kenneally, she breaks from post 10 for Corey Lanerie. Named on five horses Saturday, the veteran jockey is three wins shy of 5,000 for his career.

"She was a much-improved horse on grass. She didn't do as well as we had hoped she would on the dirt. She found a new lease on life when she got on the grass," Kenneally said. "Kentucky Downs just kind of evolved. It's the biggest purse they have for 3-yearold fillies sprinting on the grass in the country. We thought if we ran well at

The Mint Millions concludes the stakes hat trick.

Cloudy: Owned by Winngate Stable, the 4-year-old son of Noble Mission makes his 2023 debut in the third race Sunday. "Cloudy ran a bang-up race over the track last year. He hurt himself, I was going to run him in a stake on Christmas Eve, he had some ankles he was fighting so I decided to get that taken care of. We got him started back at Niall Brennan's and he wasn't going exactly right so we had to back off him again. I knew where this race was on the calendar. He had run an awfully good race there last fall and that's why I decided to give him another chance. It's a lot of money."

Sherlock's Jewel: Wharton Connell Racing's son of Lea drew post seven in the fourth Sunday. "He's another one who ran a bangup race down there last year. We had to stop him, we brought him back, he won at Keeneland, we took a shot in the Jersey Derby, that was terrible. His race the other day wasn't that bad, it was kind of a jumbled-up race, he was up close and this and that. He came out of it good, we got a good race into him, he ran awfully good there last year so I thought it would be worth taking a chance there."

The Jackal: Owned by Woodford Racing and Don Alberto Stable, the son of Medaglia d'Oro finished sixth and third at Laurel this summer. The bay colt breaks from post one in the seventh Sunday. "I ran him down there in the Gun Runner last year and he didn't break. I think (Joel) Rosario was a little too patient, he came running. He had no chance from the start. I think if he gets away from there halfway decent, which he doesn't break well, hopefully he can get in the race and Jose can give him a chance to finish. Mind Games

"It's simple, a trainer's job is helping make a horse into the finest athlete he can possibly be. That's why we became trainers. But suddenly you have to deal with so much more."

Trainer Tom Morley was pacing the shedrow with a phone to his ear dealing with a piece of the to be a horse psychologist? "so much more."

A minor crisis had popped up just as he was about to talk to me about the skills a trainer needs to succeed. Waiting, I stood by his stable door and occupied myself watching a pair of bees buzz around a morsel of something on the desk. I had just mentally dubbed the place the Hamlet Office (because of the "two bees") when Morley ended his call. Crisis solved or averted or just dodged; Morley smiled and turned his full attention to me.

"Let's talk at my open-air office, instead of the beehive," he said as we took two chairs at an outdoor table.

And he was off

then," he gestured, vaguely suggesting whatever problem he had just dealt with. "You wind up needing to be a negotiator, an organizer, a delegator, a marketeer, a CEO. You've got to have people skills, selling skills, business skills, financial skills, you got to have social media skills for heaven's sake.

"I call it a rainbow job. You need to have all the colors in your palette to make the picture come out right. And hopefully that picture is success on the track."

about successes and disappointments with their horses, I keep hearing words like: "You know I never quite figured him out" or "I found a way to make him happy and like his job again" or "she just doesn't like working alone. She wants company."

These are the kinds of phrases we use in talking they start eating less. Or they stop eating. about people. People who think and feel and have likes and dislikes. And while we all tend to anthro-

"Absolutely, again. Being a good trainer is not so much a question of understanding horses, it's understanding each horse. Because every single one of them is an individual. Every one of them has his own personality, his own likes and dislikes. Every one of them has his own mind. And as a trainer, it's my job to listen and understand that horse."

gave up my dream of being a trainer. Because my personal system of psychological analysis is to ask the subject to tell me what their favorite joke is. You can tell a lot about someone by knowing their favorite joke.

If a horse can't tell you a joke, if you can't put a horse on a couch and ask him how it makes him feel that his father deserted his mother after a one-night stand at a Kentucky stud farm, then how do horses talk to trainers?

"They talk to you all the time. But you've got to This year, while listening to other trainers talk pay attention," Morley said. "They talk when they go to the track – if they get nervous about training, the track at all, they're talking to you. You've got to be listening.

"They talk to you when they're eating, or when

"They talk to you when we monitor their sleep pattern.

"You listen and you get to know the individual. imals, is it real? Do horses really have these human You get to know what he enjoys or doesn't enjoy. And if something's bothering him you try to figure out what to change to make him happy again."

> Pointing to a stall, Morley said, "See that one, a 2-year-old. He has his own routine that he really enjoys. He likes training enormously. Then he comes back and takes his nap very seriously. Then he has his breakfast, eats well, and he's up for most of the rest of the day. It's his routine, he's happy with it and I'm not going to touch it.

"On the other hand, I've got a filly called Social Whirl. Bit of a headcase. [Ironically her sire is the It was at this point in our conversation that I New York stallion Freud. She's at Belmont right now. Why? Because last year we brought her up here and it was a disaster. She hated it, wouldn't do a thing. This year, we left her happy at Belmont. When we run her up here now, she vans up the day before the race, and we ship her back to Belmont the morning after. We monitor each horse every day and treat each one as an individual."


